From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Epiphany is a feast that has captured our hearts and imaginations from the earliest centuries of the Church. For many years, it was a more prominent celebration than Christmas itself, overshadowing the Nativity and focusing on the joy of Christ being made known to all the nations. It is among the richest of our festivals in its symbolism and



the deep longing it conveys. There is drama, there are gifts given and received, there are the exotic magi or wise men who follow the dazzling light of a new star in the heavens... all fodder for creative speculation and wonder about these things that have occurred, piquing even the interest of a king. There are fear, wonder and joy present in abundance. There is the hand of divine guidance and the innocence of a newborn child. What is not to love about this story?!

Under it all lies a theological narrative that underscores right from the beginning of Matthew's Gospel a powerful statement that the Christ was not to be a gift only to the people of Israel, but to the whole world. This good news would not, could not be contained in one nation only, even if they are God's Chosen People. Rather, all nations, all peoples, all times and places are called to rejoice in the blessings of Salvation through Jesus Christ. All were to have a share in God's Grace!

This has always been the plan from the very beginning, that all creation would enjoy the blessings of a right-relationship with God. There was to be harmony in our world, and a perfect communion of mind and heart with our Creator. All this is represented in the celebration of Epiphany, literally, a "showing around" of the light that Christ brings to the darkness of our world. One of the primary symbols that we claim in our baptism ritual is a lighted candle, that as members of the Body of Christ, we are called to bring the light of Christ's resurrection into our world and share it with others. Later in his Gospel, St. Matthew reminds us: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket; it is set on a lampstand, where it gives light to all in the house. Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father." (Mt.

The challenge of Epiphany is to claim our rightful role in sharing this light with our world. We need to follow the light wherever it leads us. We need to celebrate and rejoice in the light where it rests. We need to point to the light whenever darkness threatens to overwhelm us. We must give the gift of the light to those who need to see it more clearly.

Over the past year and a half, our two parishes that make up the Holy Redeemer—Immaculate Conception Collaborative have been working intently towards the goal of growing and strengthening our collective witness

to the Gospel and actively seeking to welcome new members into our communities of faith. Each weekend, approximately 1300 parishioners worship at our various liturgies in the three churches that make up our Collaborative in Merrimac, Newbury, Newburyport, and West Newbury. However, more than ten (10) times that number are baptized Catholics who live within our area, and for a whole variety of reasons—some great and some small-do not worship with us regularly. While we see a percentage of them at Christmas and Easter, can you imagine how much more vibrant our faith life would be if we could welcome back even a small fraction of them? If, for example, we could reach out and successfully invite back even 5%-that would mean more than 500 additional people sharing in the Eucharist every weekend. Our masses would be full, our collections would be up, our pool of volunteers would grow, and the number of parishioners involved in our different ministries of outreach and service would increase. It would be a win-win scenario from which everyone would benefit. We believe that Jesus Christ is the Light of the World and that the Gospel message is what gives people hope for eternal life. We must find a way to share this light in an ever more effective way with our neighbors, co-workers, and friends. We must be unafraid to share it with strangers.

To this end, one of the centerpieces of the Collaborative process is the development of a local Pastoral Plan that addresses our specific needs and crafts a concrete path that we can then follow in our efforts to grow our parishes. To date, dozens of parishioners from both parishes have been involved in helping us to sketch an initial draft that went through several revisions before being submitted to the Archdiocese for comment. This spring, it will undergo further revisions based on feedback from a wide variety of parishioners and those in the Archdiocese who are involved with this process among 52 different Collaboratives like ours that have been formed so far. This weekend, a number of parishioners who are involved with our Plan Writing Team will be speaking at the conclusion of every mass within our Collaborative to give everyone an update on our progress. I would urge you to listen to their message and consider approaching them after mass, by email, or at several meetings to be held in the coming months and offer your own insights, ideas and input into this process.

I have great confidence that together, we can be effective bearers of the Light of Christ and sharers of His Gospel of life.

He connects the events in the New Testament to Old Testament prophecies and events, as well as to our own time. This is a worthwhile way to spend an hour and fifteen minutes on a Sunday afternoon. All are invited to attend these sessions and grow in knowledge and faith.



Consolers Circle Meal



Amoris Laetita...Pope Francis

Pope Francis released the Exhortation on the Family. In the weeks to come, you will be introduced to various statements from the Holy Father.

The Sacrament of Matrimony-In #72: The sacrament of marriage is not a social AMORIS LAETITIA convention, an empty ritual or merely the outward sign of a commitment. The sacrament is a gift given for the sanctification and salvation of the spouses, since "their mutual belonging is a real representation, through the sacramental sign, of the same relationship between Christ



and the Church. The married couple are therefore a permanent reminder for the Church of what took place on the cross; they are for one another and for their children witnesses of the salvation in which they share through the sacrament." Marriage is a vocation, inasmuch as it is a response to a specific call to experience conjugal love as an imperfect sign of the love between Christ and the Church. Consequently, the decision to marry and to have a family ought to be fruit of a process of vocational discernment.

On September 4, 1882, the Immaculate Conception School opened with 520 students under the guidance of the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth. The new school was located on Court Street on the site now used as the parish parking lot. The following year, 1883, saw an influx of an additional two hundred students, prompting the parish to rent two vacant public school buildings in order to accommodate the growing student body.

In 1937, the parish purchased the vacated Newburyport High School building, which was located right next to the church. The Immaculate Conception School used the facility until it was destroyed by a tragic fire on May 9, 1945. After the fire, the parish's Sacred Heart Chapel and its adjoining hall were converted to classrooms, and the IC reopened its doors the following September in a refurbished facility serving close to 400 students.

A longtime dream became a reality in 1955 when a new red-brick building, our current school, was constructed consisting of spacious classrooms, a large auditorium/gymnasium and a cafeteria. Over the years, our school has been meticulously maintained, updated, and renovated. Our pride is reflected in every square inch of our school.

Today, we accommodate pre-kindergarten and kindergarten classes, and grades one through eight in a comfortable school with up-to-date technological teaching tools, including iPads and Smart Boards. Thanks to the generosity of our alumni, parents, and community benefactors, we continue to make capital improvements to make the IC better every year.

Throughout the years, the heart of the Immaculate Conception School has always been the profound belief that each child is a special individual created by God and endowed with natural intelligence, curiosity, and a yearning to learn and discover. Some things will never change.
