From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Last weekend's bulletin had already gone to print when the terrible news came of yet another mass-shooting in our country. This time, it was from a high school in Florida.



Like all of you, I have given much thought and prayer about these maddening and repeated episodes of senseless violence. It haunts my head and confounds my heart more than I would like to admit. Looking out on your faces this past week at mass, I know you feel this pain too. While we certainly think about these events and dutifully pray for the victims, their families, and community, the standard response of offering our "thoughts and prayers" doesn't cut it anymore. Not if we stop there. Not if using our God-given gift of intellect doesn't spur us to some thoughtful, concrete actions that might prevent these senseless acts of violence. Not if, in dialogue with our God in prayer, we simply resign ourselves to more of the same, that nothing can be done.

I do not believe that, with God's help and engaging the best and brightest among us, that we are impotent before this manifestation of evil. And let's call this for what it is: evil. Classically, evil is defined as "a privation of created goodness." It is a taking away of the goodness that God created in our world, a destruction of the divine harmony that ought to exist through an expression of God's will. We need look no further than the faces of those whose lives were cut short to see the goodness that was removed from our world. Their voices that might cry out for justice have been cut short. Ours have not. We owe it to them and to all of the victims of these crimes to find a path of healing and prevention. We are not slaves to this evil! Jesus Christ died on the cross to buy our freedom. We can do better.

I think the first thing we need to admit in looking at some kind of response to these incidents is that there are no quick or easy answers. There is no one, fast, feel-good solution that will suddenly bring these outbursts of violence to an immediate end. Disbanding the NRA, shaming our elected leaders for failing to pass a certain law or banning a particular model of gun will not make these massacres stop. I say this because I do not believe that we are dealing with one, particular evil that must be confronted, but rather a concert of evils—some obvious, some quite subtle—that are all working together to produce the carnage we rightly abhor.

On a national level, here are the major players, as I see them, in this evil symphony:

- ⇒ Too easy access to high-powered, rapid-fire weapons with large capacity magazines.
- ⇒ Poor or limited access to mental health services that have been inadequately funded along with a profound misunderstanding of those with mental illness.
- ⇒ A lack of coordinated background screening between various agencies for those who seek firearms.
- ⇒ A general breakdown for the respect and dignity of human life in our culture.
- ⇒ An embedded persistence of racism, hatred, and mistrust in our culture.
- ⇒ A general breakdown or reduction in the importance of the family as a central unit for care and nurturing.
- ⇒ A glorification and normalization of gun violence in the entertainment and gaming media.
- ⇒ A decrease in the care and attention people give to making room for God in their daily lives.

In sharing some of my thoughts with local clergy from other traditions this week, one of our local ministers in another church added "a distorted vision of masculinity" to the list above, citing the recurrence of these events as perpetrated by all male-shooters. Combined, I think and believe that it is the mix of all of the above that bring about what we see far too frequently in the news today.

In Massachusetts, we have addressed the first issue reasonably well by banning "assault rifles" and large capacity magazines. We have some of the toughest and most effective gun laws in the nation that mostly seem to be working. But many places do not. Although we have some of the best mental healthcare facilities in the country, there is much work that can be done to make access to these services more broadly funded and available. But, as a society, we have done little to address the rest, even though I know we all work very hard every week at bring God's love to others in our communities.

I think the path forward to first a reduction, then an eventual elimination of mass-shootings in our society is to take the long view and work at confronting, changing, and improving each of these individual pieces at opportune moments, without loosing the bigger picture. As Christians, we must be the bearers of hope that with God, all things are possible. As citizens, I think we can effectively support, piece by piece, the needed change of heart, laws, and policies that will over time make these painful incidents part of our history, not our present.

That much said, how ought we proceed?

Another local clergy member, reflecting on the Book of Nehemiah, pointed-out that after weeping, repenting, and seeking God in prayer, Nehemiah shared the vision of a restored holy city for God's people and then provided a way for each person and family to rebuild the part of the wall of Jerusalem that was nearest their house and focus of interest. They did this together, and each one had a personal, vested interested in seeking the common good. Individually, this task would have been overwhelming. Taken piece-by-piece and section-by-section, it was accomplished together as a community with God's blessing.

We have done enough weeping. It is time to repent for our inaction, seek God's blessing through our prayer and get to work to make our nation's schools, shopping malls, concert venues, night clubs, stores, places of work, and wherever people gather safe for all.

So, how can you see yourself engaging one of the issues listed above? What hasn't been said that still needs to be brought to light? What one thing will you do?


STEM activities provide essential hands on learning opportunities and are a favorite of students in all grades.



First grade students recently collaborated to research and create 3-D animals and their habitats, each publishing a digital book of facts with illustrations. Grade 2 students have studied birds in depth. They built owl houses, dissected owl pellets, and are currently researching birds in a variety of countries. Students in grades 3

and 4 have been coding with "ozobots," which are mini robots that are programmed using color language. By using markers to draw lines in a specific color sequence, students program the robots to turn successfully through a maze at various speeds. Our Junior High students are embarking on their biggest project of the year for the Learning Fair. Science projects require an experiment, lab report, and

presentation, plus a correlating research paper for Language Arts. Throughout all of the grades, students are using a multitude of skills and thinking processes to complete STEM challenges.

Love and pregnancy In #170: Scientific advances today allow us to know beforehand what color a child's hair will be or what illnesses they may one day suffer, because all the somatic traits of the person are written in his or her genetic code already in the embryonic stage. Yet only the Father, the Creator, fully knows the child; he alone knows his or her deepest identity and worth. Expectant mothers need to ask God for the wisdom fully to know their children and to accept them as they are. Some parents feel that their child is not coming at the best time. They should ask the Lord to heal and strengthen them to accept their child fully and wholeheartedly. It is important for that child to feel wanted. He or she is not an accessory or a solution to some personal need. A child is a human being of immense worth and may never be used for one's own benefit. So it matters little whether this new life is convenient for you, whether it has features that please you, or whether it fits into your plans and aspirations. For "children are a gift. Each one is unique and irreplaceable....We love our children because they are children, not because they are beautiful, or look or think as we do, or embody our dreams. We love them because they are children. A child is a child." The love of parents is the means by which God our Father shows his own love. He awaits the birth of each child, accepts that child unconditionally, and welcomes him or her freely.
