A Word from the Pastor

Today, the first Sunday of Advent, we begin the Advent liturgical season. Many people would call this season their favorite: it lasts only four weeks, it looks ahead to Christmas, it is quiet, watchful, inspiring, and filled with anticipation. Central to Advent is a feeling of hope, that despite the darkness of the season, a shining light awaits us: "The people who sit in darkness have seen a great light; on those dwelling in a land overshadowed by death, light has arisen" (Mt 4:16).

Advent is a time to hope for something not only good but great. Think big: not just a better world but a new world, not just greater prosperity but freedom from all want, not just a world without war but a world with the fullness of peace, not just self-improvement but an entirely new existence. Advent is a time to await the Messiah, who will usher in a new age of harmony, peace, and reconciliation—between God and humanity, among people of all nations, and with nature itself. "Behold, now is an acceptable time; now is the day of salvation" (2 Cor 6:2).

The beautiful prophecies we read from the Old Testament set the stage for our longing and anticipation—with one big difference: our hopes have been fulfilled! Jesus has come in history, planting the seed of God's Kingdom and promising a future that will restore Eden itself. This Jesus also tells us that God is not far from us, that God loves all of us, that God wishes to be one with us in the Incarnation. The joy of this revelation marks both the Advent and the Christmas seasons. Is it any wonder we love this time?

The Church teaches that Advent has a two-fold character. First, it is a time of preparation for the solemnities of Christmas, in which the first coming of the Son of God is remembered and celebrated. Likewise, Advent is a time for our minds and hearts to look forward with joy to Christ's second coming at the end of time. We live "in between" the first and second comings, a time of prayer and expectation for the arrival of our great King. For this reason, Advent also takes on a penitential character, to "prepare the way of the Lord," knocking down the mountains and filling in the valleys, removing all obstacles that keep us from God and God from us. In light of this, the Church asks us to be mindful of the season, wearing purple vestments at Mass and keeping the music and decorations moderate in preparation from the Child who was born in a stable. Such preparation makes Christmas all the more grand, with its bright lights, joyous music, floral displays, and beautiful nativity scenes.

At St. Mary's Cathedral, we will have on display (partially during Advent) our own beautiful hand-carved nativity scene, the work of Albl Oberammergau in Germany, bought with the donations of so many of our parishioners. And, of course, we will have our large Advent Wreath to mark the four weeks before Christmas. May God bless us during this holy season!

Worship & Prayer & Faith Formation

The Advent Reconciliation Service: We are invited to make our confession in preparation for Christmas at the Advent Reconciliation Service on Tuesday, December 5 at 7pm. Multiple confessors will be present.



The Feast of the Immaculate Conception: The cathedral's patronal feast day is Friday, December 8. Masses for this Holy Day of Obligation will be Thursday, Vigil 5:30pm and Friday, 7:30am, 8:30am (School Mass), 12:15pm and 5:30pm.

Christmas Mass Schedule: Christmas Eve: 4pm (Family Mass), 6pm and Midnight. Christmas Day: 7:30am, 9am, 11am.; No 5:30pm Mass.

Mass Obligations on Christmas and the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God: This year, Christmas Eve is on a Sunday, and Christmas is on a Monday. This means that we will celebrate the 4th Sunday of Advent on Sunday morning, December 24th; and that afternoon, we will celebrate Christmas. Inevitably, the question arises: if we attend Mass on Sunday afternoon, will we fulfill both the Sunday Mass obligation and the Christmas obligation (a two-for-one Mass)? While canonists and liturgists argue the question, the prevailing view is this: each obligation must be fulfilled with a separate Mass (no twofer).

The situation is a little different the following Sunday (December 31st), the Feast of the Holy Family, and Monday (January 1st), the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God. Because the Solemnity (January 1st, New Year's Day) falls on a Monday, it is not a day of obligation. Therefore, the evening Mass of Sunday, December 31st, will be the Feast of the Holy Family, not the vigil Mass for Mary, the Mother of God.

On the **First Sunday of Advent** throughout the world, adults begin the second stage of Rite of Christian Initiation: *The Catechumenate* — God's call to continuing faith formation.

faith formation — not a class

At Cathedral, adults prepare to become fully initiated into the Catholic Church in a four-stage process of:

- instruction
- faith sharingdiscernment
- prayerworship
- community
- WITNESS

You, the faithful, witness the intent of catechumens and candidates. You offer your support and prayers.

In "Rite of Acceptance", you are asked:

"Are you ready to help these Catechumens follow Christ?" and you reply: "We are."

In intercessions for catechumens and candidates, you pray:

"That they may find in our community compelling signs of unity and generous love".
