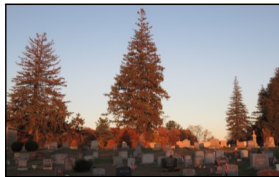

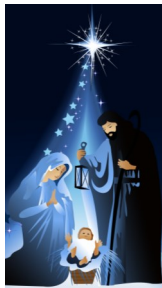

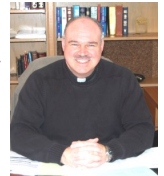

## From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,



He must have been horribly confused. Deeply hurt by the news that Mary, his betrothed, was with child, Joseph certainly never “saw this one coming.” Everything he knew about Mary would have led him to believe that she was as honest, innocent, and pure as anyone who ever lived. Even more so, he must have thought. But the awful, terrible news that she was pregnant by another was troubling and profoundly unexpected. And yet, Joseph was a righteous man. Even if Mary had somehow faltered, he would not do anything to harm the one he had planned to marry and spend the rest of his life with. He was honorable in every sense of the term, and would divorce or break-off the engagement quietly, so Mary would not be shamed by him. He couldn't do anything to change the pregnancy, but he would not be the one to call down shame on her. He was innocent in all of this chaos, and he wanted no part of any revenge or redress.

And then came the sheer terror of an Angel coming to him in his dreams. All of us, from time to time, have an occasional dream that is more vivid than others. Perhaps it lingers a bit longer before receding into the ether of our unconsciousness, leaving only a few scattered feelings or images behind. But this dream was different. It was vibrant, bright, shockingly clear and lasting. And it was terrifying in every way a dream could ever be: it spoke to an alternate reality that Joseph had never considered possible, namely, that it was through God's hand that Mary had become pregnant and would bear a son. The Angel's voice was as confident as it was authoritative. The marriage was on. Mary would become Joseph's wife. And she would bring a son into this world. And the child was from some...One else. And He was destined for a greatness that seemed so unreal, yet so compellingly attractive. He would set His people free from their sins! What could that mean? And how can this be? And what will be asked of Mary and himself in the time ahead?

I felt the picture on the cover of this week's bulletin captured this supreme emotional turmoil in Joseph perfectly. Most religious art over the years casts Joseph in this stoic, almost serene state as he gazes lovingly on Mary and Jesus in the manger. It is classic holiday fare. Yet the reality of what this guileless saint endured must have been far more messy and undetermined than any Hallmark image could convey. Our saints were real, flesh and blood people who faced doubts and uncertainties as much as anyone of us ever did. What makes them holy is that they found a way, sometimes by the skin of their teeth, to stay faithful to God and what they believed to be right and just despite the many odds arrayed against them. At the end of the day, we don't know very much about Joseph. We know he was from “the House of David” and was a distant ancestor of the great King from many centuries before. He was an artisan or craftsman—a carpenter, if you will. He

worked for a living, but likely made little more than was needed for basic subsistence. He lived in Nazareth, but had roots in Bethlehem. He was a faithful Jew and likely made the expected pilgrimages to Jerusalem for the required feasts and religious observances. He likely died at what was a normal age for most men of his time, probably in his late 40s and before Jesus began his earthly ministry. And that is about it.... Along with the fact that he said yes to what God was asking of him through the Angel's words.

In our modern day, holiness and faithfulness are often nothing more than a willingness to say yes to what God is asking of us. Most of the time this happens without the extraordinary intervention of an Angel. Most of the time what is asked of us does not even come close to embracing the realities of a divinely-initiated virgin-birth. Most of the time God simply asks us to forgive the one who hurts or offends us, to comfort the one who is ill, visit the one who is lonely, listen to the one who is speaking, welcome the stranger, feed the one who is hungry, offer compassion to the one who is misunderstood, reach out to the one who is neglected, stand up for the one who is at a disadvantage, speak up for justice when it is lacking and try and bring about peace in the midst of conflict. Most of the time these aren't even terribly difficult things to accomplish. But they will stand out against the backdrop of sin and hatred, of mistrust and division. When we live our lives in the moment with simplicity and integrity, we can make real the same gentle love that Joseph brought to bear for Mary, Jesus and the new life they ushered into our world. God can work with and through our simple acts of faithfulness and love. As we anticipate this coming week our many individual Christmas celebrations, may we call upon the Universal Patron of the Church and Protector of Families for his prayers for us all.

I would like to extend a warm invitation to everyone to join us for our Christmas Masses in the days ahead. Please reach out to your extended family members, to neighbors, friends, and even perfect strangers and invite them to come and celebrate the Savior's birth. All are welcome!

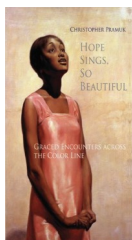

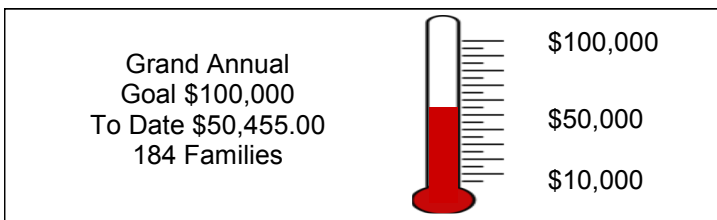

### IC Haiti Second Collection This Weekend

This weekend is IC Haiti's final second collection of the year. We are so appreciative of the generosity that our parish showed during our drive for hurricane relief last month. As a result of your contributions, our community has contributed \$30,000 to the distribution of thousands of oral cholera vaccines and water purification kits, stemming the tide of this terrible disease in the Puit Chacha and surrounding community.

Now we must ask you again for your contributions, as we go back to the usual work of funding the Fr. Marc Piché school. We cannot fall behind on our efforts to support the school and the feeding program. As food prices rise—and the results of the destroyed crops become more severe—it is critical that we keep providing the shelter and consistency that the school and daily meal provide. This is often the only meal that children in the school receive—and it offers desperately critical support to families without secure food supplies.

The Fr. Marc Piché school has provided shelter, comfort, and hope to the families of Puit Chacha since it's opening. During the hurricane it was a primary source of security for the entire community. Our parish community is making a real difference in Haiti and every donation counts. In the last year, IC Haiti's administrative costs amounted to less than .3%, so almost every penny of your contribution goes directly to benefit the people we serve. Thank you!
