From the Pastor . . . Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe Theme: Jesus King and Judge of the Universe

In this final Sunday of the liturgical year, the Church invites us to celebrate the Lord Jesus as King of the Universe. She calls us to look to the future, or more properly into the depths, to the ultimate goal of history, which will be the definitive and eternal kingdom of Christ. He was with the Father in the beginning, when the world was created, and he will fully manifest his lordship at the end of time, when he will judge all mankind. In the Gospel passage drawn from the account of Saint John, Jesus appears in humiliating circumstances – he stands accused – before the might of Rome. He had been arrested, insulted, mocked, and now his enemies hope to obtain his condemnation to death by crucifixion. They had presented him to Pilate as one who sought political power, as the selfproclaimed King of the Jews.

The Roman procurator conducts his enquiry and asks Jesus: "Are you the King of the Jews?" (Jn 18:33). In reply to this question, Jesus answers in the affirmative: "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I have come into the world, to bear witness to the **TRUTH**. Everyone who is of the truth hears my voice" (18:37). Jesus speaks of kings and kingship, yet he is not referring to power, but to TRUTH. Pilate fails to understand: Can there be a power not obtained by human means? A power which does not respond to the logic of domination and force? Jesus came to reveal and bring a new kingship, that of God; he came to bear witness to the **TRUTH** of a God who is LOVE (cf. 1 Jn 4:8,16), who wants to establish a kingdom of justice, love and peace. Whoever is open to love hears this testimony and accepts it with faith to enter the kingdom of God.

Of this Kingdom, Prophet Daniel prophesied: "To him was given dominion and glory and kingdom, that all peoples, nations and languages should serve him; his dominion is an everlasting dominion, which shall not pass away, and his kingdom one that shall not be destroyed" (7:13-14). These words present a king who reigns from sea to sea, to the very ends of the earth, possessed of an **absolute power which will never be destroyed**. This vision of the prophet, a messianic vision, is made clear and brought to fulfillment in **Christ**: the power of the true Messiah, the power which will never pass away or be destroyed, is not the power of the kingdoms of the earth which rise and fall, but the power of **TRUTH and LOVE**. In this way, we understand how the kingship proclaimed by Jesus in the parables and openly and explicitly revealed before the Roman procurator, <u>is the kingship of TRUTH;</u> **THE ONE which gives all things their light and grandeur.**

In the second reading, the author of the Book of Revelation states that we too share in Christ's kingship. In the acclamation addressed to him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood," he declares that Christ "has made us a kingdom, priests to his God and Father" (1:5-6). Here too it is clear that we are speaking of a kingdom based on a relationship with God, with TRUTH, and not a political kingdom. By his sacrifice, Jesus has opened for us the path to a profound relationship with God: in him we have become true adopted children and thus sharers in his kingship over the world. To be disciples of Jesus, then, means not letting ourselves be allured by the worldly logic of power, but bringing into the world the light of the TRUTH and GODS LOVE. Jesus' second coming will consist of judging mankind and establishing forever his divine Kingdom. He reminds us that conversion is the only appropriate response to God's grace. We must be converted ever anew to the kingdom of God, to the Lordship of God, of TRUTH in our lives. It's the only condition of establishing his Kingdom.

We invoke the kingdom daily in the prayer of the "Our Father" with the words "Thy kingdom come." In effect we say to Jesus: Lord, make us yours, live in us, gather together a scattered and suffering humanity, so that in you all may be subjected to the Father of mercy and love.

2019 CALENDARS AVAILABLE NOW



The 2019 calendars have arrived and are in the vestibule of the Church. Please take one per family.



BELLS: The use of bells dates back to the 5th century when St. Paulinus introduced them as

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means to summon monks to worship. In the 7th century, Pope Sabinianus approved the use of bells to call the faithful to the Mass. During Mass, bells are rung



prior to the epiclesis in the Eucharistic prayer where the priest prays to the Holy Spirit to change the gifts of bread and wine into the Body, Blood, Soul & Divinity of Christ. The ringing of the bell alerts the congregation to the calling down of the Holy Spirit and prepared them for the consecration that immediately follows. The bells are rung a second and third time as the priest elevates and presents the Eucharistic Bread and Chalice filled with the Precious Blood alerting the congregation again that the transubstantiation has taken place and that the Body & Blood of our Lord is truly present on the altar.



CONFESSIONAL – In some churches, it is common to see one or more confessionals, small "rooms" built out from the side or back wall of the church

containing a place for the priest confessor to sit, separated by a screen or grill from the place for the penitent to kneel and confess his or her sins. Confessionals appeared in Catholic churches during the 16th century and were common until just recently. The current ritual for the individual celebration of the sacrament offers the penitent a choice between speaking face-to-face with the priest or the anonymity provided by the confessional screen. This option has necessitated the remodeling of confessionals in some churches and the construction of a reconciliation chapel in others. In the Catholic Church, confessions are only to be heard in a confessional or oratory, except for a just reason.



CREDENCE TABLE – A small table of wood, marble or other suitable material placed within the sanctuary of a church and near the wall at the Epistle side, for the purpose of holding the cruets, acolytes' candles, and other

utensils required for the celebration of the Mass.

The **hospitality table** holds the water and wine which is brought forth during Mass by parishioners as a community symbol.





HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION

Saturday, December 8, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. Even though this celebration falls on Saturday, it is still a Holy Day of Obligation, especially since this is the Patronal Feast-day of the United States. <u>Please note that the Saturday afternoon/evening Masses which are celebrated as anticipatory Masses for the Second Sunday of Advent do NOT fulfill the Holy Day Obligation. Therefore...</u>

Mass will be held Friday, December 7, at 6:00 pm, to fulfill the Holy Day Obligation.
