DID YOU KNOW?

he liturgical year ends today with the celebration of the Solemnity of Christ the King. Pope Pius XI established this feast in 1925 to address increased Western secularism. In a world that was placing its faith and hope in weapons of destruction, in the acquisition of worldly goods, and a world that was eliminating God and His Law from government policy, Pope Pius sounded an alarm. He redirected our focus to Christ and His Universal Kingship. Sadly, only after the horrors of World War II, was Pope Pius XI seen as a true prophet, who tried to save the world from so much pain and sorrow! In his encyclical on the Kingship of Christ, Pius XI explained the various powers of Christ's Kingdom and its dual nature. Although Christ's Kingdom is primarily spiritual, he said it also extends to certain civic matters. He tried to help us see ourselves as God's subjects, not God's equal! He defended Christ's Kingship by pointing out that, unlike corrupt kings who usurp power and dominion through war and intrigue, Christ has Kingship over all people, places, things, and times by His nature and by His essence. As the eternal Son of God, as the Word through whom all things were made, Christ always has been and always will be the King of angels, of people and all created things! In addition, as our Redeemer who conquered sin and death by his own death and resurrection, Christ is truly our King! To Him we owe all our gratitude, honor, respect, and praise. Perhaps Pope Pius XI was right: we need to be reminded that our King's throne was a cross, His Crown was made of thorns, His royal scepter and robe were mockingly given to Him by the very soldiers who beat Him, and most of His earthly subjects abandoned Him at His death! Jesus Christ is a King of LOVE, for only a God-man filled with love would endure all that! Christians are to offer all their concerns, dreams, plans and hopes to our King. From our King we are gifted with order-with a Church-and the promised final triumph of the Gospel of Christianity and the conversion of all those opposed to Christ's Kingship over them. Thus, freed from all worry and concern as to how the "big picture" will end, we can busy ourselves with the day-to-day tasks of building Christ's Kingdom here on earth!

ARE WE PROPERLY ORIENTED?

To be properly oriented literally means to face east, toward the Orient! In secular lingo that means looking toward the rising sun, the new day, a new beginning. Biblical prophecies direct us to look east, for just as the Wise Men saw the sign of His coming, the Star, rising in the East, we will see the sign of Christ return in the Eastern sky. That's why churches once had to be so constructed that during the Eucharistic Prayer, both Priest and People faced the East. (Contrary to the naysayers who saw it as the Priest turning his back on the People, both faced the same way, as do pilots and their passengers, as courageous generals lead their armies, and as shepherds walk before their flock.) In this Prayer over the Offerings we pledge to direct all we do to God's glory or to "orient" all our words and deeds towards God's glory. And the best way to do this is to make sure all we say and do advances God's plan, and activates God's call and fulfills God's will. If this is not the case, we may be spiritually disoriented.

IMPORTANCE OF H20

Next to oxygen, water is the nutrient most needed for life. A person can live without food for a month, but most people can survive only three or four days without water. We start life in a watery cradle of amniotic fluid. Water makes up 85% of the blood, 70% of the muscles, and about 75% of the brain and is present in and around our cells.

In the body, water acts as a solvent, coolant, lubricant, and transport agent. It's needed to regulate body temperature, carry nutrients, remove toxins and waste materials, and provide the medium in which all cellular, chemical reactions take place. Fluid balance is vital for body functions and adequate blood volume.

A significant decrease in the total amount of body fluids leads to dehydration. Dehydration occurs when the amount of water a person takes in is less than the amount that is lost. Fluids are lost through the urine, skin, and lungs. Along with fluids, essential electrolytes such as sodium and potassium are also perilously depleted in a dehydrated individual.

FIVE FINGER PRAYER

Make the 5 finger prayer a part of your life.

I. <u>Your thumb</u> is nearest you. So begin your prayers by praying for those closest to you. They are the easiest to remember. To pray for our loved ones is as C. S. Lewis once said, a "sweet duty."

2. The next finger is the **pointing finger**. Pray for those who teach, instruct and heal. This includes teachers, doctors, and ministers. They need support and wisdom in pointing others in the right direction. Keep them in your prayers.

3. The next finger is the <u>tallest finger</u>. It reminds us of our leaders. Pray for the President, leaders in business and industry, and administrators. These people shape our nation and guide public opinion. They need God's guidance.

4. The fourth finger is our <u>ring finger</u>. Surprising to many is the fact that this is our weakest finger (as any piano teacher will testify). It should remind us to pray for those who are weak, in trouble or in pain. They need your prayers day and night. You cannot pray too much for them.

5. And lastly comes our <u>little finger</u> - the smallest finger of all which is where we should place ourselves in relation to God and others. As the Bible says, "The least shall be the greatest among you." Your pinkie should remind you to pray for yourself. By the time you have prayed for the other four groups, your own needs will be put into proper perspective and you will be able to pray for yourself more effectively.

DID YOU KNOW?

The capital of Bavaria is named after monks. Munich, Germany, is the country's third largest city and in German its name is actually Munchen, literally meaning "Monks," or loosely "Home of the Monks." The name goes back to the eighth century, and refers to a Benedictine monastery on the shores of Lake Tegernsee. In 1157, Henry "the Lion," Duke of Bavaria, gave these monks the land to start a marketplace. Thus, the city of Munchen was founded. Apparently the "Benedictine marketplace" was successful for it has grown into a city of over a million inhabitants. Munich's oldest church (Catholic, of course), the Peterskirche (Saint Peter's Church), was built in 1169, twelve years after the city was founded. It can still be seen today. Also, a fish is named after Monks. The monkfish, which is harvested along the Atlantic coast, is really a kind of shark with a huge head and toothy mouth. It acquired the name "monkfish" not because of its looks; but because, while most fishermen discarded it, the frugal monks used the fish for food.

ST. MATTHEW'S GOSPEL

Chances are you know St. Matthew's Gospel better than you know the other three Gospels. It contains the Sermon on the Mount with the Beatitudes and the Lord's Prayer. It highlights the ministry of Peter. In it, Jesus urges the disciples to works of mercy because "what you do to the least of my brothers, you do to Me." It records the stories of the Birth of Jesus, the coming of the Magi, the flight into Egypt and the slaughter of the innocents. Its account of the death of Christ thunders with an earthquake. For centuries, St. Matthew's popular Gospel dominated the Scripture readings Catholics heard at Mass. Most people assume that the author of this Gospel was the tax collector who decided to follow Jesus. However, it is not likely; most Scripture scholars believe that it was written by an anonymous Jewish Christian who lived at Antioch in Syria. The author borrowed much from St. Mark's Gospel - a pointless method if the writer were indeed an eyewitness to the events in Jesus' life. The Gospel circulated long before the name "Matthew" became attached to it. St. Matthew's Gospel seems intended for an audience of Christians very familiar with the Jewish way of life and the Jewish Scripture, which accounts for the many references to Old Testament passages. Its central message is embedded in the title associated with Jesus at His birth, "Emmanuel," "God is with us." In Jesus, God is indeed with us. To Jesus we respond as disciples. St. Matthew is usually symbolized as a man or an angel recalling the genealogy, which opens the book.

BLESSED ALEXANDRINA

This astounding story of Blessed Alexandrina, from the pages of *Inside the Vatican,* is one you'll not soon forget. Blessed Alexandrina Maria da Costa was born in 1904 in Balasar, Portugal. It was Holy Saturday in 1918 when Alexandrina's life took a *powerful* turn - a turn that put her on the path to beatification.

On that fateful Holy Saturday, Alexandrina was working at her job, sewing. Three men forced their way into the room where she was working. The men were intent on raping the innocent 14 year old child. Seeking to protect her purity at all costs, Alexandrina jumped from the window, a crippling fall of almost fifteen feet. Although partially paralyzed from her leap and suffering horrible pain, Alexandrina amazed people in her parish by dragging herself to church. But then total paralysis set in. Through the Blessed Mother, Alexandrina prayed to the Lord. She asked for recovery and promised to devote the rest of her life to missionary work. But that was not to be. Instead, after years of constant prayer and excruciating pain which she offered for the reparation of sinners, Alexandrina was asked by our Lord if she would accept an entire life of suffering to bring about the consecration of the world to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Alexandrina guickly agreed. Agony we can only imagine. Despite her total paralysis, Alexandrina miraculously rose from her bed every Friday for 5 years and literally lived the suffering of Christ's passion. A Portuguese missionary who witnessed Alexandrina's suffering described it this way ...

"2:24 p.m. When Jesus is led to the column, Alexandrina moves toward the bed and there leans on her hands. At the sight of Jesus being scourged, she receives on herself the quivering blows against the Lord, and from the violent contractions produced by the whips and the anguished groans that escape her lips, one can infer how much she is suffering."

Then, on October 31, 1942, Pope Pius XII consecrated the world to the Immaculate Heart of Mary - just as Christ promised would happen when Alexandrina accepted a lifetime of suffering!

There's also this miracle in Alexandrina's story ...

From 1942 until her death in 1955, Alexandrina lived entirely on the Eucharist. For a 40 day period, medical doctors carefully monitored her, making sure that she was totally without food and water. Astounded, the doctors also discovered that the Communion host remained intact in her stomach for 24 hours until she again received Communion.

Years after Blessed Alexandrina Maria da Costa's death, a Portuguese woman suffering from Parkinson's Disease - an incurable killing disease - began praying to Alexandrina. As the woman lay in her bed, paralyzed and very close to death, she felt something lift her up. She moved one leg and then the other. She could move her arms and hands, too. Then the woman stood up. She could walk!

The woman's prayers, asking Alexandrina's intercession, were answered. And it is this miracle that is virtually certain to lead to the canonization of Blessed Alexandrina Maria da Costa!

SAVE USED EYEGLASSES

SPEECH

Kurt Vonnegut gave this speech to the MIT graduating class.

"Ladies and gentlemen wear sunscreen. If I could offer you only one tip for the future, sunscreen would be it. The long-term benefits of sunscreen have been proved by science, whereas the rest of my advice has no basis more reliable than my own meandering experience. I will dispense this advice now.

Enjoy the power and beauty of your youth. Oh, never mind. You will not understand the power and beauty of your youth until they've faded. But trust me, in 20 years, you'll look back at photos of yourself and recall, in a way you can't grasp now, how much possibility lay before you and how fabulous you really looked. You are not as fat as you imagine.

Don't worry about the future. Worrying is as effective as trying to solve an algebra equation by chewing bubble gum. The real troubles in your life are apt to be things that never cross your worried mind - the kind that blindside you at 4 p.m. on some idle Tuesday. Do one thing every day that scares you. Sing. Don't be reckless with other people's hearts. Don't put up with people who are reckless with yours. Floss. Don't waste your time on jealousy. Sometimes you're ahead, sometimes you're behind. The race is long, and in the end, it's only with yourself. Remember compliments you receive. Forget the insults. If you succeed in doing this, tell me how. Keep your old love letters. Throw away your old bank statements. Stretch. Don't feel guilty if you don't know what you want to do with your life. The most interesting people I know didn't know at 22 what they wanted to do with their lives. Some of the most interesting 40-year-olds I know still don't.

Get plenty of calcium. Be kind to your knees. You'll miss them when they're gone. Maybe you'll marry, maybe you won't. Maybe you'll have children, maybe you won't. Maybe you'll divorce at 40, maybe you'll dance the funky chicken on your 75th wedding anniversary. Whatever you do, don't congratulate yourself too much, or berate yourself either. Your choices are half chance. So are everybody else's. Enjoy your body. Use it every way you can. Don't be afraid of it or of what other people think of it. It's the greatest instrument you'll ever own.

Dance, even if you have nowhere to do it but your living room. Read the directions, even if you don't follow them. Do not read beauty magazines. They will only make you feel ugly. Get to know your parents. You never know when they'll be gone for good. Be nice to your siblings. They're your best link to your past and the people most likely to stick with you in the future. Understand that friends come and go, but with a precious few you should hold on. Work hard to bridge the gaps in geography and lifestyle, because the older you get, the more you need the people who knew you when you were young.

Live in New York City once, but leave before it makes you hard. Live in Northern California once, but leave before it makes you soft. Travel. Accept certain inalienable truths: Prices will rise. Politicians will philander. You, too, will get old. And when you do, you'll fantasize that when you were young, prices were reasonable, politicians were noble, and children respected their elders. Respect your elders. Don't expect anyone else to support you. Maybe you have a trust fund. Maybe you'll have a wealthy spouse. But you never know when either one might run out. Don't mess too much with your hair or by the time you're 40, it will look 85. Be careful whose advice you buy, but be patient with those who supply it. Advice is a form of nostalgia. Dispensing it is a way of fishing the past from the disposal, wiping it off, painting over the ugly parts, and recycling it for more than it's worth. But trust me on the sunscreen.
