The gospel, written 2000 years before modern science, gives its account of this moment and sounds like it's on the right track: The sun will be darkened, the moon will lose its brightness, the stars will come falling from heaven and the powers in the heavens will be shaken.

Scientists have it all worked out. They tell us in great detail how all this will happen as the sun goes into decline, expands, and then, collapsing in on itself, explodes in an unimaginable conflagration. Everything else will, of course, go haywire. Planetary orbits and so on...distress, despair, disaster, destruction - the END!

Not so, asserts the gospel, confidently stepping beyond the limitations of science - not the end at all! "...then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory; then too he will send the angels to gather his chosen from the four winds, from the ends of the world to the ends of heaven."

Not only is it not the end, it seems, reassuringly, to be a new beginning. Firstly, it is the moment of the revelation of Jesus in all his glory. This truth should be the subject matter of a lifetime's fruitful meditation. To see our Lord, to behold his face, to be able to discard our faith in favor of the clear vision of him who is our shepherd and redeemer - ecstasy! Secondly, it is a moment of rescue, of salvation. Those of us who call ourselves disciples of the Son of Man, his chosen ones, who have a certain hope in his merciful love for us, will be gathered ... "from the four winds."

No need to be surprised at this. Is this not what a true shepherd does? Is it not his task to gather the flock and to save it from destruction? Is this not what he always promised? And no need to be surprised also, as the Psalms say, that his enemies will be blown away like chaff in the wind.

Clearly today the readings look forward to this moment of the dissolution of the world and the second coming of the Master. Just count the number of times the word "will" is used - and each time it is used with the force of a promise. The word of God has spoken and it will not pass away.

Today's readings, because they are part of the wider apocalyptic writings of sacred scripture, use images which announce the approach of the end. The disciples had read these images in the Old Testament and now they hear them from the lips of Jesus himself and the natural question, which comes to our minds too, came to their lips - "When, Lord, when will all this happen?"

This is a natural human question. Our minds like to join the dots to make logical connections which establish a timeline. Jesus, however, does not answer this question because, in his human nature, he does not know the answer.

But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; no one but the Father. We might find it puzzling that Jesus would give us so many signs of the end and yet not be able to tell us when the end would come. On one level, of course, this has a positive dimension in that it allows that final moment to remain a present possibility for all of us. Knowing the moment of our own death could cause us endless anxiety or, perhaps, to leave our turning to God to our final moments.

My own meditation on the subject leads me to understand that the end of the world, in a sense, parallels the end of our own life. We too have signs of the end of our life - a heart attack here, a cancer scare there, a near miss on the roads, a bout of pneumonia, or simply a headache. These are all signs of our mortality and they grow more insistent the older we get.

So we know the signs, they are clear enough, but they don't answer the question when, and so it is with the end of the world. <u>All we can do is be prepared</u>. We must stand ready as we live our lives in full view of that door which stands always open to receive us, the door to eternal life. It may be today, it may even be now, that we are called to pass through that door.

VESTMENTS— RITUAL CLOTHING

Vestments, the special ritual clothing worn by those who lead the assembly in prayer are "an appropriate symbol of their service" (Environment,



93) and add their own element of beauty to the celebration. The priest wears a long white garment, an **alb** (from albus, Latin for "white"). Over this is worn a **chasuble** (from the Latin for "little house").

Today these garments look quite different from our ordinary street clothing. Originally this was not the

case. The alb and chasuble find their origins in the ordinary garments worn in the later Greco-Roman world. Around the house both men and women wore an alb, a long loose-fitting garment. When going out in public they put on a more ornate garment, a chasuble, over the alb. If you attended Mass in fourth-century Rome, the

leader of the liturgical assembly would be dressed in much the same way as the priest today vests for Sunday Mass. But at that time, everyone in the church would be wearing an alb and chasuble!



Since the ninth century, the priest has also worn a

stole, a long piece of cloth about four inches wide draped around the neck. The origin and meaning of this vestment is lost in history.

Vestments are kept in the **sacristy** along with the sacred vessels.

Saturday, December 8, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. Even though this celebration falls on Saturday, it is still a Holy Day of Obligation, especially since this is the Patronal Feast-day of the United States. <u>Please note that the Saturday afternoon/evening Masses which are celebrated as anticipatory Masses for the Second Sunday of Advent do NOT fulfill the Holy Day Obligation. Therefore...</u>

OUR PARISH IS IN NEED OF A CHURCH CUSTODIAN

St. Joseph's Parish in Billings is looking for a proactive, efficient and dependable custodian who possesses an understanding of proper cleaning methods and is a practicing Catholic. Great for the person wanting supplemental income, this is a

part-time, hourly position averaging 8-10 hours per week and does not offer benefits. The Church Custodian will ensure that all publicly accessible areas of the church property are clean and ready for other staff members' and parishioners' use.

Essential Duties and Responsibilities include, but are not limited to:

- Clean church facilities by performing weekly duties in all public areas (including kitchens, classrooms, offices, and community areas) of the Parish Hall, the church, the church basement, and immediate surrounding outdoor spaces.
- Clean restrooms: Pre-spray disinfectants and bathroom cleaners; re-supply soap, tissue, and towels; clean toilets, vents, dust walls, doors and partitions; remove trash; clean and wipe dry fixtures, mirrors, and dispensers; spot wash walls, doors, and partitions; sweep and/or wet mop floors.
- Empty trash cans, ash trays, and other waste receptacles into refuse collection bag(s), trash cans; replace can liners. Dispose of trash in outdoor dumpster.
- Using proper cleaning solution(s) and cleaning cloths or dusters, dust, damp wipe and/or spot clean all horizontal and vertical surfaces such as desks, table tops, chairs, filing cabinets, book shelves, telephone instruments, computer equipment, appliances, walls, light switches, partitions, doors, windows and mirrors.
- Using vacuum cleaner and/or floor dusting/mopping equipment, vacuum, sweep, scrub, buff and/or dust/ mop all floors and baseboards.
- Clean glass and windows.
- Sanitize surfaces.
- Change light bulbs as needed.
- Make note of any mechanical & electrical malfunctions (locks, dead plugs, switches) and report to office.
- Make sure all lights are out and appropriate doors are locked when leaving an area.
- Return all cleaning materials and supplies to storeroom, refill items as needed.
- Maintain supply inventory and submit purchase requests for replenishment.
- Keep custodian closet clean, neat and orderly.
- Assist with preparation for and clean up from events, such as weddings, funerals, liturgical celebrations, and public/private events.
- Other duties as assigned.

Skills and Abilities:

- Custodial experience preferred, but not mandatory. Training may be required.
- Must demonstrate knowledge of proper chemical handling and procedures when working with cleaning agents including wearing gloves, goggles, or masks
- Understanding of cleaning techniques and safety procedures.
- Ability to lift up to 40 pounds.
- Ability to climb, bend, stand for long periods of time, and work in warm or cool environments.
- Must be able to follow written and verbal instructions.
- Flexibility to adjust schedule to suit the needs of the church.
- Motivation to work independently and with others to provide thorough, efficient custodial services.
- Ability to pass a background check.
- Practicing Catholic in good standing with the Church. Virtus training required upon hiring.
- High School diploma or equivalent.
