From the Pastor ... 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B Theme: Renunciation and Stewardship


A song from the musical Godspell has this line concerning Jesus of Nazareth: "See (know) him more clearly, love him more dearly, follow him more nearly." Millions have done so over the centuries and countless others are still doing so today; and all have found the key to a meaningful life.

In the Catholic tradition, we know of two lifestyles in which Christians search for meaning and happiness. One of them is marriage, which is the lifestyle of most people. Facing life together, they try to see the Lord Jesus more clearly, love him more dearly and follow him more nearly through the good stewardship of all the beauty and goodness of life that God has bestowed upon them.

The other lifestyle, for those who are called to it, is celibacy for the sake of the kingdom." It is a life of renunciation, not as an end in itself, but for a life of discipleship.

If they are well understood, both lifestyles should witness to the same Christian mystery, namely God's kingdom of justice, love, and peace as already initiated in human history.



EUCHARISTIC MINISTER NEEDS AT 4:00 & 8:00 MASSES

Parish Family, we want to make you aware of a slight change to compensate for the shortage of Eucharistic Minister volunteers for the 4:00 and 8:00 Masses. The choir and parishioners seated in the choir loft will now come down to the altar to receive communion before all other parishioners. Therefore, only three Eucharistic ministers will be required for the distribution of Holy Communion. All Eucharistic Ministers in attendance for the 4:00 or 8:00 Mass should make special note of this change. The 10:30 Mass remains unchanged with four communion ministers needed.

Eucharistic Ministers will distribute the Eucharist after the communion line has ended to parishioners who wish to receive from their pew due to ambulation difficulties.

Please consider becoming a Eucharistic Minister to help alleviate the volunteer shortage. If interested, notify the Parish Office.



Often, the climax of a tour of a Catholic church is the **tabernacle** (*tabernaculum*, Latin for "tent"), the "little

house"

in

which the Blessed Sacrament is kept. The tabernacle is often the first thing one looks upon entering a church. The little golden door on the high altar with a red lamp burning before it was the sure sign that one was in a Catholic church. This is the case in our century-old parish of St. Joseph's.



Because of the honor given to Christ's body and blood, a red votive candle, known as the **sanctuary lamp**, is traditionally lit beside the tabernacle to show that it contains the consecrated elements. The sanctuary lamp reminds us that Jesus is present in the tabernacle, and churchgoers often pray before the tabernacle

and reflect on the mystery of Christ's presence in the Eucharist.

Other candles will be found in both devotional areas and the assembly area of the church. Once they were primarily used to give light for reading the Scriptures and celebrating the sacred action. Even in our age of electrical lighting, the symbolic function of the candles remain—the beautiful quality of candle-




light—the candle consumes itself in service of the sacred mysteries. Sometimes Catholics will light a **votive candles** in front of a statue or shrine as a reminder that their prayers continue even after they

leave the church.

Today with increasing frequency in more modern construction, we will not find a tabernacle on our tour of the assembly area of a Catholic church. When Catholics enter their parish church and do not immediately see the tabernacle, it is evident that more has changed than just rearranging furniture—there has been a major change in our understanding of the Eucharist. This change has upset not a few Catholics. We do not like liturgists and architects tampering with our faith, particularly our faith in the real presence of our Lord in the Eucharist.

The reasons, the very important and serious reasons, for taking the tabernacle from the altar in the sanctuary area and placing it in its own Eucharistic chapel are explained in the Bishops' statement on the environment for worship: "The celebration of the Eucharist is the focus of the normal Sunday assembly. As such, the major space of a church is designed for this action. Beyond the celebration of the Eucharist, the Church has had a most ancient tradition of reserving the Eucharistic bread. The purpose of this reservation is to bring communion to the sick and to be the object of private devotion. Most appropriately, this reservation should be designated in a space designed for individual devotion. A room or chapel specifically designed and separate from the major space is important so that no confusion can take place between celebration of the Eucharist and reservation. Active and static aspects of the same reality cannot claim the same human attention at the same time. Having the Eucharist reserved in a place apart does not mean it has been relegated to a secondary place of no importance. Rather, a space carefully designed and appointed can give proper attention to the reserved sacrament" (Environment, 78).



All Saints' Day is a solemn holy day of the Catholic Church celebrated annually on November 1. The day is dedicated to the saints of the Church, that is, all those who have attained heaven.

It should not be confused with All Souls' Day, which is observed on November 2, and is dedicated to those who have died and not yet reached heaven.

Although millions, or even billions of people may already be saints, All Saints' Day observances tend to focus on known saints--that is those recognized in the canon of the saints by the Catholic Church.

All Saints' Day is a Catholic Holy Day of Obligation, meaning all Catholics are required to attend Mass on that day, unless they have an excellent excuse, such as serious illness.
