## From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners.

A priest-friend of mine once said, "there is nothing more Eucharistic than a good meal." When we stop and look at what the pinnacle of our liturgical celebrations encompasses, at the heart of what we do are all the elements of a special, nourishing meal.



We gather with family and friends. The love and friendship which endures is strengthened, the bonds between us are recalled. We tell stories, sometimes the same ones, over and over again. Many times, we do not tire of these oft-told tales, because they have become part of our identity and "our story." And we share food and drink. There is festivity in the air! Joy oozes from our celebration and we realize, at least implicitly, that we are being nourished on deeper levels, with the gifts of love and gratitude. Our emotional and spiritual health are strengthened through these encounters. And then, we go back out into the world to share with others what has given us such great satisfaction. A proper meal is not an end unto itself, but, rather, "missions" us to bring something of that blessing back into our places of work, our schools and amongst our neighbors. Realizing how blessed we are, we want to share with those less fortunate than ourselves. Would that everyone could experience the unadulterated joy of this special meal, done well!

This weekend, I am struck by the line in the Gospel, "There was a rich man... who dined sumptuously each day." What a great, descriptive word! A quick definition invites us to consider a splendid and expensive daily culinary experience, achieving regularly and consistently what many of us only very occasionally partake of. Most days, I use paper napkins and rely on a small microwave oven to re-heat things from the freezer. I may not dine sumptuously, but I usually eat well enough. But those special moments with family and friends do stand out and call me to appreciate and be grateful for the many blessings that God has given.

This Gospel, however, challenges us not to feel guilty for what we have, but to realize that in Christ, we are called to see our world in greater depth. The rich man in today's story was not a bad or hateful person. He was not breathing murderous threats. He was not frothing at the bit. His head didn't spin in circles. There was no exorcism to be performed here. He didn't kick Lazarus in the shin and spit on him when he walked by each day. In all likelihood, he was a kind and generous man who tithed and gave to the local synagogue. His sin, his deficit, if you will, was that he didn't really "see" Lazarus. He didn't see himself as being in relationship with him. Lazarus was part of the background—a constant neediness that was an unfortunate feature of the world around. The rich man didn't see how he could make a difference.

Making a difference is something that I think we all crave. We want our efforts to matter, our outreach to be effective, our sacrifices to be appreciated. We want the things that we do for others to change the world for the better. Lazarus

just sat and begged. Undoubtedly, the rich man must have given him some tithes from time to time, but nothing seemed to change. He kept begging. Alms kept being given. What difference did it make? What positive change did it bring about? Was it worth the effort?

But the point here is about seeing ourselves in relationship with those who are in need around us. Not because we are going to come up with some magic bullet to cure their condition, but because God loves them. And because we love God, we must love our neighbor. Nowhere does it say in the Scripture that we have to fix all of our neighbor's problems. But is it clear that we cannot ignore them or dare not to see them. I recall a meeting I had in downtown Boston a few years ago. As I was approaching one of the big office buildings, I witnessed a man in a business suit literally step over a homeless woman who had fallen asleep (was drunk and passed out?) on the sidewalk across the street. He never even lost his stride. Apparently this was such a common occurrence there was not even a question as to whether this woman needed help or medical assistance. Her name was Lazarus....

I have gone into many nursing homes over the years, and in my quest to find a particular resident whom I have been asked to visit or anoint or bring communion to, inevitably I have to run a gauntlet of other residents who have been wheeled out into the hallway, presumably to give them a little social time or change of view. They call to me, sometimes tugging at my jacket as I try to work my way down the hallway. Their names are Lazarus....

Not too long ago, I was walking down a city sidewalk in the early hours of the morning. A short, stocky man was lumbering towards me, his head bowed down. He had the darker complexion and attire of someone who was from somewhere else, an immigrant from Central America, perhaps. His demeanor was conveying his supreme effort to melt into the sidewalk and blend with the concrete. He didn't want to engage me in any way. When I took a risk and offered a gentle "Hola" as we passed each other, I was rewarded with a delightful, shocked look of recognition and a toothy smile. A connection made! He nodded and continued on his way. His name was Lazarus.

You see, Jesus told us the poor and needy would always be with us. He wasn't kidding. Their names are Lazarus, and they permeate our lives, if we dare to notice, dare to care. Our Eucharistic meals, whether held in a worship space or the smaller Eucharistic gatherings we enjoy in our homes or out in restaurants, challenge us to name and recognize our relationship to the many Lazaruses who pepper the landscape of our daily lives. It might require nothing more than a smile, a nod or a halting word in Spanish. It might mean no more than a moment of our time to touch a shaky hand or offer a little food or water. For we who are so blessed, it might demand sharing such a tiny percentage of the great joy that we celebrate in a great meal. But when it is the joy that comes from encountering the real presence of the Lord at our table festivities, that is enough to satiate the many multitudes who lie in wait. If only we would see them....

There is nothing more Eucharistic than a good meal, and I would add: nothing more satisfying than to discover a way to share it with others. Want to really make a difference in this world? Seeing Lazarus will show you how. Because the difference we would make is not to be measured by mere human standards but by God's.

May The Lord bless us all in the weeks ahead.

#### **Scripture Study Will Meet on October 2**

Father Broderick's Scripture Study will meet on its regular first Sunday of the month on October 2 at 2:00pm in the IC Nazareth Library Room 205. We will be reading and discussing Chapters 50 through 54 in *The Book of Isaiah* in the section known as The Book of Consolation, The selected chapters are included in Part 2 of this section, which is entitled *The Expiation of Sin, Spiritual Liberation of Israel.* The Book of Consolation is generally attributed to an anonymous poet who prophesied toward the end of the Babylonian exile and contains the great messianic oracles known as the Suffering Servant songs.

Our beloved teacher, Father Broderick, not only explains the meaning of the Scripture passages, but also presents rich description of the period and places cited, as well as the culture and practices of the people involved. He connects the events in the New Testament to Old Testament prophecies and events, as well as to our own time. This is a worthwhile way to spend an hour and fifteen minutes on a Sunday afternoon. All are invited to attend these sessions and grow in knowledge and faith!

## Thank You from Father Ray

I would like to express my thanks to the priests here at Immaculate Conception parish. They make me feel very welcome and a part of this parish. To each of you, Fr. George, Fr. Tim, Fr. Bill, and Fr. Jim thank you very much. I look forward to being with you next year, God willing.

And again this year I am impressed and very thankful for your generosity toward the Parish of Our Lady of Lourdes in a city of 350,000 called Choloma in Honduras. For the last eight years now I have had the joy of helping to attend this parish with two other Capuchin priests, Andres and Stanislos. Your contribution really helps us better attend this very large parish of 150,000 poor, hard working factory workers that come to church by foot, bicycle, or motor cycle. Our parish office and our continuous parish visits let us see and try to attend to many poor and sick of all ages. In our parish clinic we have a good doctor and medicines given free in some cases or sold at accessible prices for them.

The legal assistance program is available to the poor who often cannot pay for the legal processes they need.

The parish television channel, "Cristo TV," extends our evangelization work to the whole parish and hundreds of thousands more people outside of the parish territory 24 hours a day through 5 cable systems. It is a marvelous aid to Catholic evangelization that always is economically hard to keep afloat, nevertheless very much worth the sacrifice.

Three weeks before I came home for vacation, I was in a section of the parish that is called San Antonio Chaparro to celebrate their monthly Mass. The Delegate of the Word of God, Ivan Cerrato, spiritual leader of the parish in that poor neighborhood, told me he couldn't remember what was the name of my home parish that has been helping in the construction of their small chapel for the last six years. It was because he wanted to lead his community in prayer in thanks for the seed money they have received from Immaculate Conception in various occasions during the construction work.

I would also like to speak of the project of 20 small scale coffee growers in San Marcos parish. This project started more than 10 years ago and still continues to produce very fine coffee and continues to help a the small scale coffee growers that have been very committed to the evangelization of the parish of San Marcos for many years. From the contact that I had with a couple of them through the year I have been assured that the original purposes of this effort is still being fulfilled. We must remember that these families are economically poor and own very little land. In the parish council of San Marcos at that time we saw that with the poverty of these families they would

always have very little land and could always only produce a small quantity of coffee. In that case, in order to achieve a positive economic impact for the families the quality of the coffee would have to be much improved. Another problem would be to not sell their coffee to the "coyotes." The coyotes are people that go around the mountains where the small coffee growers live and they buy the coffee at a very low price. They can do this because the little coffee growers cannot deliver their own coffee to the large buyers in the big cities and consequently earn very little despite a lot of hard work. The coyotes earn comparatively a lot for little work. Just imagine! Our coffee project has freed this group of poor, small scale coffee growers from a band of vicious coyotes!

And so the primary purpose was and continues to be to help this group of committed evangelizers in the parish of San Marcos to better the economic situation of their families and also be able to afford a better education for their children. And of course the second goal always has been to produce a high quality coffee that they could be proud of, that their self esteem would grow and that they would receive a fair price for their efforts.

So, I would like to thank you for continuing to support this project and I hope you can always continue to enjoy some of the best coffee in the world. God bless you!


