A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

Today is Commitment Sunday for the Archbishop's Catholic Appeal, but I don't like a week to go by without a homily. Here are a few reflections on this Sunday's readings.

The touch of Jesus. Wouldn't we love to feel the touch of Jesus, to grasp his hand, to let him pull us from a place of darkness into his marvelous light? Of the four Gospels, Mark is the most physical, presenting a human Jesus, a man who expresses his emotions, touches lepers, and groans deeply at all the ills that beset humanity.

In the Gospel today, Mark tells us that Jesus entered the house of Simon and Andrew. Simon's mother-in-law "lay sick with a fever." Any illness in the ancient world could be a "sickness unto death," and thus the family "immediately told Jesus about her." The family members demonstrate what all Christians do in the face of illness and suffering: we bring to Jesus our cares and our concerns for others. In this case, the response of Jesus is also "immediate": "He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up. Then, "the fever left her." The healing of this woman foreshadows the Resurrection. The phrase "helped her up" is literally "raised her up"—the same word used to describe the Resurrection of Jesus.

What is so remarkable about this healing is that the Simon's mother-in-law immediately "waited" on the guests who had come into the house. The not-so-subtle message of Mark is that God's blessings are to be shared. This woman models discipleship by her service—the Lord heals us *so that* we can be of greater service to others—it is never a personal gift. The Greek verb for *service* used here is *diakoneō*, later used as a standard word for Christian ministry: deacon.

In last week's readings, Moses said that God would raise up "a prophet like me . . . from among your kin: to him you shall listen" (Dt 18). The implication is that one greater than Moses would rise up, not simply *repeating* God's words, but *speaking* God's words, with authority. That new, greater prophet is Jesus, who would speak, not like the scribes and rabbis, but with authority. Mark illustrates the power of Jesus' words with an exorcism—expelling a demon and bringing healing and wholeness and life to a possessed man.

In today's Gospel, Jesus performs his first physical healing. It didn't take long for word to get around Capernaum and Galilee that Jesus was present with his "healing touch." After sunset (after the Sabbath), "they brought to him all who were ill or possessed with demons." In fact, "the whole town was gathered at the door." Jesus shows no impatience or words of reproach, for "this is why he came," to save the lost sheep of the house of Israel. And this is why we come, for his touch, for his healing, for the salvation that he offers to all.


