

Fourth Sunday of Advent

First Reading: 2 Samuel 7:1-16 The "Ark of God," was a wooden chest overlayed by gold, that housed the 10 Commandments. King David, rich and comfortable in his palace, felt the Ark deserved to be housed in similar splendor. God tells David a physical building is not as important as the "house" (dynasty) of David. This prophecy was fulfilled in Christ, who was born of the House of David.

Second Reading: Romans 16: 25 - 27

This conclusion of Paul's letter is much like a toast offered to God. We should give thanks to God that salvation is available to all people through faith in Jesus Christ.

This Week's Question

For Adults:

With whom could you be more patient this week, as God has been patient with you?

For Children: What work of justice could you do this week to bring someone joy?

A Needed Message of Advent Hope

Psychologists sometimes speak of "the holiday syndrome". In the weeks before Christmas, they know that many people feel anxious, restless, lonely, even hostile. They seem to internalize the deepening darkness of the season as the sun moves to its southern most point and the hours of daylight continue to diminish.

The Advent liturgy itself reflects the mood with its images of struggle, puzzlement, pain and doubt. Yet, through it all, a note of hope sounds ever louder. Isaiah speaks of it when he utters the words that Handel will work so triumphantly into his Messiah:

"Lift up your voice with strength, O herald of good tidings to Jerusalem." (Is 40:5)

"Good tidings": those are the words of the Abba Father for a very good reason. angels at Bethlehem when they announced: As the "very little children" of God, we

"We bring you good tidings of Great joy. A child has been born to you, a savior."

The imagery of Advent points to a child who will be born; and a child is a symbol of the future with all its possibilities, hopes and dreams. Mothers have a way of collecting baby pictures. Perhaps one of dad and child, one maybe one in a stroller in the backyard peering curiously at the camera mom is holding.

When the New Testament speaks of us as "children of God" the Greek word it employs means "nursling" very little children. Christ taught us to call God Abba Father for a very good reason.

As the "very little children" of God, we have the secret of the kingdom the power of a cry. Our Abba cannot resist the cry of a child. He will, whatever our age, bring us to his Kingdom of Peace. There, "the wolf will be the guest of the lamb; the leopard shall lie down with the kid. The calf and the young lion will browse together."

And a little child will lead them. (Is 11:6).
