Why there is Suffering in the World?

The problem of suffering has been a concern throughout our history of salvation. Christians as well as other religions believe that the world was created by God Who is Omnipotent, Omniscient, Omnipresent and Benevolent. If the God we believe has all these attributes why then do we find evil in the world? Why doesn't He use His power to eliminate evil? Why does He allow evil to happen? Why do the innocents suffer? Why? Why? Why? ... There are many endless whys.

The question of human suffering, especially that of the just, was a big problem in biblical times. This was the problem Job was struggling with. Job was a good man yet he suffered terrible tragedies. Suffering is still a big problem. There are a lot of people today who could identify with Job. Think of all who suffer from poverty, hunger, sickness, injustice, oppression, tragedy, etc. The people of the Old Testament thought that people who suffered had sinned; suffering was a punishment from God for their sins they had committed. This idea was proved wrong when Job who was a righteous man encountered suffering. He asked the same questions, but did not get the answer.

We might be having similar questions. But there are no easy answers. What we know is that evil is the work of the devil. And also moral evil is the outcome of the misuse of human freedom; people choose to act against God's will, as consequence they cause suffering to themselves and even to the innocent. God is always good and powerful; He is working in order to eliminate suffering. This is why He sent His Son Jesus Christ whose mission was to eliminate suffering as we read in the gospels. We see in today's Gospel, Jesus does not give an answer to the question 'why suffering?' He does not accept the view that suffering was a punishment from God. Instead He engages in a healing ministry. Seeing people who were suffering from various illnesses and who were possessed by demons, He gives himself to each one of them, He heals them one by one and drives out demons who are the source of all evils and suffering. By doing this Jesus shows that God's power surpasses that one of the devil. The climax of God's power over evil was manifested by the resurrection of His Son Jesus Christ. By raising His Son Jesus Christ from the dead, God has proved that He is Omnipotent.

We are invited to participate in the healing ministry of Christ and alleviating people from suffering. We can accomplish this ministry by taking care of people who suffer and also by avoiding to inflict pain and suffering to our brothers and sisters.
