

What Does the Catholic Church Teach About....? **Ouestion:** 

Has the Mass always been the Mass or has it changed? My Answer:

The answer to this is yes and no. Let me qualify the no to, "has it changed?"

The basic makeup of the mass has been the same since the beginning. We can see this in the early writings of the Church starting with St. Paul (52-55) in his letters to the various Churches, that he had established, in admonishing them to practice what he had been handed to him and that he handed on to them, most specifically the belief in the Eucharist, the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ given to the Church by Christ Himself.

A more complete description comes from Pliny (61-113) and Justin Martyr (138-161). Justin Martyr wrote in the year 155 ce. to the emperor at that time, as to what the Christian practice of worship was like. He describes the basic parts of the Mass as we understand it in our Liturgy today, mainly the introduction, the reading of the Word and the Eucharist, Holy Communion. He even speaks of the role of the Deacon. So as we will speak in subsequent articles there are parts that we today can identify as the Mass, the introduction, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist and ending with the sending.

During this period of time, that lasted approximately 1500 years, the commonality of the worship centered on these basic parts as described, however, the commonality of prayers recited centered on local traditions so that the readings for a given period of time probably were not the same throughout the Church although the worship practice was.

So in the year 1570 Pope Pius V elected to make the Universal Church worship the same in all churches throughout the world. At this he brought about the common liturgy, the Liturgy known as the Tridentine Liturgy or as we might know it as The Latin Mass. This brought all who fell under the auspices of the Holy Roman Catholic Church to a Universal way of worshiping at the Mass. As we know the common language used was the language of Rome, which was Latin. This was the end of the use of liturgy prayed in the vernacular of the local churches. Latin was now the common language to be used by proclamation of the Pope. This continued up until the time of the Vatican II Council, which declared that the use of the vernacular language of the local churches could once again be used although now there would be the continuation of the common Roman Missal that guided the Mass Liturgy. To put it simply, we would all worship the same from the same Roman Missal, but that the Liturgy could be translated into the common language of the local Church. In our case in the United States, English.

Since that time we have had an adjustment in the translation of the Roman Missal to be more in line with an authentic translation of words from Latin to English or in other words, more in line with the words of the Universal wording of the Missal.

As can be seen the intent of Vatican II was to bring some of the local aspect of worship back into the picture with still being aware of the Universality of the Liturgy. Thus we can attend a Mass anywhere under the Roman Rite and even though it is in a different language we can follow the various rites within the Mass, something we will talk about in subsequent articles. Next up will be the start with looking at the rites within the Mass

and a look at the nuances of the rites themselves.

I want us all to keep in mind that we are talking about the Roman Rite within the Catholic Church and not addressing any of the other legitimate Rites which exist under the Roman Catholic Church.
