

## From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,



In the Gospel passage we encounter for Easter Sunday, there is a curious line that reads, "For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he *had* to rise from the dead." (Jn 20:9). When we see the phrase, "had to do something," it implies that there was an obligation or compulsion. For example, I have to file my taxes by April 17th (an obligation...with apologies for the reminder!) or I had to stop and get something to eat because I was starving (a compulsion). We don't often think of Jesus as "having to do something." A quick look at the Gospel stories shows many instances where He was getting Himself in all kinds of trouble for failing to follow social norms and religious "obligations." He associated with those whom He was supposed to shun, cured people and performed miracles on days when any kind of work (including healing) was not supposed to happen, and He was often deft at maneuvering between two opposing obligations, satisfying neither. A great example of this is found in His dealings with "the woman caught in the very act of adultery." (See Jn 8:1-11)

But under the surface of all of this seeming disregard of Jesus for laws, customs, and obligations lies a profound reverence and respect for His Father's will. Jesus lives, breathes, and is completely about following His Father's will in everything and at every moment of His life. It led Him to cut across social norms, confront religious and civil authorities, and even cast out demons. It called Him to walk on water, move through an angry mob unharmed, and prompted Him to travel from desert to city again and again, sometimes for reasons that were known only to God. No one could quite figure it out. Following His Father's will defied mere human reason. In John's account of the raising of Lazarus, He said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea." The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just trying to stone you, and you want to go back there? (Jn 11:7-8). But no human protestations would deter Him from doing what He believed was His Father's will, not even embracing the agony of the Cross. Recall the scene from what is known as the "agony in the garden:" "Father, if you are willing, take this cup away from me; still, not my will but yours be done." (Lk 22:42)

Was Jesus forced to do His Father's will? Was it something that He had no choice in? No. In His humanity, like all of


### What is a Collaborative?

"A collaborative has one pastor, one set of assigned priests and deacons, and one Pastoral Team (including Pastoral Associates, Religious Education and Faith Formation leaders, Finance and Operations specialists, and administrative and facilities personnel). All of these work together for all of the parishes of the collaborative. The collaborative has one Pastoral Council, and one Local Pastoral Plan for evangelization. us, Jesus had perfect and complete free will. He could freely choose to follow what God was asking of Him, or He could have said no and done something else. But He didn't. Like eating, sleeping, and breathing, Jesus felt passionately compelled to follow His Father's will because doing so allowed Him to truly live. He couldn't have imagined doing otherwise. He was so focused on pleasing His Father in all things, it was the most life-giving obsession anyone could ever have. Because just as following His Father's will led Him to sacrifice His life on the cross, His Father's will also was that He should rise from the dead. So, He "had to" rise from the dead as a fulfillment of everything that came before. Resurrection was the absolute mandate of the Father's will. Jesus would not have stayed dead, even if He wanted to. The Father's will was for Him to rise and live.

And this is where the Easter joy comes in for all of us. Jesus died and rose from the dead not simply for His own sake, but because the Father willed that through the sacrifice of His only Son, we, too, should have hope for our own resurrection. Because of what Jesus Christ has done in perfect obedience to the Father, we "have to" rise from the dead as well. It is not an option. We can't stay dead, even if we want to. Resurrection is our absolute destiny in Christ. We rise to be judged—to enter into the Father's joy if we have been faithful, or we rise to be condemned if we have utterly turned our hearts away from His love. But we will rise! And we have been assured of God's mercy and compassion. So, we rise to meet a loving Father in hope and confidence that what God has seen and loved in Christ, God will see and love in us as well. Viewed in this light, all of our earthly obligations take on a new perspective: how do we follow our Heavenly Father's will through them? What do we "have to do" today to be faithful disciples of the Lord, to effectively share God's love and mercy with others?

Jesus was consumed and compelled by His love for His Father. May we also be so obsessed!

### Scripture Study Meets April 8 Note Schedule Change



Father Broderick's Scripture Study will **not** meet on the regular scheduled first Sunday of the month, Easter Sunday, but will meet on Sunday, April 8, at 2:00pm in the IC Nazareth Library Room 205. This would be an ideal time for members of the Collaborative to join the study group as we will read and discuss Chapters 5-8 in St. Paul's *Epistle to the Romans*. This letter was probably written in Corinth several years prior to Paul's arduous actual voyage to Rome as a prisoner. This is Paul's longest letter and is widely considered to be his masterpiece.

Our beloved teacher, Father Broderick, not only explains the meaning of the Scripture passages, but also presents rich description of the period and places cited, as well as the culture and practices of the people involved. He connects the events in the New Testament to Old Testament prophecies and events, as well as to our own time. This is a worthwhile way to spend an hour and fifteen minutes on a Sunday afternoon. All are invited to attend these sessions and grow in knowledge and faith.



## Welcome to Holy Redeemer

Holy Redeemer is comprised of two churches: Church of the Nativity in Merrimac and St. Ann Church in West Newbury. We are part of the Holy Redeemer/Immaculate Conception Collaborative. 

*Amoris Laetitia...Pope Francis*

Pope Francis released the Exhortation on the Family. We continue to review the various statements from the Holy Father.

**The love of a mother and a father:** In #177: God sets the father in the family so that by the gifts of his masculinity he can be "close to his wife and share everything, joy and sorrow, hope and hardship. And to be close to his children as they grow—when they play and when they work, when they are carefree and when they are distressed, when they are talkative and when they are silent, when they are daring and when they are afraid, when they stray and when they get back on the right path. To be a father who is always present. When I say 'present,' I do not mean 'controlling.' Fathers who are too controlling overshadow their children, they don't let them develop." Some fathers feel they are useless or unnecessary, but the fact is that "children need to find a father waiting for them when they return home with their problems. They may try hard not to admit it, not to show it, but they need it." It is not good for children to lack a father and to grow up before they are ready.
