

PREPARING FOR NEXT WEEK'S LITURGY Feast of the Ascension

First Reading: Acts 1:1-11

This passage takes us back to the beginning verses of the Acts of the Apostles and sets forth the themes that Luke is going to develop throughout this, the longest book of the New Testament. His major theme is the role of the Holy Spirit, who enables the apostles to be effective witnesses to Jesus. The Holy Spirit is mentioned 57 times in the Acts of the Apostles.

Second Reading: Ephesians 1:17-23

Ephesus was an ancient city located on the western coast of what is today Turkey. Paul visited there several times. Today's passage, which is near the beginning of the letter to the Ephesians, is a prayer asking God's blessings upon that community. Many thoughts in this prayer are connected to today's feast of the Ascension.

Acts8:5-17; 1 Peter 3:215-18; John 14:15-21


I am the Way

- Peter is writing to a community who welcomed Christ as Lord in their hearts and remained faithful by their good conduct in Christ They have heeded what Jesus asks in the Gospel: to keep his commandments. Through their faithfulness, evil is "put to shame."
- In John's gospel, "world" refers to everything opposed to God and obedience to Jesus' commandments. The world sees neither Jesus nor the "Spirit of truth"; the world does not love; the world does not have life. Faithful disciples do. They see, love, and live because of the Father's gift of the Spirit within them. This divine indwelling is God's very love. We are to be God's love made visible, that the world may see Jesus, come to the truth, and choose to live in faithful love.

May 21, 2017 No Longer Orphans

Today's Readings: Acts 8:5–8, 14–17; Psalm 66:1–3, 4–5, 6–7, 16, 20; 1 Peter 3:15–18; John 14:15–21. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples that he will not abandon them as orphans. For three years, they had followed him and trusted that he would show them the Truth. Each of the Twelve relied on Jesus to guide them, to demonstrate the best way to be good, loving, religious people. Now he tells them to demonstrate their love by keeping the Commandments. And he assures them that he will send the Advocate. He tells them that they need to trust what they already know, for within that knowing, they will have all that is necessary to live in God's love. Jesus was trying to teach the Apostles the hard lesson that they need to trust what they have learned

and what they have been living. We, too, need to take that lesson to heart.

Today's Gospel is a bit about handing on what is in the family. Every family has a talent, an attitude, or a particular trait that appears here and there throughout the family tree. Jesus tells us today that he lives on in each of us through the Spirit. Jesus lives on through a holy attitude, a helping hand, a grateful smile. Guided by his commandments, we have the Spirit coursing through our spiritual veins, and we recognize him in others, and sometimes in ourselves. He remains with us, lives through us, and we share the life of God in those familiar and holy ways of the Spirit inherited through the sacraments.

Not at all Jesus' fault. Actually, nobody's fault. When we looked at the total cost of the event which included rentals of tables, chairs, tent, etc., a liquor license, bartenders, music, etc., the cost would have been high even with a parish subsidy. The Madison Hotel offerered their facilities on an open night and we thought it would be a perfect alternative. Plus, we wouldn't have to worry about rain or mosquitos. So, we moved the event on day early to June 16, from 6 to 9 pm. Delicious food, open bar, an enjoyable evening to celebrate ourselves as a parish for fifty years.

Tickets for the evening are \$60. This is considerably less than the cost per person. We wanted to keep it as affordable as possible and be able to celebrate with a majority of our parish family.
