

From the Pastor ... 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B Theme: Definition of Marriage

On this Sunday, the word of God speaks of marriage as intended by God. The scriptures have power to discriminate the good from evil and place us on the path to happiness, holiness and prosperity. I would like, therefore, to borrow a section of an article from "<u>A Basic Theology of Marriage</u>", by Christopher West, a catholic author and speaker, best known for his work on Pope John Paul ITs series of audience addresses entitled Theology of the Body.

<u>He defines marriage as follows</u>: Marriage is the intimate, exclusive, indissoluble communion of life and love entered by man and woman at the design of the Creator for the purpose of their own good and the procreation and education of children; this covenant between baptized persons has been raised by Christ the Jord to the dignity of a sacrament.

Intimate communion of life and love: Marriage is the closest and most intimate of human friendships. It involves the sharing of the whole of a person's life with his/her spouse. Marriage calls for a mutual self-surrender so intimate and complete that spouses - without losing their individuality - become "one," not only in body, but in soul.

Exclusive communion of life and love: As a mutual gift of two persons to each other, this intimate union excludes such union with anyone else. It demands the total fidelity of the spouses. This exclusivity is essential for the good of the couple's children as well.

<u>Indissoluble communion of life and love:</u> Husband and wife are not joined by passing emotion or mere erotic inclination which, selfishly pursued, fades quickly away. They are joined in authentic conjugal love by the firm and irrevocable act of their own will. Once their mutual consent has been consummated, an unbreakable bond is established between the spouses. For the baptized, this bond is sealed by the Holy Spirit and becomes absolutely indissoluble. Thus, the Church does not so much teach that divorce is wrong, but that divorce is impossible, regardless of its civil implications.

Entered by man and woman: The complementarity of the sexes is essential to marriage. There is such widespread confusion today about the nature of marriage that some would wish to extend a legal "right" to marry to two persons of the same sex. The very nature of marriage makes such a proposition impossible.

<u>At the design of the Creator</u>: God is the author of marriage. He inscribed the call to marriage in our very being by creating us as male and female. Marriage is governed by his laws, faithfully transmitted by his Bride, the Church. For marriage to be what it is, it must conform to these laws. Man, therefore, is not free to change the meaning and purposes of marriage.

For the purpose of their own good: "It is not good that the man should be alone" (Gn 2:18). Conversely, it's for their own good, for their benefit, enrichment, and ultimately their salvation, that a man and woman join their lives in marriage. Marriage is the most basic expression of the vocation to love that all men and women have as persons made in God's image.

<u>And the procreation and education of children:</u> "By their very nature, the institution of marriage itself and conjugal love are ordained for the procreation and education of children and find in them their ultimate crown." Children are not added on to marriage and conjugal love, but spring from the very heart of the spouses mutual self-giving, as its fruit and fulfillment. Intentional exclusion of children, then, contradicts the very nature and purpose of marriage.

<u>Covenant</u>: While marriage involves a legal contract, this must be subordinate to the spousal covenant which provides a stronger, more sacred framework for marriage. A covenant goes beyond the minimum rights and responsibilities guaranteed by a contract. A covenant calls the spouses to share in the free, total, faithful, and fruitful love of God. For it is God who, in the image of his own Covenant with his people, joins the spouses in a more binding and sacred way than any human contract.

<u>The dignity of a sacrament:</u> Marriage between baptized persons is an efficacious sign of the union between Christ and the Church, and, as such, is a means of grace. The marriage of two non-baptized persons, or of one baptized person and one non-baptized person, is considered by the Church a "good and natural" marriage. While not sacramental, such marriages are holy unions that share in the same goods and purposes of sacramental marriage.



Offering Masses is a long-standing tradition in the Catholic Church. An individual may ask a priest to offer a Mass for several reasons: for example, in thanksgiving for the intentions of another person (such as on a birthday or an anniversary), for someone who is sick, or for the repose of the soul of someone who has died. An offering of \$10 for each Mass is the standard stipend, determined by the United States Catholic Bishops.

Mass intention requests are gladly accepted here at St. Joseph's through the parish office. We have many dates available for your special Mass intentions. If you request Mass for specific days, it is a good idea to make the request at least six weeks before the specified date(s). Requests can be made up to one year in advance. Mass cards are also available.



From wherever we stand in the church, our attention is drawn to the focal area of the liturgical action and to the three pieces of furniture we find

there: the presider's chair, the lectern and the altar. Formerly, this area was called the **sanctuary**



(Latin *sanctus*, "holy"), but when "sanctuary" is used we must be careful not to imply that this is the only holy area in the building, for indeed the entire church, the entire as-

sembly area, is a holy place.

In the front of the assembly area, we find a very special seat for the one presiding and leading the assembly. In the principal church of a diocese, this chair, the **cathedra** (from the Greek word "chair"), gives name to the entire building, Cathedral. Each church will have a **presider's chair** or bench and seating for the other ministers. This seating is arranged so that the presiding and functioning ministers are 'clearly part of the assembly, yet conveniently situated for the exercise of their respective offices" (*Environment*, 70).



Also in this focus area we see a reading stand, the **ambo**. After the 14th century, the ambo was replaced by a **pulpit** (Latin *pulpitum*, a raised platform for speaking). Today, the pulpit is usually replaced by a **lectern** (Latin *legere*, "to read") from which we proclaim the Word of God and upon which is placed the

lectionary, the book of readings from Sacred Scripture. Preaching can be done from the lectern, the chair or elsewhere.

In some churches, you may see a second, very simple lectern, which is used by the song leader and reader of the announcements. This main ambo or lectern "represents the dignity and uniqueness of the word of God" *(Environment, 74)* and is used only for that purpose.



The **altar** is the holy table upon which we celebrate the Lord's Supper. It functions as both altar and sacrifice and banquet table for the Eucharist, and is

both "a memorial of Christ's death and resurrection" and "a paschal banquet 'in which Christ is eaten, the heart is filled with grace, and a pledge of future glory given to us" (Second Vatican Council, *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy*, 47, quoting St. Thomas Aquinas). No ordinary table would be able to bear the weight of these symbolic functions; that is why this table "should be the most noble, the most beautifully designed and constructed table the community can provide" (*Environment*, 71).

When the Eucharist is celebrated, the table is covered with an **altar cloth**. On the altar is placed the bread and wine for Mass.



The bread is on a **bread plate** or **paten** (from *patella*, meaning "platter," "plate") and the wine is poured into a **chalice** (from *calix*, the Latin word for "cup" or "goblet").



We will also find in this area a **cross** or **crucifix**. This may be a processional cross with a floor stand or a cross hanging from the ceiling or on the wall. In the cross, we see the basis symbol of any Christian liturgical celebration. For in the Paschal Mystery of Christ, we find our own

image as a Christian Community.

Monday, October 1, 2018 — The Diocese of Springfield-Cape Girardeau reports an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor involving Msgr. John J. Rynish, deceased (2001). The allegation pertains to a period in the early 1970s. Following procedures outlined in diocesan Safe Environment Policies and Procedures, the Diocese has notified civil authorities of the allegation, including Missouri Child Abuse and Neglect and the Greene County Prosecuting Attorney. Additionally, pastoral support is being offered to the victim's family.

Msgr. Rynish was born in Kansas City, MO, and ordained a priest in 1943 for the Diocese of Kansas City. The Diocese of Springfield Cape Girardeau was formed in 1956 from territory that was prior to 1956, part of the Archdiocese of St. Louis and the Diocese of Kansas City. Msgr. Rynish retired from active ministry in 1993. He died Sept. 23, 2001.

Msgr. Rynish served as Pastor of St. Joseph Parish, Billings, 1979-1993, as well as elected Diocesan Administrator in 1969, at the departure of then-Bp. Ignatius Strecker until April 6, 1970; again, elected Diocesan Administrator in 1973 for a few months at the departure of then-Bp. William Baum, until Dec. 5, 1973. Msgr. Rynish is buried in Billings.

Assistance Provided to Victims — The Diocese will reach out to every person who has been the victim/ survivor of sexual abuse as a minor by anyone acting in the name of the Church, whether the abuse was recent or occurred many years in the past. This outreach will include provision of counseling, spiritual assistance, support groups, and other social services agreed upon by the victim and the Diocese. The Assistance Coordinator will aid in the immediate pastoral care of persons who claim to have been sexually abused as minors by clergy or other diocesan personnel.

BISHOP RICE REQUESTS EMERGENCY COLLECTION

Bishop Rice has requested that a special emergency collection be taken next weekend, October 13 & 14.
