

From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners.

It is a small detail, and most of us have probably glossed over it in our hearing of today's familiar

Gospel story of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector. But Luke adds in the seemingly little point that the Tax Collector "struck his breast" while he kept his distance and his eyes lowered in his prayer in the Temple area. Maybe we have heard of or seen this ritual gesture from time to time in movies or other dramas—a person taps his chest with a closed fist as a sign of humility or repentance. In Luke's Gospel, however, this gesture takes on a more intense meaning. In the time of Jesus, "striking one's breast" was a gesture particular to women. Men only did this very rarely and in a moment of extreme anguish. And thus the true key to this scene: genuine, heart-felt human sorrow for one's sins and offences before God.

The Pharisee, by definition, saw no need for sorrow or repentance. He had fulfilled the Law as it was understood, tithed on his income, gave to the poor and recited the requisite prayers. For what should he feel sorrow? He hadn't sinned, in his mind. He was, as a Pharisee (or "separated one" as the name means) a model and example to others on how to live out the Torah perfectly, and hence, never to incur sin. A perfect living out of the Law was the path of righteousness.

Justification meant that what was being asked for, would work. In this passage, the Tax Collector was in essence asking that the sacrifice being offered in the Temple would work for him—that his sins would be forgiven, that he could be made whole and clean. The Pharisee, instead, was simply proclaiming (boasting of?) his righteousness before God. He didn't ask God for anything, nor see his own need for any divine help. He walked away filled with self-congratulations, but received nothing from God. He was more separate than he realized. The Tax Collector, on the other hand, got what he dared not even raise his eyes towards Heaven to ask for. His separation from God due to sin was healed and he was once again in communion with the Creator. He was part of God's family once again.

The challenge for us these days is to see our true disposition before God in the light of day. We go to Church, we give to those in need, often quite generously. We say our prayers, even eloquently. We do our best to avoid sin, mortal and venial, the "near occasion of sin," etc.... We are basically good people. Others may even look up to us as pillars of the community and as positive role models for young and old alike.

Just like the Pharisee....

The trouble is, however, that we need to know our need for God in order to benefit from His offer of salvation in Christ. We've been offered forgiveness of our sins as a path to eternal life. But we have to accept that forgiveness in order for the gift to truly become a life-changing, eternity-changing event for us.

So, forgiveness for what?

I dunno...have we prayed enough these days. In case you haven't noticed there is an election coming up next month. Have we really prayed hard enough!? Have we let go of old grudges, slights and insults or do we continue to carry them with us? If we struggle from addictions of any kind, have we made honest and persistent efforts to seek the help of God and others that we might find a path of recovery and healing? If we know someone who struggles with addiction, have we been present to them, to encourage them and offer help? Do we care enough for the environment around us—are we doing our part to conserve water in a drought year, recycle the various materials and goods that we use, reduce our use of electricity and fuel? Have we nurtured the many relationships with others in our lives, or because we are so "busy," have we allowed some of these to grow distant or stagnant? Do we care enough for those in need and work to see ourselves as having a deep and significant connection with all who suffer? When they hurt, do we hurt, or is it just a distant pity? What have we done to improve our place of work, our school system or our community this past year? What more could we do? What more needs to be done? Do we use our gift of speech to build up and affirm others, or do we engage in senseless gossip and fruitless banter? Do we care for our bodies as well as we can—eat right, exercise regularly, get proper rest, etc...? Do we truly reverence others around us and treat them with profound respect as brothers and sisters in the Lord? When faced with challenges and difficulties, do we really find ourselves trusting in God's help, or would we rather have the false security of our own protections and reserves?

And this is, of course, only a very partial list of the many possible ways we can go astray. Do we need God? Would we cry out to the Lord in extreme anguish over our failures? Will we find ourselves justified this day, or simply walk away with a sense of our own accomplishments? We may not need to go around striking ourselves on the breast, but we do need to turn to God and seek the forgiveness that will bring life and liberty to our deepest longings.

May God bless us all in the week ahead.

Professor, Boston College Department of Theology Father Kenneth Himes will speak about The Catholic Voter in a Major Election Year, on Sunday, October 23, 2:00-4:00pm at Our Lady of Hope Church Hall, 1 Pineswamp Rd., Ipswich, MA.

Vatican II's "Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World" encouraged believers to read the "signs of the times" in order to discern where God is to be found in the world and how we are to respond. The electoral season can be read as revealing a number of significant social issues that ought to be considered as Catholic citizens go to the voting booths.

Father Himes is a well-known writer and speaker whose 2012 presentation before our group, "Being a Responsible Catholic Voter" was outstanding. He also served as a mentor to our planning committee for many years.

Pelican Intervention Fund

"Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love." Mother Teresa

Thanks to your continued generosity, support, and prayers The Pelican Intervention Fund is thriving and able to fulfill its mission.

Our mission is to provide funding for residential Twelve Step-based programs for economically challenged adult men and women struggling with heroin and other addictive substances and living in Amesbury, Byfield, Groveland, Merrimac, Newbury, Newburyport, Rowley, Salisbury and West Newbury. Since its founding by Steve and Kim Keene and Elizabeth McCarthy in November 2015, The Pelican Intervention Fund has raised about \$45,000 and placed four clients in structured Twelve Step-based sober living residency for a six month stay. We function as a fund of Essex County Community Foundation.

In September, we were able to place two men in a sober living house after they completed a 28-day treatment program at Essex County Correctional Facility in Middleton, MA. Working with Sheriff Frank Cousins' department we were able to fund sober living residency that will continue to support these men's recovery from addiction, foster emotional sobriety, and prepare them with the skills and tools needed for reentry into the community. In our effort to spread our mission of hope and raise funds in the past few months we have reached out to local police departments, schools, city, county, and state officials, churches and synagogues, businesses, other community-based organizations, and individuals within our service area.

During the summer we also continued to seek out sound, effective, sober living communities that are local and others at a distance both within and outside Massachusetts. Before utilizing these houses we conduct a personal visit to review their facilities, discuss their philosophy and structure and we speak with the staff and residents. Recent summer fundraising activities included: Raffling goods donated by local merchants at the Vintage Bazaar, receiving donations from meals at Not Your Average Joe's during August, running a 50-50 raffle at Pettingill Farms, and most recently the pancake breakfast at Nativity. Thank you! With the generous response of our communities we raised approximately \$6, 600 during the summer.

We also had a presence during Yankee Homecoming and shared our mission at the non-profit booth and by participating in the Bed Race. In Amesbury we shared our mission at the annual Chili Fest.

We ask for your continued support and prayers and encourage you to join us as we continue to fulfill our mission. Again many thanks.


