

From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners.

Sometimes from our perch of two thousand years-worth of theological reflection and prayer, we can be tempted to acknowledge the Resurrection of the Lord with a nod and a shrug, not realizing the incredible faith journey it took the



early disciples to fully realize what had happened on that first Easter morning and what it all would mean for everyone who would follow. The empty tomb was puzzling. Although they may have recalled something that Jesus had mentioned about "rising from the dead," Him actually accomplishing it was a whole different matter! Was the tomb empty simply because someone had stolen his body, or did it mean something else? How do you know the difference? Who do you believe?

St. Thomas and his protestations occupy the guintessential place in the heart of many struggling believers—we want proof beyond that of mere words. There is a part of many of us that wants something more than cryptic stories from bewildered disciples overcome with joy in the midst of their sorrow and fear. While there might have been some verifiable certainty if there were numerous, identical accounts of crowds of people holding vigil at Christ's tomb in the wee hours of the morning, who saw the stone rolled back by an angel and the resurrected Jesus come strolling out of the tomb, much like the Lazarus event some weeks before, maybe even a few pagan historians like Josephus could have been around for the event to give an objective, third-party witness to the whole thing...in fact there were no human witnesses at all to this most central event in human history. At most, there were a few nearby guards who were sound asleep when the greatest miracle of all time occurred. How then, are we to really believe that this actually happened? Suddenly, the idea of putting our fingers in the nail-marks and our hand into Jesus' side doesn't seem like asking too much. If Jesus really did come back to life, is it too much to ask for a little proof? After all, we are asked to follow him completely with our own lives, something that has led hundreds of thousands, maybe even millions of Christians to their own deaths over the millennia. It'd sure be nice to have a little proof that this was all real.

But here lies the crux of it all, if you will allow the pun. Belief is not about what we can see and prove, it is first and foremost a gift from God. "Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen." (Hebrews 11:1) Realization and evidence are not the same as cold, scientific proof. This gift of God is made manifest through the lives of the believers, in community. It is seen by their actions. If there ever was hard-core proof of the Resurrection, it is found in the bold and confident way the disciples lived their lives following Jesus' death. Instead of hiding in fear of the same religious and civil authorities who

conspired to have their Lord put to death, they would be found out in the Temple area, in the synagogues, preaching and teaching about the Risen Lord, as if they had just been with Him moments before. They knew Him intimately in the present moment, not only from some fuzzy, distant memory of the past. He was alive in and through their teaching and preaching. They discovered that every time they gathered to tell and re-tell the special stories about Him, every time they broke bread and shared a cup together, just like He told them to do, He was present in a new and life-changing way in their midst. Take the time to read Luke's "Road to Emmaus" account, to see a concise example of this. (Lk 24:13-35) Many scholars consider this to be an example of an early Christian liturgy. If you take a closer look, all the elements of Eucharist are there: gathering, story-telling, breaking bread, and sending. The transformative effect of the encounter is clear: the disciples go from being downcast to having their "hearts burning from within." They are redirected from escaping the pain and loss of Jerusalem to running back there intentionally, unafraid of the dark or any danger that may await them. Fear and despair are converted into hope and joy. All this, from encountering the Risen Lord in the breaking of the bread. Eucharist, then, becomes the very source of their faith-life, and the only proof they need that Jesus is indeed alive, that He has truly risen.

Have you ever thought of Mass in those terms? Every week, we offer a minimum of 12 Masses in our Collaborative, often many more than that when weddings, funerals, school liturgies, and Ultreyas are added into the mix. We gather each week, like clockwork, to "take and eat, take and drink...do this in memory of me." We do this so often because Mass is the primary place where we find our faith strengthened, where we encounter not "proof" of the resurrection, but evidence that God is alive and well in our community of believers: a realization that there truly is hope of healing and life from the Lord. It's not finger-poking and hand-sticking, but it is a real experience of the present-day action of the resurrected Christ among us.

When the guestions and doubts of the empty tomb get to be a bit too much, come to Eucharist and experience the living faith of our sisters and brothers. In word and gesture, in song and prayer, you will discover new life.

Our beloved teacher, Father Broderick, not only explains the meaning of the Scripture passages, but also presents rich description of the period and places cited, as well as the culture and practices of the people involved. He connects the events in the New Testament to Old Testament prophecies and events, as well as to our own time. This is a worthwhile way to spend an hour and fifteen minutes on a Sunday afternoon. All are invited to attend these sessions and grow in knowledge and faith.

Exposition of Sacred Relics

Today, April 8, 3:15 p.m. St. Mary's Church, 202 Main Street, Rowley

Visit a teaching and exposition of Sacred Relics. Over 150 relics will be on display, some as old as 2,000 years. Among the treasures will be relics of St. Paul, St. Teresa of Avila, St. Maria Goretti, St. Therese of Lisieux, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Anthony of Padua, St. Thomas of Aquinas, and St. Faustina Kowalska, and a piece of a veil which is believed to have belonged to Our Lady and one of the largest remaining pieces of the True Cross in the world.

The veneration of relics is a communion with the heroes of our Christian faith, asking for their powerful intercession. Many people have reported blessings and conversions through the veneration of relics, and many have reported healings. Attendees are encouraged to bring their articles of devotion (rosaries, holy cards, etc.) and pictures of ill friends or family members to touch to the reliquaries as a means of intercessory prayer. Divine Mercy Sunday Devotions

Divine Mercy Sunday is today, April 8

In 1931, Jesus appeared to a young Polish nun, Sister Faustina Kowalska, and told her that she was going to prepare the world for His Second Coming and that He wanted the first Sunday after Easter to be established as the Feast of Mercy where He would be pouring out His mercy like a "whole ocean of graces."

Sister Faustina, now St. Faustina, reported seeing a merciful Jesus, with beams of red and white light shining from his heart. Jesus promised that "The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain the complete forgiveness of sins and punishment." (Diary 699).

Pope John Paul II established that Feast of Mercy during the Jubilee Year 2000, saying that he had fulfilled the will of Christ.


Immaculate Conception School
