

PREPARING FOR NEXT WEEK'S LITURGY Pentecost

First Reading: Acts 2:1-11

Pentecost was a Jewish feast that celebrated the beginning of the harvest. It took place 50 days after the feast of Passover. Jewish pilgrims came to Jerusalem from all over the ancient world for the celebration. Today we hear how Pentecost became a Christian feast.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:3-13


Paul's first letter to the Corinthians responds to a letter they wrote to him. They had asked him how to deal with the diversity of gifts in the community, and the rivalries and jealousies that inevitably arose. In today's passage, he uses a comparison that we will recognize immediately.

God's Grace is Young Enough

Acts 1:12-14; 1 Peter 4:13-16; John 17:1-11

I am the Way

- While they were still gaping at the sky after the ascension, angels sent the disciples back with a jibe: "Why are you standing there looking at the sky?" In the first reading Luke shows the disciples gathered in prayer in that interval of time between then and Pentecost
- In this Sunday's Gospel, John addresses many of these same post-Easter realities couched in much different language in the prayer of Jesus concluding his Last Supper farewell discourses. As in Acts I, the focus of John 17 is on the transition between the earthly ministry of Jesus and the life of the post-Easter Church.

Prayer of Confidence

Ever-living and ever-loving God, you sent your Son to be with us forever. In our lives we look for your guidance and your protection, and we gather in prayer asking for your

blessings to continue.

May we find you in one another

as we pray together in your name. May we be filled with your Spirit as we open our hearts to be filled with your grace;

and may we accept your loving kindness in the assembly of the faithful,

even as we are uncertain of where you lead us.

We ask this, in confidence, through your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ,

who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit,

one God, for ever and ever. Amen.



Today's Readings: Acts 1:12–14; Psalm 27:1, 4, 7–8; 1 Peter 4:13–16; John 17:1–11a. Peter tells us in the Second Reading that we must not be ashamed if we suffer in the name of Christ. At Baptism we become Christians, and then carry Christ's name as our identity. In the Gospel, Jesus includes us as among those to whom he revealed God's name and are his own. Together, we share an identity, a calling, a sacramental nature. We Christians must not be ashamed of that identity. In our world today, however, we are often challenged because we are Christian. When that happens, then we turn (return) to Christ's words, teachings, and example to know what we are to do. Jesus' prayer in today's Gospel repeatedly turns all back to the Father in glory. He glorified the Father as he taught us. His care for us was to return us to

the Father as faithful people of God.

Even as we live as Christians, we need to examine what it means to live fully our baptismal identity. When we do so, we become more confident in our being identified with Christ. As we near the end of the Easter season, take another look at the profession of faith we proclaim together every Sunday. Discuss the Nicene Creed or the Apostles' Creed in your homes or small discussion groups. How does each section of the Creed profess who you are and what you believe? To go more deeply into this identity, ask how that section of the Creed is practiced in your life, or how you witness its being practiced in the world. As Christians, we together respond: I do believe.

10 SIGNS OF A SAFE PROGRAM FOR CHILDREN & YOUTH

- 1. Screening of staff / volunteers.
- 2. Adults trained in safe environment strategies and signs of abuse.
- 3. Code of conduct enforced.
- 4. Open Communication between parents and staff / staff and children / children and parents.
- 5. Parents always Welcome.
- 6. Children educated in right relationships & what to do if a relationship isn't right.
- 7. All children treated with Dignity and Respect.
- 8 Clear Rules and Expectations. consistent reinforcement / consequences
- 9. Adequate supervision of youth. team approach—accountability—no 1:1 isolation
- 10. All abuse is reported.
