From the Pastor . . . 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B Theme: Two Toyves Not to be Separated

No value in human life has been sung about so much as love. Poems, songs, and novels of all literatures of the globe deal with it endlessly. Almost no motion picture leaves it unmentioned. Jokes caricature it, wise sayings try to define what love really is, and suicide/murder quite often follows upon the failure of love. Hebrew literature, that is, the Bible, is no exception. It deals often with love, but relates it constantly to its deepest root, love of God.

Especially in the awareness of the New Jestament writers, love of God and neighbor cannot be separated. "Whoever loves God must also love his brother" (1 Jn 4:21). Any attempt to separate these two loves is bound to fail in Christian experience. "If anyone says, 'I love God,' but hates his brother, he is a liar" (1 Jn 4:20). And the other way around, loving the brother, but not paying enough attention to God in prayer and worship, results in failure as well. Many a social worker has tried to love God mainly or only 'horizontally' (i.e. in the brother or sister). Usually this does not last long. When frustrations undo our best efforts to love others, love of God is needed to keep going.

Today's First Reading and Gospel deal with this issue. Do you balance your love of God and neighbor in such a way that it is lasting?



STATUES OF ST. JOSEPH PARISH, Part II

ST THERESA, THE



LITTLE FLOWER – Therese Martin entered a Carmelite convent at the age of 15. As Sister Therese of the Child Jesus, she lived a hidden life. She was just 24 when she died of Tuberculosis. The world came to know her through her autobiography, *"The Story of A Soul."* She described her life as "a little way of spiritual childhood." She lived each day with unshakable confidence in God's

love. What matters in life is "not great deeds, but great love." "My mission—to make God loved—will begin after my death," she said. "I will spend my heaven doing good on earth. I will let fall a shower of roses." She considered herself "The Little Flower of Jesus." Trust in Therese is important, and when she wills, roses or their fragrance may appear.



ST ANTHONY AND THE CHILD JESUS – Once, as a guest in someone's home, Anthony was seen through an open window, deep in meditation and communion. He was holding Christ so single-mindedly in his heart that the Christ child was seen in his arms. He was a great preacher and "This is the friar who finds lost objects."



SACRED IMAGE OF DIVINE MERCY – In 1931, Jesus appeared to St. Faustina. She saw Jesus clothed in a while garment with His right hand raised in blessing. His left hand was touching His garment in the area of the heart, from where two large rays came forth, one red and the other pale (depicting blood

and water). She gazed intently at the Lord in silence, her soul filled with awe, but also with great joy. Jesus said to her, "Paint an image according to the pattern you see with the signature: Jesus, I trust in You. I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish. I also promise victory over its enemies already here on earth, especially at the hour of death. I Myself will defend it as My own glory. I am offering people a vessel with which they are to keep coming for graces to the fountain of mercy. That vessel is this image with the signature: 'Jesus, I trust in You.'' Divine Mercy Sunday is celebrated the first Sunday after Easter, the Feast of Mercy. Jesus assures that it is not in the beauty of the color, nor of the brush that lies the greatness of this image, but in His grace.

picture shows the Christ child, frightened by the terrifying vision of two angels showing Him the instruments of the passion. He has run to His Mother for reassurance, almost losing His sandal. His hands are turned palms down into His mother's, illustrating that the graces of redemption are in her keeping.

The angels are designated as the Archangels Michael on the left, carrying the lance and sponge of the crucifixion of Jesus, and Gabriel, on the right side, carrying a 3-bar cross used by Popes at the time and nails.

The Blessed Virgin Mary is wearing a dress of dark red, representing the Passion of Jesus, with a blue mantle, representing her perpetual virginity, and cloaked veil, which represents her pure modesty. The veil and her face itself are rounded, indicating holiness. Mary is looking towards the faithful, while pointing at her son, Jesus Christ. The Virgin Mary has a star on her forehead signifying her role as Star of the Sea while the cross on the side has been claimed as referring to the Greek monastery which produced the icon. Byzantine depictions of the Blessed Virgin Mary in art have three stars, one star each on the shoulder forehead. and one the on

The Greek inscriptions read **MP-ΘY** (Μήτηρ Θεοῦ, Mother of God), **OAM** (Ὁ Ἀρχάγγελος Μιχαήλ, Michael the Archangel), **OAF** (Ὁ Ἀρχάγγελος Γαβριήλ, Gabriel the Archangel) and **IC-XC** (Ίησοῦς Χριστός, Jesus Christ), respectively.

The Sacristan Ministry is a "behindthe-scenes"

service which can be performed by individuals or couples who wish to perform a needed service, but do not wish to be visible to the congregation. Some people are not comfortable being in front of the congregation as a lector, choir member or Eucharistic Minister. If you are shy about most ministries, Sacristan is ideal for you. The entire service of this ministry occurs before and after the Mass Liturgy.

<u>Mission</u>: The Mission of Sacristan is to set up the vessels before Mass. After Mass, the Sacristan takes the sacred vessels (ciborium, chalices, carafe, and cruet) to the sacristy and returns them to their proper places or resets for the next Mass.

<u>Volunteer Opportunity</u>: Sacristans are needed before and after the Saturday Mass and after the 8:00 and 10:30 Sunday Masses as scheduled and also at Holy Day Masses and any other extra liturgies by individual availability.

<u>Training</u>: Training is scheduled by appointment and takes place in the Sacristy and Sanctuary of the Church. It normally takes 30 minutes plus a supervised session at an actual liturgy.

<u>Time Commitment</u>: Depending on the volunteer response, we would like to assign each sacristan to serve at one or two liturgies per month. Sacristan duties take approximately 20 minutes before/after mass.

DIOCESE SEEKS SUPERINTENDENT of CATHOLIC SCHOOLS

The Diocese of Springfield/Cape Girardeau in southern Missouri seeks qualified applicants to fill a permanent, full-time position working as the diocesan Superintendent of Catholic Schools. Applicant must be a practicing Roman Catholic. Qualified individuals will have a Master's degree in education, preferably educational administration. Applicants should also have work experience in Catholic schools and in Catholic school administration and be able to assume duties on or before June 1, 2019. Applications will be accepted through November 30, 2018. The Catholic school system of Springfield-Cape Girardeau is comprised of 23 elementary schools (2,951 students in Pre-K through eighth grade) and three high schools (853 students). Offering Masses is a long-standing tradition in the Catholic Church. An individual may ask a priest to offer a Mass for several reasons: for example, in thanksgiving for the intentions of another person (such as on a birthday or an anniversary), for someone who is sick, or for the repose of the soul of someone who has died. An offering of \$10 for each Mass is the standard stipend, determined by the United States Catholic Bishops.

Mass intention requests are gladly accepted here at St. Joseph's through the parish office. We have many dates available for your special Mass intentions. If you request Mass for specific days, it is a good idea to make the request at least six weeks before the specified date(s). Requests can be made up to one year in advance. Mass cards are also available.



There is a spam email going around that looks like it is from someone we might know and respect – Bishop Rice,

Msgr. Reidy, etc. The first email is brief and asks for a favor. When the recipient replies, the mystery sender knows they have a good email address/willing person, so a second message goes out asking for money to be spent on a gift card of some sort. This is similar to the iTunes gift card series that went around a few months ago.

The "from" line is meant to look legitimate to get people to bite. If one hovers over the sender's email to see the details, it is usually easy to tell it did not come from that person. It will be from a made-up email address that will be nearly impossible to trace.

It is always best not to open such an email in the first place. However, if you do, ensure that you do not reply and then immediately delete/spam block the message. People who may have already sent a reply might want to pursue with your bank to secure your accounts.
