

PREPARING FOR NEXT WEEK'S LITURGY

Twentieth Sunday of the Year

First Reading: Proverbs 9:1-6

The book of Proverbs is a collection of wise sayings, compiled over a number of centuries. Here, the author personifies Wisdom as a woman. She offers guidance on how to live a life pleasing to GFod. This is symbolized as a banquet at which she serves fine food.

Second Reading: Ephesians 5:15-20

Today's passage from the letter to the Ephesians continues reflections on how to live as a Christian in everyday life. In the world in which the author lived, two things particularly kept people from living a dignified life: ignorance and addiction to alcohol. The first century author sets forth high expectations for Christians.

NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Taking desert time

The word *desert* often evokes images of a vast, hostile environment devoid of life. Yet the desert is a common symbol used in scripture to give context to an experience of God. It can, for example, be a symbol of quieting ourselves and finding our grounding in God, even in the busyness of everyday life. How do you enter into the desert? While we may not have a vast wilderness to retreat into, we can find small ways: plugging into our favorite reflective song, breathing in fresh air, closing our eyes and opening our heart to God.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Kings 19:4-8; Ephesians 4:30-5:2; John 6:41-51 (116). "Elijah went a day's journey into the desert."

MONDAY, AUGUST 10 FEAST OF SAINT LAWRENCE, DEACON, MARTYR Know where your treasure lies

When Saint Lawrence, a third-century deacon, was ordered by the prefect of Rome to hand over whatever wealth the early church had, Lawrence rounded up the poor and sick, presented them to the prefect, and announced, "These are the treasures of the church!" The poor and sick continue to be the church's greatest treasure. "In the poor and outcast," says Pope Francis, "we see Christ's face; by loving and helping the poor, we love and serve Christ." In your service to those in material need you will find your life's greatest riches.

Today's readings: 2 Corinthians 9:6-10; John 12:24-26 (618). "Where I am, there also will my servant be."

Tuesday, August 11 Feast of Clare, virgin Support your soul companions

Clare of Assisi was born into a well-to-do family in 1194. By custom, she was expected to marry into a family of similar social status. After hearing Francis preach, Clare chose a very different path. Like Francis, Clare desired to follow closely the model of Jesus. Her wish for a life of prayer, simplicity, and evangelical poverty was realized in 1212 when she and Francis founded the second Franciscan order, later known as the Order of Saint Clare. The two encouraged and supported each other for the rest of their lives. Today, say special prayers for your companions on the spiritual journey!

Today's readings: Deuteronomy 31:1-8; Matthew 18:1-5, 10, 12-14 (<u>414</u>). "It is the Lord, your God, who marches with you; he will never fail you or forsake you."

WEDNESDAY, August 12 Let the children lead

Today is International Youth Day, a good day to acknowledge that the future is present and walking among us. A day to ponder your own legacy—what can you offer the youth of today? What have you learned that you can teach? Where have you found good in the world that you can point out to those whose eyes are fresher? How has your faith helped in hard times and what lessons can you pass on?

And what can you learn in turn from those who are more innocent and spontaneous?

Today's readings: Deuteronomy 34:1-12; Matthew 18:15-20 (415). "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have won over your brother."

THURSDAY, AUGUST 13 Healthy hearts forgive

The Mayo Clinic specializes in wellness—not just physical health but also emotional wellness. Their list of the benefits of forgiving someone include: healthier relationships; greater spiritual and psychological well-being; less anxiety, stress, and hostility; lower blood pressure; fewer symptoms of depression; a stronger immune system; improved heart health; higher self-esteem. Pretty healthy stuff, this forgiveness. Take two forgiveness pills and call an estranged loved one in the morning!

TODAY'S READINGS: Joshua 3:7-10a, 11, 13-17; Matthew 18:21-19:1 (416). "So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives his brother from his heart."

FRIDAY, AUGUST 14 FEAST OF MAXIMILIAN KOLBE, PRIEST, MARTYR Love like this saves the world

The old Burt Bacharach song said, "What the world needs now, is love, sweet love," and Franciscan Maximilian Kolbe showed that it is possible to give the world what it needs in Jesus' name. Kolbe summed up a life of love and service in a simple but dramatic act. Hearing a fellow prisoner at Auschwitz cry out, "My wife! My children!" as his name was called out for execution, Kolbe volunteered to take his place. There were likely thousands of similar heroic acts of compassion in the years of the death camps—flickers of love and light—now forgotten. But Kolbe's story has been remembered and retold just to remind you that while your act of love today probably will not cost you your life, it will go far to bring Christ's sweet love alive.

Today's readings: Joshua 24:1-13; Matthew 19:3-12 (417). "No greater love than to lay down life for a friend."

SATURDAY, AUGUST 15

SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Say yes to God

The young woman who traveled the hill country to visit her cousin on that long ago day did not know what the future held. Pregnant, and with more questions than answers, she nonetheless had given her assent to God's will. It was the first yes in an earthly life of total surrender. That young woman on the road to Judah would have been as stunned as anyone to know she would share in her Son's Resurrection. She alone among humanity would one day be taken, body and soul, into heavenly glory. Ask for the grace to surrender the worries of this day to Mary's Son.

TODAY'S READINGS: Vigil: 1 Chronicles 15:3-4, 15-16; 16:1-2; 1 Corinthians 15:54b-57; Luke 11:27-28 (621); Day: Revelation 11:19a; 12:1-6a, 10ab; 1 Corinthians 15:20-27; Luke 1:39-56 (622). "Blessed are you who believed."

Kolbe's canonization.

Month of Prayer for Those Suffering Religious Persecution

From Bishop Serratellis

On June 30, 2015, the feast of the Christians martyred under Nero in 64 A.D., our Holy Father, Pope Francis, remarked that there are more persecuted Christians in the world today than there were in the first centuries. Each month 180 Christians are being martyred. These sad statistics bear witness to the fact that Christians are among the most persecuted religious groups worldwide.

In more than 60 countries, over 200 million Christians are being denied their fundamental rights. In 41 of those countries, Islamic extremists are barbarically beheading, crucifying and killing men, women, young people and children. Tragically, in those areas of the world where Christianity once began, the Christian community is being wiped off the map. Islamic jihadists do not limit their violence to Christians alone. They spare no religious group, even killing those of their own Muslim faith.

As Pope Francis recently remarked, "The dramatic news ... about violence, kidnapping ...and harassment against Christians and other groups does not stop. We want to assure those involved in these situations that we do not forget them, but we are close to them and pray insistently that, very quickly, the intolerable brutality of which they are victims is put to an end" (Angelus, May 1, 2015).

The Pope has urged us to pray for an increased awareness of the "drama of persecuted Christians in our day," for religious freedom as an "inalienable human right" and for the "end to this unacceptable crime." In response to our Holy Father's urgent request and united with him in concern for all those suffering religious persecution, I am designating this August as a diocesan-wide Month of Prayer for Those Suffering Religious Persecution. (The prayer is located in the 'Parish on a Journey' column.)

All are invited to pray this, even daily. All are encouraged to undertake some personal acts of prayer, sacrifice and charity for our suffering brothers and sisters.

These are only a few ways to raise our awareness and support of our brothers and sisters around the world. It is my hope that our united efforts, in both prayer and action, will strengthen those who suffer persecution and move the hearts of those who oppress them to embrace a life of peace. As St. Peter Eymard once said, "Have confidence in prayer. It is the unfailing power which God has given us."

Faith Trumps Politics

by Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS Presidential election politics are heating up and the election is over a year away! It could be easy to become overloaded as this period of time passes by.



At least twenty-four people are running for President. If you are a political junkie, you may be in heaven, glued to news channels and talk radio. It is close to impossible for anyone to tune it all out completely. The reality is that you shouldn't want to do that either.

In the document on a Catholic's political responsibility, Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, the US Bishops state that we have a moral obligation to participate in political life, since responsible citizenship is a virtue. The Catechism informs us that we are all called to participate in promoting the common good. We have these obligations placed on us, not just because we are American citizens, but because we are baptized disciples of Jesus, called to bear witness to the Good News in all we do. In this reality, we find what must be our true motivation for political involvement.

However, many of us trade our Christian convictions for political ones. People begin with a calling to be disciples, but in the end define themselves as more Republicans or Democrats at heart. Politics is not a faith. No political candidate has all the answers or a map detailing the route to a promised land. However, as disciples we are obligated to participate in a political process because the One who does provide all the answers has saved us: Jesus Christ.

Our faith must provide the lens through which we see all things, including politics. Politics should never be the lens through which we see our faith.

The readings on recent Sundays present us God who provides all we need. Whether it is manna in the desert for the Israelites, a hearth cake and water jug for Elijah, or the living Bread of Life for you and me, God provides for us what we need. God is in control and we are invited to place our trust in him. Some distort this truth to end up with justification for not becoming politically active. Some may even proclaim what happens in the political world has no bearing on them because they are citizens of the kingdom of God. However, nothing could be further from the truth.

We have a message to share that has the power to transform our communities and the way those communities are governed. That message is rooted in the Good News and it has the power to free the oppressed, provide hospitality for the disenfranchised, and console the afflicted. Those who have ears to hear it, and who allow it to transform their lives, will give voice to the voiceless, provide nourishment for those who hunger and thirst, and will construct systems that ensure the God-given rights of all. God will provide if we keep clear the pathways that lead to grace. And no political construct can be allowed to compromise the integrity and primacy of this message.

So, dive into the political year! Go into it not primarily as Democrat, Republication, or Independent but as an intentional disciple that bears good news, placing your trust in the God who delivers us from all evil, and saves us from all that works against his word, sometimes even ourselves.


