A Word from the Pastor

After every school mass shooting, there are cries for changes in our society that might keep our children safe. The two most common solutions are gun control and a better mental health system. To date, little has been done on either front, though the state of Connecticut did enact some stiff gun controls after the Sandy Hook massacre. I recognize that the cry for better mental health care is often a way to divert our attention from guns—a hot button issue in this country. Still, the solution is probably found somewhere in the mix of better mental health services, better screening of those who buy guns, and some reasonable control on guns themselves.

The recent incident at Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, touched and affected me more than other recent shootings. Isn't it a tragedy that we can even speak of "other recent shootings." My fear is that we will grow callous and indifferent in the midst of so much violence. Perhaps this is "compassion fatigue" where we can longer muster empathy for victims or the will to bring change. If so, we need to rouse ourselves anew and work to see that such violence and sadness never happen again.

I was particularly touched by the many students who were interviewed after the shooting, how vocal and articulate they were, how idealistic and inspiring their words, and how they certainly do not suffer from any compassion fatigue. They want action, and they want action from us. As one young man put it, "We're children; you guys are the adults."

So what do we do? I've seen placards that say, "Gun control is a life issue." In a broad sense, this is true. But I wouldn't link it with another life issue, abortion, as some would urge us to do. Every abortion kills; but guns, as columnist Ross Douthat says, "sit harmless in millions of households and many deter violence or turn back evil men." I heard a southern congressman recommend that all teachers carry concealed weapons. More weapons in our schools, and placing this responsibility on our teachers? I don't think so. Perhaps more security guards in schools, and better security at school entrances? Yes, perhaps.

Russ Douthat, a conservative columnist in the New York Times, made a very novel and creative suggestion in a recent column (Feb. 17, 2018). He recognizes that there are many places with a healthy gun culture, but there is also "a fetishization of guns and violence" in America, "especially among alienated, isolated young men." For them, he warns, "the guns-and-citizenship ideal can curdle into a crude myself-alone libertarianism for an age of polarization and mistrust." Douthat suggests a system that would "consider limits that are imposed on youth and removed with age." Gun ownership would be staggered: "Let 18-year-olds own hunting rifles. Make revolvers available at 21. Semiautomatic pistols at 25. And semiautomatic rifles like the AR-15 could be sold to 30-year-olds but no one younger." No doubt such a proposal would be attacked by every interest group, but it's worth considering . . . and nothing to lose but our helplessness.
