


July means Ice Cream

PREPARING FOR **NEXT WEEK'S LITURGY**

15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Isaiah 55:10-11

Because Israelites were exiled in the pagan land of Babylon, the assuring words that God previously spoke to them now seemed empty. In today's passage, the prophet Isaiah will use an image from nature to describe how God's word always bears fruit and comes true no matter how unlikely it may seem.

Second Reading: Romans 8:18-23
As we continue reading from the eighth chapter of Paul's letter to the Romans, he tells us that sin affected not only human beings but all creation, and the coming of Christ had a healing effect on both. It is evident that Paul is not pessimistic about this world.

For Adults:

When has Jesus refreshed you when you felt burdened by probléms?

O&A: More Than Once

May I receive communion more than once a day?

A key insight that the church recovered since Vatican II is that participation in the Mass reaches a high point in the sharing of communion, an action that Christians should consider normal and commonplace rather than secondary and rare.

The Mass is a sacrificial meal in which we are fed with the Lord's body and blood. Catechumens are dismissed before the liturgy of the eucharist because they cannot receive communion until before baptism. This is why communion should only of bread consecrated at that Mass rather than bread has reserved in the tabernacle.

Without this connection, irregular practices grew where people travelled from church to church to receive communion with participating in the Mass. This became forbidden as an abuse of commujnion. With the renewed interconnection between the reception of communion and participation in the Mass, the lawhas changed.

Thus, canon law and current church custom permits anyone to receive communion a second time on any day, as long as the second reception of communion occurs during Mass. (Thus, this permission does not hold if communion is being distributed outside of Mass except in the case of viaticum-communion of the dying.) The scriptures record that, at the Last Supper, Jesus said, "All of you, take and eat... take and drink." On those occasions when a person attends a second Mass on the same day he or she should never hesitate about fully participating in the celebration of the eucharist by receiving communion a second time.
