A Word from the Pastor

At the great Vigil of Easter this year, we welcomed 10 new members, five through Baptism and five through Reception into Full Communion. These new members saw something in the Catholic way of living Christianity that they wanted to share. So what is unique about our Catholic way of life that drew our new members—and keeps all of us attached to the Church? The obvious answer is "the Truth," present in the Catholic Church. But I think there are three unique elements in our Catholic Tradition that give us life and inspiration: 1) something we call the "Catholic imagination," 2) the importance of the common good, and 3) an appreciation of joy, humor and laughter in the spiritual life. Just a word on each.

The notion of a "Catholic Imagination" originates in a book by Father David Tracy, The Analogical Imagination (1998). Tracy explores the Catholic idea that there is an *analogy* between the human and the divine-that God is close to us and can be experienced in nature, art, and symbol. By contrast, classical Protestantism has a *dialectical* imagination. God is more transcendent than immanent, and created things can in no way reflect the divine. Given this, our Catholic theology is grounded in the Incarnation, that God became a human person-Emmanuel, "God with us." Classical Protestantism emphasizes Redemption over Incarnation, that God is distant, that human nature is fallen and corrupt, and that creation cannot image the divine. To see the difference, just look at the interior of a Catholic church in comparison with a Baptist church. Beauty is our portal into the transcendent-and our beautiful Cathedral reflects this.

The "common good" is fundamental to our Catholic Tradition. Our Pilgrim forebears brought with them distinctive ideas about society, about individuals within that society, and about the role of government vis-à-vis its citizens. Among these ideas was a notion of individual autonomy—a freedom, we might say, unfettered by the restraints of communal responsibility. Such a notion arose out of the Enlightenment, and it found fertile soil in our American experiment. Our Catholics roots indicate that we have a particular responsibility to promote the ideals of solidarity and the common good. Our Catholic cultural and spiritual tradition emphasizes sacramentality, solidarity, and communion. These words of St. Paul come to mind: "Do nothing out of selfishness or out of vainglory; rather, humbly regard others as more important than yourselves" (Phil 2:3).

Finally, joy, humor, and laughter in the spiritual life. Catholicism was born in the Mediterranean sun. We have saints like St. Philip Neri, whose playful humor and sharp wit won more converts than any fiery sermon of Jonathan Edwards. And St. Francis de Sales, whose preaching admonition could become the battle cry of the new evangelization: "A spoonful of honey attracts more flies than a barrelful of vinegar." That's the faith that I love. That is our Catholic faith—and "we are proud to profess it in Christ Jesus our Lord."
