

2016 LENTEN REGULATIONS

- The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are Ash Wed.
 and Good Friday. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.
- On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted, and two (2) smaller meals, which, if added together, would not exceed the main meal in quantity. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.
- On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.
- The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and abstinence "substantially", or as a whole, is a serious obligation.
- The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.
- The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, February 14, 2016 to the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity, May 22, 2016.

QUESTION ?????

Does a person have to be confirmed to sponsor a person for baptism? Yes. The Code of Canon Law states: To be permitted to take on the function of sponsor a person must:

- be designated by the one to be baptized, by the parents or the person who takes their place, or in their absence by the pastor or minister and have the aptitude and intention of fulfilling this function;
- have completed the 16th year of age, unless the diocesan bishop has established another age, or the pastor or minister has granted an exception for a just cause;
- be a Catholic who has been confirmed and has already received the most holy sacrament of the Eucharist and who leads a life of faith in keeping with the function to be taken on;
- not be bound by any canonical penalty legitimately imposed or declared:
- not be the father or mother of the one to be baptized. A baptized person who belongs to a non-Catholic ecclesial community is not to participate except together with a Catholic sponsor and then only as a witness of the baptism.

Our CCD children and teachers continue their reflections and discussions on the holy season of Lent. Mr. Tom Pfeiffer's Fifth Grade Class have chosen to have each student make an Easter basket with their families. Each child will have filled their basket with Easter goodies and will also include a personal note to the recipient wishing them a blessed Easter. These baskets will be donated to The Center for Hope and Safety / Project Child. Our Second Graders will be praying an Our Father daily for the poor and homeless. As we move into the third week of Lent are there things that we can be doing as a family that reflects our understanding that this is a time of penance, fasting and alms giving?

The Miracle of the Scarlet Thread

With the destruction of the Second Temple in A.D. 70, the Jewish people lost the ability to perform sacrifices for the atonement of sins. Yet, according to Christianity, the efficacy of such sacrifices should already have ended at the time of the crucifixion about forty years earlier. For it was then that the Old Covenant, with its animal sacrifices for the atonement for sins, was replaced by the New Covenant, in which Jesus shed His blood once and for all for the atonement of sins.

Both the Talmud and the Zohar contain accounts of how, in the days of the Temple, the High Priest would once a year - on Yom Kippur, or the "Day of Atonement" - enter the Holy of Holies and offer sacrifice for the atonement of the sins of all Israel. Both mention the "miracle of the scarlet thread", in which a scarlet thread would miraculously turn white as the sign that God had accepted the sacrifice. From the account in the Zohar (Vayikra, Section 3, condensed):

All the sins are [taken] away on this day, the defilement of the soul and of the body ... All that day ... God makes atonement for Israel and purifies them from all their sins and they are not accused before Him ... On this day the priest ... makes atonement for himself and his house and the priests and the sanctuary and all Israel. ... They used to know by a certain thread of scarlet if the priest had been successful. ... (It was known by the thread changing its color to white, when there was rejoicing above and below. If it did not, however, all were distressed, knowing that their prayer had not been accepted).

The scarlet thread turning white would be the sign that God had accepted the sacrifice and had forgiven the Jewish people their sins ("though your sins be like scarlet, they may become white as snow; though they be crimson red, they may become white as wool"-Isaiah 1:18). Yet the Talmud itself reports that forty years before the Temple was destroyed, this great miracle, which gave divine confirmation that the High Priest's sacrifice had been accepted taking away the sins of the Jewish people, ceased to occur. The passage from the Talmud reads (Rosh Hashanah 31b):

Originally they used to fasten the thread of scarlet on the door of the [Temple] court on the outside. If it turned white the people used to rejoice, and if it did not turn white they were sad ... For forty years before the destruction of the Temple the thread of scarlet never turned white, but it remained red.

The Temple was destroyed about A.D. 70; hence the miracle ceased to occur about A.D. 30, which is precisely when the crucifixion took place - the crucifixion that replaced the sacrifice of the Old Covenant with that of Jesus on the Cross. According to the New Testament at the very moment that Jesus died on the Cross the curtain of the Temple that separated off the Holy of Holies was rent in two, symbolizing the end of the efficacy of the sacrifices of the Old Covenant (cf. Matthew 27:51; Mark 15:38; Luke 23:45). It is the Talmud itself that unwittingly confirms this when it recounts that from that time on - forty years before the destruction of the Temple in A.D. 70 - the scarlet thread never again turned white.

INTERESTING INSIGHT

The Most Reverend Chaput provides a straight forward and unqualified answer: "We're at a time for the Church in our country when some Catholics - too many - are discovering that they've gradually become non-Catholics who happen to go to Mass." And, as to who is responsible: "That's sad and difficult, and a judgment on a generation of Catholic leadership." "Sad and difficult" indeed and "a judgment on a generation of Catholic leadership," during which the Shepherds' failure to deal with negligence and abusive conditions and practices, has indeed spawned the loss or belief.

TEN COMMANDMENTS

Ten Commandments have occupied a predominant place in the catechesis of baptismal candidates and the faithful. This Lent we will present an examination of conscience based on the Ten Commandments so you can prayerfully probe your mind and heart to prepare yourself for the Easter Sacraments and/or Confession/Reconciliation.

I. "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage. You shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself a graven image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them." [Ex 20:2-5]

Faith. Do I nourish and protect my faith with prudence and vigilance, rejecting everything opposed to it? Do I disregard or refuse to accept what God has revealed or the Church teaches? Am I hesitant to believe, unwilling to overcome my objections or anxieties with faith? Is my spiritual laziness making me spiritually blind? Am I incredulous: neglecting revealed truth or refusing to assent to it? Am I heretical? Obstinate in my denial of essential truths or doubtful about them? Am I an apostate: do I repudiate the Christian faith? Am I schismatic: refusing to submit to the Pope or to communion with all the members of the Church subject to him?

<u>Hope.</u> Do I despair by not hoping for my personal salvation from God, or by not trying to attain it, or the forgiveness of my sins? Do I reject God's goodness and mercy? Am I guilty of presumption? Do I presume upon my own capacities and try to save myself without God's help? Do I presume upon God's almighty power or mercy, hoping to obtain His forgiveness without conversion and glory without merit?

Charity. Am I indifferent, do I neglect or refuse to reflect on divine charity, fail to consider its enduring goodness, deny its power? Am I an ingrate: do I fail or refuse to acknowledge God's charity and return God's love? Am I lukewarm, hesitant or negligent in responding to God's love? Am I a spiritual sloth refusing God's joy and peace? Am I repelled by God's goodness? Do I believe God hates me, or anyone else, which is contrary to God's loving goodness? Do I adore and acknowledge God as the Creator and Savior, the Lord and Master of everything that exists? Do I respect and submit to God and His ways? Do I pray regularly, so as to grow in my relationship with God? Do I pour out my heart with prayers of praise, thanksgiving, intercession and petition? Do I offer my life as a sacrifice to God for all He has given me? Do I seek the truth about God and religion? Do I help make known the truth God has revealed to us, His Church? Do I genuinely respect those of other faiths or different views? Do I respectfully challenge the non-religious or lukewarm? Do I have any non-Christian religious practices or beliefs? Do I believe God, the Church or its sacraments and sacramentals work by magic? Am I overly caught up in the mere external performance of rites and rituals, rather than their deeper meaning? Do I make divine what is merely human? Do I honor or revere creatures in place of God, whether this be gods or demons (for example, Satanism), power, pleasure, race, ancestors, the state, money, horoscopes, astrology, recourse to mediums etc.? Do I test God by putting myself in the path of temptation? Have I been sacrilegious by profaning or treating unworthily the sacraments or other liturgical actions, as well as persons, things, or places consecrated to God? (This is a grave sin especially when committed against the Eucharist.) Have I added to the atheistic tone of today's world by ignoring God or neglecting to include God in my daily life and all my decisions? Do I deny or neglect God's unique place in this world, equating faith and religion with anything else? Next week: more of this "examination of conscience" based on the Ten Commandments.

SCRIPTURE QUESTION

Who copied and conserved the Bible during the interval between 400 AD & 1440 AD?
