

St. Charles Lwanga & Companions

St. Charles Lwanga and companions were burnt alive in Uganda in 1886 by King Mwanga. The king hated Christians and was especially angry that Charles Lwanga, the head page, was not only protecting the younger pages from the king's advances, but also teaching them the Catholic faith. When the king challenged their faith, the young men said they would keep the faith until death. The king immediately condemned them to death.

Charles Lwanga was separated from the others and slowly burned to death, starting at his feet. He prayed for his persecutors throughout the extended torture.

In all, 21 young men, aged 13-25, bravely gave their lives to Christ

Their Feast Day is June 3rd.

Dear Parishioners-

Last week, I had met with Bishop Richard Pates in regards to having a permanent deacon for our parishes. He has granted permission to Deacon Dave O'Brien to serve the parishes of St. Thomas Aquinas, Immaculate Conception, and assist on occasion at Simpson College. Deacon Dave O'Brien has had extensive experience working with the youth at Dowling Catholic High School-not only on the field but off the field. He has also had over 8 years of hospital ministry experience. He is currently and will remain as Director of Pastoral Care at Mercy Hospital in addition to being a deacon for our parishes. He has been serving at St. Francis of Assisi parish in West Des Moines for the past 15 years. Permanent Deacons are generally married men who do serve at the altar and usually have some outside ministry. They can baptize, officiate at Weddings without a Mass and Funeral Liturgies without a Mass, proclaim the Gospel, and give homilies. With his level of energy and enthusiasm, he will be a tremendous asset for our parishes.

This coming week, Friday June 5, 7 p.m. Deacons Andrew Windschitl and Luis Mejia Mejia will be ordained to the priesthood at St. Ambrose Cathedral. I would invite all of our parishioners to attend this wonderful celebration of two young men who are willing to give their lives in service and sacrifice to God and the people of God of the Diocese of Des Moines, Iowa. I had the great privilege of being a pastor-mentor to Deacon Andrew Windschitl two summers ago in Earling and Defiance Iowa. I enjoyed him and his work among the people. I believe these are two fine men who will give their all to God and the people of God. Please join me in celebrating

their ordinations this coming Friday.

Last, but not least, this Friday June 5, we will begin Exposition, Benediction, and Reposition of the Blessed Sacrament on an on-going First Friday basis. We will begin with exposition and benediction following the 8 a.m. Mass and repose the Blessed Sacrament at Noon. 

'About Rome" Just to Pique your Curiosity... The Basilica of Saint Mary Major

This is one of the four Papal Basilicas of Rome, the others are:

St. Peter's, St. John Lateran, and St. Paul Outside the Walls.

Saint Mary Major is the oldest and largest of the 26 churches in the city of Rome dedicated to Mary the Mother of Jesus. It holds the icon of Mary known as



Salus Populi Romani, "The Health of the Roman People", said to have been painted by St. Luke. The basilica also houses the crib of Jesus from Bethlehem.

Erected on the site of a Marian apparition and outlined by a miraculous August snowfall, (miraculous because it never snows in Rome, much less is August), every year on the Feast of Our Lady of the Snow, August 5th, one of the tiles in the celling is opened and shredded white rose petals are dropped to remember this great miracle.

The Basilica of St. Paul outside the Walls

The name of the Basilica comes from the fact that the Apostle Paul, when sentenced to death, needed to be taken outside the walls of the city because he was a Roman citizen. After his beheading and burial the early Christians erected a shrine over his grave, and pilgrims would visit giving honor to this Great Apostle and author of more than half of the New Testament.



In the Basilica are images of every Pope dating back to Saint Peter. Legend has it

that when all the frames are filled, the world will end. The good news is that there are still about 13 frames remaining.
