What Does the Catholic Church Teach About....? Question:

I was asked by a couple of friends to speak about Holy Water, what is its function, how are we to use it, what graces are available to us through its use, where in Scripture can we find it, can it be used the wrong way? *My Answer:*

Well that's a lot of questions. I'm not sure I can adequately address them, but what the Hey, I'll give it a go.

First, Holy Water is holy because of the blessing placed on it, usually by a bishop or priest, but also by a deacon. As anything that is blessed it becomes a Sacramental, not a Sacrament. So briefly, a Sacramental is an item or object that is blessed and through its use we open ourselves to receive God's grace to draw us nearer to Jesus Christ.

So where do we see the use of Holy Water. The first thing that comes to mind might be as we enter church we dip our fingers into the Holy Water font and make the sign of the cross. This should be a reminder to us of our Baptismal promise to live a life of Christ. Each and every time we make this sign we are recalling the Trinity, the Crucifixion and our Baptism into the life of Christ Jesus.

That really then brings to the fore the most specific use of Holy Water. That use is at our Baptism. The proper formula for a Baptism is the water poured over the one being Baptized with the words, said at the same time, "I Baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

Remember that at each of the Sacraments there is an outpouring of God's grace for us so that we may live a life, a Holy life, in Jesus. This happens at our Baptism, our Confirmation, when we receive Holy Communion, when we are married or ordained and yes when we go to Confession. Sanctifying Grace is made available to us each and every time.

The other thing to remember is that we can call upon God's grace in these Sacraments at any time. Yes. We can call upon our Baptismal graces when we enter church and bless ourselves. It's important. We shouldn't just walk into church, splash in the water and flail our arms about without recognizing the possibility of Grace to be had.

So what are the possibilities for the use of Holy Water, most specifically for blessing, blessing ourselves, our houses, out beds, our children most anything can be blessed using Holy Water. As far as the bed goes, I had an elderly woman that I was visiting who always blessed her bed before she got in it to go to sleep. She said it protected her from the evil one. Can't argue with that.

What shouldn't you do with Holy Water? I would suggest not drinking it.
