



## Keeping the Faith

August 15<sup>th</sup> was the feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin into heaven. The Gospel celebrates the feast of Mary's life. She was blessed to be chosen the Mother of God. Although Mary is not mentioned in the gospels after Pentecost, it is thought that she lived a life of prayer. Mary often seemed to be silent, but what a silent force. Her example teaches us to be accepting of whatever God has in store for us. In the year 650, August 15<sup>th</sup> was chosen for the glorification of Mary. The word "assumption" came into use in 770 and the teaching of the Mary's assumption was finalized in 1950. The feast then became part of the liturgical calendar.


Today's Gospel continues with Jesus telling His disciples to "Come eat of my food and drink of my wine. My life, my love-be my flesh and blood and you will live forever." The Jews weren't paying attention to what He was saying, but were more worried about Jesus. Who does he think he is, giving us flesh to eat and bread to last more than a lifetime? I thought He was a Jew. Jews are not supposed to eat blood. His flesh and blood are life giving for us. It is the most important reason that we attend Mass. We receive the Eucharist and are to go out and be the Eucharist to others. Ephesians tells us to 'be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms, hymns and spiritual songs, singing and playing to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks always and for everything'-until the Lord returns. What is your most life giving food and drink?

Let's share our "Bread of Life" with each other. St Cyril, Incarnation, and Risen Lord are sponsoring a program for adults this fall to help renew our faith and develop a deeper relationship with Jesus. The program is titled, "Christ Life". It will be once a week for seven weeks. We will share a free meal, watch a DVD, and discuss the DVD. Save these dates" September 26<sup>th</sup>, October 3<sup>rd</sup>, October 10<sup>th</sup>, October 17<sup>th</sup>, October 24<sup>th</sup>, October 31<sup>st</sup>, November 7<sup>th</sup>(retreat), and November 14<sup>th</sup>. **Breaking Open the Word: John 6:51-58**

**TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**



If the alb is the premier baptismal garment, then why are there so many other styles of vesture in evidence in our parishes? In some places, altar servers and other ministers might wear a garment, usually black, called a cassock. Over that is normally worn a white garment (a "surplice"), reminiscent of the alb but much shorter, often of starched linen and trimmed with lace. The cassock is not a liturgical garment, but a clerical robe. Its origins lie in the religious habit of monks. By the late Middle Ages, diocesan priests and clerics increasingly were encouraged to emulate religious priests. Very small boys were often apprenticed to monasteries, especially for music education, and would be invested with a cassock and sometimes even inducted into the ranks of clerics.

For centuries before the Reformation, it was required that all men entering higher education be clerics, and so the cassock and its variations became familiar academic garb. At the Reformation, many ministers retained a form of the cassock as ordinary dress, rejecting liturgical garments. In the seventeenth century, the English Civil War was in part provoked by the Archbishop of Canterbury's insistence that ministers wear surplices. Although the Episcopal Church now retains "cassock and surplice" as the normal dress for lay men and women assisting at liturgy, Catholics are increasingly attentive to the deeply traditional treasure of the alb, our baptismal robe, when special liturgical vesture is needed.

**Diocesan Choir Auditions**


