What Does the Catholic Church Teach About....? Question:

Ok. So I didn't answer all of the questions. I am asked to explain the vessels that are used during the Liturgy and the priestly vestments.

My Answer:

Let me start with the vestments. The official vestment of office is the *Stole* for both the priest and deacon. Typically you don't see the priest's stole during Mass because it is worn underneath the outer vestment, but the deacon's stole is typically visible, but I digress.

Here is the vestment layers which are very similar for the priest and deacon. The first vestment to be put on is the Alb. Typically white in color, but not necessarily, Deacon Bill wears an Alb that is more of a cream color. Then comes the Cincture, which is a braided waist band. The priest will tuck the stole into the cincture while the deacon will have it fastened in such a way to have cords draped to the side. Then the Stole is placed over the shoulders around the neck. Here is where a real divergence happens form priest to deacon. The priest will wear his stole around his neck so that the Stole hangs equally down the front of the alb. The deacon however will wear his stole draped from the left shoulder diagonally across his chest to the right hip. The final outer vestment for the priest is the *Chasuble*. This is the vestment that is typically seen at Mass. The deacon also has an outer vestment called a Dalmatic, which is a chasuble with sleeves. It is hard to distinguish between the Chasuble and the Dalmatic if you would look at the priest and deacon standing side by side. Wow! That's' it! Oh ya.

Now the vessels. The main vessels on the altar are the *Chalice*, which holds the Blood of Christ, the *Paten*, which holds the Body of Christ. There are linens that are used such as the *Corporal*, which is the square cloth placed on the altar at the offertory to set the Chalice and Paten on during the consecration. The *Pall* is the stiff square linen that is placed on top of the Chalice so that nothing inadvertently falls into the Precious Blood. The *Purificator* is the linen that is used to wipe the edge of the Cup during distribution of Holy Communion. It is also the linen used at the end of Communion when the Deacon purifies all of the vessels.

What else? Well there are the *Cruets* that are used during Mass that hold the water that will be used at several times. Most notably a drop of water is placed into the wine before consecration by the Deacon and then again when the priests washes (Symbolically) at the offertory, (Was away my sins, cleanse me from my antiquity).

The wine is typically brought forward in a vessel called a ${\it Flagon}$.

What about candles? The prescribed candle to be used is made mostly of Beeswax. This is an excerpt from New Advent.org the Encyclopedia," For mystical reasons the Church prescribes that the candles used at Mass and at other liturgical functions be made of beeswax (luminaria cerea. — Missale Rom., De Defectibus, X, I; Cong. Sac. Rites, 4 September, 1875). The pure wax extracted by bees from flowers symbolizes the pure flesh of Christ received from His Virgin Mother, the wick signifies the soul of Christ, and the flame represents His divinity."
