A Word from the Pastor

Is humanity basically *selfish* or *selfless*? That is a question raised last week by columnist David Brooks in the *New York Times*. Brooks recently wrote an excellent book entitled *The Road to Character* on the deeper values that should inform our lives. I find him a very insightful observer of our social mores and the ties that bind us—or sometimes divide us. Brooks' response to my question is not surprising. He believes that people are "wired to cooperate" and that, contrary to common observations, "people have a moral sense."

The question arose when two members of the current administration made this statement prior to the president's trip to the Middle East and Europe: "The president embarked on his first foreign trip with a clear-eyed outlook that the world is not a 'global community' but an arena where nations, nongovernmental actors and businesses engage and compete for advantage." Such a statement would suggest that selfishness "is the sole driver of human affairs" and that life is a "competitive struggle for gain."

A recent event on a Portland MAX train would give the lie to such an understanding. By now everyone has heard the story of three heroes—Taliesin Myrddin Namkai-Meche, Rick Best, and Micah Fletcher—who intervened in a racially-motivated attack on two young women. Two of these men lost their lives, and Micah Fletcher was seriously wounded, when Jeremy Christian slashed their throats as they tried to protect the women. Tilly, the nickname of Namkai-Meche, was described as "wired for altruism"; and Best, who once ran for Clackamas County commissioner, said that he would never use his position for his own profit or put his personal safety ahead of others. Selfless? Yes.

Brooks says that the error in the administration officials is that they misunderstand what drives human action. Yes, there are people who are driven by selfish motivations, "for individual status, wealth, and power." But people "are also motivated by another set of drives—for solidarity, love, and moral fulfillment—that are equally and sometimes more powerful." Here Brooks refers to our desire for communion, harmony, and peace. "Far from being a flimsy thing," Brooks says, "the desire for cooperation is the primary human evolutionary advantage we have over other animals." He goes on to point out that we have planted in us "a set of universal intuitions that help establish harmony between peoples. From their first moments, children are wired to feel each other's pain. You don't have to teach a child about what fairness is; they already know."

Brooks makes reference to Jonathan Haidt, a social psychologist, to show that people are attracted "by goodness and repelled by selfishness." Haidt studied the "surges of elevation" we feel when we see someone perform a selfless act. We are motivated to do the same. Good leaders know this, and they "seek to inspire faithfulness by showing good character. They try to motivate action by pointing toward great ideals." So, are we basically selfish or selfless? I leave it for you to decide.
