# Father Sam's Message

In preparation of Pope Francis' upcoming visit to the United States, which starts on Tuesday, I would like to write about the Holy Father as the Supreme leader of the Catholic Church. In His infinite wisdom, our Lord Jesus knew He needed to establish a clear, visible hierarchy with real authority to best teach, sanctify, and govern His Church. Our Lord established His Church on His Apostle Peter's confession of faith - "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (Mt. 16:16). Our Lord responds, "And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church" (Mt 16:18). In the Gospel of John, after His Resurrection, Jesus commanded Peter "to feed His sheep" giving him the responsibility of caring for the entire Church as our first of 266 successive Popes. The Pope is called the "Vicar of Christ" because Christ gave St. Peter the authority to represent Him on earth as the visible sign of unity among the bishops, who are the successors of the Apostles.

Although Christ entrusted tremendous authority to the office of the Papacy, the Pope's power is not absolute. The Pope's authority extends to protecting, clarifying, and declaring what is revealed Truth (Dogma) and what is not. No authority on earth, including a Pope, can ever change what has already been revealed and defined as Divine Truth, including the Church's teachings on the Seven Sacraments. A couple of weeks ago, Pope Francis, completely in line with his prerogative as Pope, decided to make changes to parts of the Code of Canon Law, the law of the Church, which had to do with the process of judging if a marriage is valid, known more commonly as "annulments." Among many other aspects of life in the Church, Canon Law governs the administration and protection of the Sacraments. Βv changing the codes that regulate this complex process, the Pope has not changed, nor would he ever change, the Sacrament of Marriage itself. Marriage, as taught by Jesus Himself and defended by Pope Francis, is an unbreakable, lifelong bond between one man and one woman, and this truth can never change. What the Holy Father has done is to simplify the Code of Canon Law to reorganize the processing of annulments, particularly "formal" annulment cases. An annulment is a judgment by a Church Tribunal that one of the essential elements for a valid marriage was not present at the time of consent and, therefore, a valid marriage bond never existed from the beginning of the marriage. A valid Catholic marriage results from five elements: (1) the spouses (one man and one woman) are free to marry; (2) they freely exchange their consent; (3) in consenting to marry, they have the intention to marry for life, to be

faithful to one another and be open to children; (4) they intend the good of each other; and (5) their consent is given in the presence of two witnesses and before a properly authorized Church minister.

Church law safeguards the indissolubility of the sacrament of marriage. The law presumes a marriage valid until proven otherwise (c.1060). So, in order for a marriage to be judged invalid, there has to be real proof, including witnesses, and not just a person's subjective experience to show there was something lacking in any of the "essential elements" at the time of the marriage. Particular forms of behavior such as physical abuse, alcohol and drug abuse, deviant sexual behavior, criminal activity, grave irresponsibility, mental illness, and persistent infidelity may indicate that valid marital consent was not exchanged by one or both parties. Beliefs about marriage contrary to Catholic doctrine may also indicate invalid consent. An intention to exclude children and/or contrary views about the permanence of marriage and fidelity may also show that consent was not exchanged validly. Any infringement of a person's free choice to marry, fraud, error regarding the identity of the spouse, or extreme internal or external pressure to marry may also indicate that consent was not exchanged validly.

In cases where a person is just no longer able to communicate with their spouse, who is no longer "in love" with their spouse, or has found someone else who really understands them are not reasons a marriage is invalid. If a person got married knowing what marriage is, a lifelong covenant between one man and one woman, knowing the truth about their spouse, and both parties were capable of making a commitment to be married for the rest of their life or spouse's life by giving full, free consent, then they are in a valid marriage. If the marriage is valid, it means any human authority, including the Pope, cannot ever dissolve the marriage. If the marriage is valid, a person who leaves their spouse and then attempts to marry another person commits the sin of adultery. It is important to note, simply leaving a troubled marriage, particularly if there is violence or abuse, is NOT A SIN. Actually, a person has a responsibility to separate from an abusive spouse for their personal safety and the safety of their children. The sin is trying to get married to someone while already married. Annulments do not give a Catholic, who has gone through a civil divorce, a right to "remarry" because if the previous marriage or marriages are proven to be invalid as part of the annulment process,

then any marriage after the annulment is considered to be the first and only marriage. I know this can be very confusing. So, if you any have questions or need more information about how to petition to see if a previous marriage was invalid, please do not hesitate to contact Fr. Banka or myself.

Let us, through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, continue to pray for our dear Pope Francis on His mission to the United States.
