What Does the Catholic Church Teach About....? Question:

I was asked about Novenas and in particular the 54 day Novena and where they come from?

My Answer:

First the word Novena is associated most specifically with a prayer or set of prayers that are recited for Nine Consecutive Days, nine not fifty four.

So let me start with Novena and where the notion comes from. I am quoting from "The Catholic Encyclopedia on Newadvent.org" here:

A nine days' private or public devotion in the <u>Catholic Church</u> to obtain special <u>graces</u>. The <u>octave</u> has more of the festal character; to the novena belongs that of hopeful mourning, of yearning, of <u>prayer</u>. "The number nine in <u>Holy Writ</u> is indicative of suffering and grief" (<u>St. Jerome</u>, in Ezech., vii, 24; — P.L., XXV, 238, cf. XXV, 1473). The novena is permitted and even recommended by <u>ecclesiastical</u> authority, but still has no proper and fully set place in the <u>liturgy</u> of the <u>Church</u>. It has, however, more and more been prized and utilized by the <u>faithful</u>. Four kinds of novenas can be distinguished: novenas of mourning, of preparation, of <u>prayer</u>, and the <u>indulgenced</u> novenas, though this distinction is not exclusive.

There are specific Novenas sanctioned by the Church most especially associated with indulgences. It seems that many so called Novenas pop up from time to time for specific purposes, let's say for "For our Nation" after the elections. Probably not sanctioned by the Church Universal since it's a National prayer, but could be sanctioned by the local ordinary, such as a bishop or the Conference of Catholic Bishops.

So is it permissible to pray these special prayers? We pray for our country and should all of the time. We want God to look on our country with favor. We always need to keep in our mind that God is Universal. God is the creator of ALL, all countries, peoples, beings. This is a very hard concept to grasp when we grow up in a very specific time and place. Maybe we should be praying a Novena for understanding? Is there such a thing? Good question.

I always say that if I'm going to pray, especially Novenas, I want to look to the Church for guidance. What specifically are we praying for and are there any associated prayers or actions that must accompany them?

The Church states specifically that we are to pray unceasingly. The Church goes to great effort to fulfill this charge. Mass is celebrated somewhere in the world at all times. The Liturgy of the Hours (The Office) is being prayed unceasingly throughout the world by Religious and Laity together. So why not add a Novena to the prayer?
