

First Reading: Isaiah 61:1-11

The last part of the book of Isaiah contains the words of a prophet who preached after the Jews returned from exile in Babylon. They found their temple destroyed and the city leveled. In today's reading, the prophet describes how God called him to encourage the people in this desperate time.

Second Reading: 1 Thess. 5: 16-24

Our second reading comes at the end of Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians. Just as a parent might give last-minute instructions as their child heads out the door, so Paul has a list of last-min ute instructions for these people whom he loves.

#### **The Woman in Advent**


In the middle of Advent stands the figure of Mary, celebrated this past week in the Feast of the Immaculate conception, the patronal feast of the United States and this Tuesday as Our Lady of Guadalupe, the patroness of all the Americas. Guadalupan devotion has advances to the south from Mexico, and throughout all of North America. Guadalupe's faithful have been expanding for nearly five centuries. Her basilica in Mexico City is the most visited pilgrimage site on the American continent. After Jesus of Nazareth, her image is the most reproduced sacred icon in America. Long acclaimed as the national symbol of Mexico, Pope John Paul II acclaimed her as the "Mother and Evangelizer of America." At the request of the bishops of America, he decreed her feast "be celebrated throughout the continent."

Why does Our Lady of Guadalupe attract such a rich variety of followers? One answer is the tradition of her 1531 apparitions to the indigenous Juan Diego. Generations passed on his story to their children. They relate how Guadalupe sent Juan Diego to request that the bishop of Mexico, build a temple in her honor on the sacred hill of Tepeyac. The bishop

doubted the story but came to believe when Juan Diego dropped exquisite out-of-season flowers from his tilma (cloak) and presented the image of Guadalupe that miraculously appeared on the rough cloth of his garment. In various ways, Guadalupe provided Juan Diego with hope and consolation, especially through the healing of his

uncle, Juan Bernardino.

The relationship and trust between Guadalupe and Juan Diego also resonates with many. Those who have experienced the pain of rejection find hope in Guadalupe's election of the unexpected hero Juan Diego, as well as in Juan Diego's unwavering faith and final vindication. The Guadalupe narrative reveals the deep truth of their human dignity and exposes the lie of experiences that unjustly diminish their fundamental sense of worth.

Finally, Guadalupe's beauty and unconditional love transform her people, enabling them to confront harsh realities with the confident assurance that no human force can thwart God's loving designs.

Guadalupe is our mother. Throughout the Americas, we enter into the ongoing eruption of God's compassion that St. Juan Diego first experienced in her centuries ago. This Sunday
