PREPARING FOR NEXT WEEK'S LITURGY Sixth Sunday of Easter

First Reading: Acts 8:5-17

Last week we heard how the Christian assembly in Jerusalem chose seven of their number to minister to the Greek speaking Christians who lived there. Philip was one of the seven. Today we find him in Samaria, about 60 miles north of Jerusalem, fearlessly proclaiming the good news of Jesus and experiencing astounding results.

Second Reading: 1 Peter 3:15-18

The first letter of Peter was written to Christians whose pagan neighbors continually questioned and ridiculed them about their faith. Since most of the Christians were low born or slaves, their neighbors couldn't understand why they were so joyful and hopeful. Today's passage offers pastoral advice and encouragement.

Acts2:14-41; 1 Peter 2:20-25; John 10:1-10


I am the Way

- Being troubled and anxious is a fact of our stress-filled lives. "Do not be troubled" the surgeon says to someone before major surgery; "Do not be troubled" a parent says to a child wakened by a nightmare; "Do not be troubled" ... The only way we can truly not be troubled.
- In the second reading Peter confidently invites people (and us) to "Come to [Christ]" and name them "a people of [Christ's] own"
- Jesus' words from the Last Supper discourse are reassuring: "Do not let your hearts be troubled." Yet Thomas and Philip are not reassured. The leap from the Last Supper to the resurrection is one giant step. we have taken this leap. We are an Easter people. Believing mitigates all troubles, all anxiety.

May 14, 2017 The Father Dwells in Me

Today's Readings: Acts 6:1–7; Psalm 33:1–2, 4–5, 18–19; 1 Peter 2:4–9; John 14:1–12. The Apostles are confused today as Jesus tells them that he will go to prepare a place for them. Thomas questions, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" When Jesus says that he is the way, the truth, and the life, Philip tells Jesus to show them the Father. We can understand why the Apostles felt uneasy, for we often want exact directions. Just as the Apostles were unsure of going by their instincts to follow God, we sometimes are unsure of the path that Jesus has shown us. Jesus is preparing the Apostles for when he will leave them. He lets them know the path to the Father is

simple: I am the way, the truth, and the life. Only by what we already know of you, Jesus, can we find the Father.

If we know Jesus, then we know the Father. The first lesson of the Trinity is that God is one God. Knowing God is knowing the Father, the Son, and the Spirit as one. No one understands the Father except through understanding Jesus, the Son, the Christ. The way to the Father is through the Son. The truth of God is knowing those truths we have heard and lived and enacted with Jesus in the Gospel. Life in God is the fullness of life through creation, Baptism, and resurrection. If we are to know God, we must be willing to follow him, trust in him, and do the same good works that reveal him.

For the pastor, the Pastoral Council is a primary source of support, challenge, and consultation as well as an avenue of communication within the parish.

The Pastoral Council consists of the pastor and 6 - 8 members of the parish. Two of these members may be appointed by the pastor and the rest are to be elected at large by the parish following a broad process to determine appropriate candidates and to provide information to the parish regarding the nominees' backgrounds, participation in parish life, and potential contributions to this advisory body.

Presently, members serve three year terms with a one third membership changing each year. The Pastoral Council normally meets five times a year.
