SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

2 Kings 4:42-44 Ephesians 4:1-6 John 6:1-15

<u>Miracles Do Happen!</u>

Is the miracle in today's Gospel about food enough to feed the crowd, or is the miracle in today's Gospel about sharing? Miracles are performed for the benefit of the recipient. Jesus wanted nothing from this miracle for himself. This miracle is about sharing. It is about giving of yourself and your resources. This is the lesson that Jesus is trying to teach!

Today's Gospel is not about hoarding one's resources or one's time or one's talent. It is about giving and sometimes giving until it hurts! And it is about getting others to do likewise. When did we challenge another person to give of the talents that they have? When did we teach our children to give generously? When have we witnessed the surprise that seemingly have no explanation? When did someone come into our life at our most vulnerable moment? Do we believe in miracles?

From today's first reading we know Elisha believed. He ordered that multitudes be fed and there was some left over. Again, it is the story of plenty, the story of responding to human need, the story of sharing. Sharing has the quality of bringing people together. It is what binds a neighborhood, a community, or a parish. It makes no difference if the sharing is about a tragedy or about a celebration.

In todays' second reading from the Letter to the Ephesians, Paul speaks of the unity that must be preserved among us. Unity can only happen when equality happens. Sharing is an important part of preserving the unity among us. We have *one Lord, one faith, one baptism*. How then, can we not share what we have? How can we not share the Lord who has been so good to us. Will others never come to know God because we refuse to share? The dimensions of sharing to preserve the unity among us reach far and wide.

Do we find even the most minute opportunity to give something of what we have been given? Paul invites us to do this with *perfect humility, meekness, and patience*. Are we willing? Can we remember when someone did just this for us? What would our life be, where would we be today, if someone had not done likewise? Does gratitude not move us? Yes, my friends, miracles can happen! Are we willing to be the workers of them for others?

Bread Left Over

Today's liturgy brings together several strands of Old Testament expectation to reveal Jesus as Israel's promised Messiah and king, the Lord who comes to feed His people. Notice the parallels between today's Gospel and First Reading. Both Elisha and Jesus face a crowd of hungry people with only a few "barley" loaves. We hear similar words about how impossible it will be to feed the crowd with so little. And in both the miraculous multiplication of bread satisfies the hungry and leaves food left over.

The Elisha story looks back to Moses, the prophet who fed God's people in the wilderness. Moses prophesied that God would send a prophet like him. The crowd in today's Gospel, witnessing His miracle, identifies Jesus as that prophet. The Gospel today again shows Jesus to be the Lord, the good shepherd, who makes His people lie down on green grass and spreads a table before them.

The miraculous feeding is a sign that God has begun to fulfill His promise, which we sing of in today's Psalm - to give His people food in due season and satisfy their desire. But Jesus points to the final fulfillment of that promise in the Eucharist. He does the same things He does at the Last Supper - He takes the loaves, pronounces a blessing of thanksgiving (literally, "eucharist"), and gives the bread to the people. Notice, too, that 12 baskets of bread are left over, one for each of the apostles.

These are signs that should point us to the Eucharist - in which the Church founded on the apostles continues to feed us with the living bread of His body. In this Eucharist, we are made one body with the Lord, as we hear in today's Epistle. Let us resolve again, then, to live lives worthy of such a great calling.

Please, know that as part of the registration process, all new students in the Religious Education Program must have a long form copy of their Baptism record from the church where the sacrament was received.

2016 CORI FORM TO BE COMPLETED BY ALL VOLUNTEERS

Massachusetts State law requires any person 17 years of age and older, who serves as a volunteer in any parish ministry, must complete a CORI form (Criminal Offense Record Information). This form requires verification of identity with a photo document (e.g. Massachusetts Drivers License or passport). There are no exceptions to this requirement!

Fulfilling this legal requirement is one way we demonstrate our commitment to protect all our parishioners and all who visit with us ..especially the children and the elderly, who are the most vulnerable among us. Please, come to the rectory office any day Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:30am and 2:30pm to complete the CORI Form for 2016. We thank you for your cooperation!

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
