
The Total Consecration to Jesus through Mary. (A discipline of daily prayer and preparation for renewal of Christian Faith)

St. Louis de Montfort's spirituality of "Total Consecration" brought a great renewal of faith to many French parishes of the 16th and 17 centuries. His writings on the place of Mary in our faith and on this approach spiritual growth was the basis of his canonization as a saint in 1947. St. Louis de Montfort also established orders for men and women in consecrated life. One of those, the Missionaries of the Company of Mary, continues the teachings of St. Louis and the publication of his writings.

Following the writings of this saint, we will offer a series not just study, but of prayer and spiritual growth in preparation for Lent. It will begin at St. Louis Parish Church in Lewisburg on Saturday, February 18th at 5pm, just before Mass and will end at Mass on Saturday, March 25, the Feast of the Annunciation.

What Does the Catholic Church Teach About....?

Question:

OK. Where was I?

My Answer:

The Liturgy of the Word. The first of two Liturgies within the Mass.

After we hear the Collect, all will be seated to hear the Word of God proclaimed. You did hear what I just said, Right? The Word Proclaimed. It is more than mere reading of Scripture. Reading Scripture can be done by anyone at any time, at home, in the car. etc. To Proclaim the Word of God that happens at Mass should be done by someone trained in this Very Important Ministry of the Church.

Just an aside. A Lay person who proclaims the Word of God is called a Reader. A Reader is a ministry within the Church. Sometimes they are referred to as a Lector, however, for someone to be a Lector they would need to be installed by the local ordinary, the bishop. Typically this is reserved for someone who will be receiving the Sacrament of Holy Orders.

Now onward we go. There are on any given Sunday four Scripture readings, the First Reading, the Psalm, the Second Reading and the Gospel. There is a Gospel Acclamation that may refer to the readings, but not necessarily Scripture.

The first reading will most normally be from the Old Testament Scriptures. There are, however, occasions when the first reading will be from the New Testament Scriptures, but this is a rarity. The Old Testament Scripture will most certainly be tied to the Gospel of the day in some way. Not so for the New Testament Scripture of the Second Reading.

As I alluded to, the Second Reading is most certainly from the New Testament Scriptures. It could be loosely tied to the Gospel, but not necessarily. Did you know that most of the New Testament are letters written by Paul?

The Gospel Scripture follows a specific Liturgical Year sequence. We are on a three year cycle of readings. The cycles are designated Year A, Year B and Year C. From that you can't really tell who wrote the Gospel. So let me enlighten you. Cycle A will be the Gospel according to Matthew. Cycle B will be the Gospel according to Mark. Cycle C will be the Gospel according to Luke. Well you might ask the question, What about the Gospel according to John? John is used on special occasions, typically leading up to a high feast of sorts. Also, a quick note to the Gospels

according to Matthew, Mark and Luke. These are known as the Synoptic Gospels, Synoptic meaning One Voice. These Gospels will contain much of the same form, parables, etc. Once the Word of God is proclaimed, then comes the

explanation of the proclamation and how we can understand it in relation to our own lives today. This would be the Homily.

Hopefully the heart will be stirred by the homily. There are two books used during this Liturgy. The Lectionary and the Evangelary, also known as the Book of Gospels. Peace. Deacon Tom
