## A Word from the Pastor

Each year, about this time, there is a debate among Christians whether we should celebrate Halloween or not. Some fundamentalist Christians argue that Halloween, with its focus on ghosts, goblins, and witches, subjects children to demonic forces—thus, unholy and not Christian. Some associate Halloween with devil worship and satanic cults. And still others, who know a little history, see Halloween as too closely associated with Catholicism and Catholic feasts and thus reject it outright.

Catholics, and some other Christians, find themselves caught in these arguments, not knowing what to believe and wondering whether their children are adversely affected. Let me say at the outset that Halloween is not anti-Christian, not rooted in Satanism or demonic worship, and is, in fact, part of our Catholic tradition—when properly understood.

First of all, the word *Halloween* is a contraction of "All Hallows Eve"; that is, the eve of All Saints (All Hallows). We use the word *hallow* (an old English word for *saint* or *holy*) in the Lord's Prayer ("hallowed be thy name"), but rarely other than that. All Saints Day, a Catholic feast and Holy Day of Obligation, is November 1<sup>st</sup>, and its celebration begins the evening before (October 31<sup>st</sup>, the "eve" of All Hallows). Both the feast and the vigil have been celebrated by Catholics since the eighth century when they were established by Pope Gregory III in Rome and later expanded to the universal Church.

There really are no "pagan origins" to Halloween, despite the claims of fundamentalists. In the latter part of the middle ages there was an attempt to show a connection between Halloween and a Celtic harvest festival, but there is no evidence that Pope Gregory knew anything about an English pagan festival. Nonetheless, elements of this Celtic festival found its way into Halloween celebrations in Ireland and England, even among Catholics, and some of these traditions—shorn of their paganism—continue today.

The Celtic elements of Halloween include lighting bonfires, carving pumpkins (originally turnips!), and going house to house for treats. Oddly, the darker aspects of Halloween—e.g., ghosts and demons—actually come from our own Catholic tradition. Custom had it that, on certain feasts, the "veil" that separates this life from the next, or from Heaven, Hell, and Purgatory, was very thin, allowing ghosts from Purgatory (or demons from Hell) to appear. Our custom of Halloween costumes and masks reflects this Christian and Celtic tradition, adding a bit scariness and fear.

Attacks on Halloween today are not the first. The Protestant Reformation would have nothing to do with saints, and thus All Saints Day and Halloween were suppressed. In America, the Puritans outlawed both the celebration of Halloween and Christmas. But the arrival of Irish and German immigrants to this country in the 19<sup>th</sup> century revived Halloween and Christmas, and we celebrate them, with joy, today. So enjoy!

# St. Mary's Cathedral Office of Social Services 2017 Annual Report

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Cathedral's office of Social Services provides assistance to the poor and underserved in our community directly through the Church office and in collaboration and conjunction with partner agencies in the Portland Metro area. While our primary focus is to help individuals and families secure and maintain stable housing and proper nutrition, Cathedral also provides utility, transportation, medical, mental health, hygiene, clothing, and educational assistance. Among those served are the elderly living in the neighborhood, returning veterans, women returning to work after experiencing homelessness, refugees, and children facing domestic uncertainty. From June 2016 through August 2017, the office distributed **\$28,885** in the following categories:

**Rent:** Includes direct payment to landlords and assistance with temporary housing (motels, hostels, and clean and sober shelters). \$7,715.

**Food:** Support of the Lift Urban Portland Food Pantry, direct purchase of groceries for individuals and families, and food cards to Fred Meyer, Trader Joe's, and McDonalds. **\$8,842**.

Utilities: Assistance paying telephone, water, and electric bills. \$624.

**Hygiene:** Personal products including incontinence supplies, non-prescription medications, dental and grooming products. **\$461.** 

Medical: Assistance with insurance co-pays, prescription medications, and clinic visits. \$1,229.

Mental Health: Referrals to mental health counseling (NW Catholic Counseling Center). \$2,250.

Children/education: School supplies, backpacks, clothing, footwear, tuition assistance, books, Christmas giving. \$4,155.

Refugee Resettlement: Household goods. \$495.

Storage: Payment of storage fees for the homeless and those in transition. \$100.

**Travel:** Gas cards, monthly bus passes, bus tickets, and transportation assistance for job or return home. **\$1,761.** 

Clothing: Coats, footwear, undergarments, hats, scarves, and gloves. \$775.

Supplies: Office supplies. \$478.
