

Merry Christmas! Remember the song about the Twelve Days.

Christmas celebrates God's love for humanity. This liturgical season began with the Nativity of the Lord and included the Feast of the Holy Family on December 30. Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God. Next Sunday is the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. The Christmas Season will end with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord on Monday January 9.

On New Year's Day we honor Mary. At various times the start of the Gregorian calendar year has also been celebrated as the Octave Day of Christmas, the Feast of the Lord's Circumcision, and a World Day of Prayer for Peace. See Father Turner's article on page four of this bulletin.

Customs associated with next weekend's celebration of the Epiphany included the Proclamation of the date of Easter and other moveable feasts and the house blessing (with chalk) 20+C+M+B+17

The archdiocesan focus for 2017 and beyond is Renew My Church. (See the two columns at the right of this page.) As this initiative moves ahead, Saint Hugh Parish is being grouped with Saint Pius X Parish (Stickney) and Saint Mary Parish and School (Riverside) for planning purposes. Continue to watch the bulletin for information and pray that all of our parishioners may grow in holiness through this process. You play an important role in this renewal of our Church.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

Renewal has always been our call

The Archdiocese has changed in significant ways over the past several decades. Demographics have shifted dramatically, some buildings are in disrepair, and we have fewer priests to pastor. Yet, at the same time, there is new life as immigrants continue to make Chicagoland their home, as we ordain enthusiastic and energetic new priests and as we live in the historic time when Pope Francis is leading us to live in the joy of the Gospel. Thus, we should not be afraid to face our challenges, but embrace them, seeing this moment as a graced opportunity to chart new ways to live out our mission more fully.

We are called to make all things new in Christ

Christ called St. Francis of Assisi to "Rebuild My Church." As we are reminded by the image of the San Damiano Cross, Christ called Francis to, "Go, rebuild my church." Francis came to understand that Christ was calling him to renew the Church, and not just rebuild a structure. That is the task before us.

Pope Francis has called us to dream

big for the Church. "I dream of a 'missionary option', that is, a missionary impulse capable of transforming everything so that the Church's customs, ways of doing things, times and schedules, language and structures can be suitably channeled for the evangelization of today's world rather than for her self-preservation."

Cardinal Cupich is calling us to renew the Church in Chicago. "Just as our ancestors responded in faith to their dreams and built the church we have today, it is our time to dream big and to take up this work."

January 1 by Paul Turner

January 1 is New Year's Day to most of the world, but in the Catholic Church it is also the solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God. This is a relatively new title for the day. Older Catholics will remember that we used to call January 1 the feast of the Circumcision.

Circumcision may not seem like much to have a feast about. But the day commemorated an event in the life of Jesus, just as we have days for his conception, birth, presentation in the temple, baptism, transfiguration, death, and resurrection. Luke specifically mentions the circumcision of Jesus (2:21). It took place, according to the custom, on the eighth day after his birth. That is why the feast commemorating the event fell on the eighth day of Christmas. It just happened to be New Year's Day. The same passage from Luke says Jesus then received his name.

That is why the old calendar celebrated the Most Holy Name of Jesus on the Sunday between the feasts of the Circumcision and the Epiphany. If no Sunday intervened, the feast occurred on January 2. It is now an optional memorial on January 3.

In present times the Gospel passage for January 1 still refers to the circumcision, but the new title for the feast seems to have another verse in mind, Luke 2:19. There we hear that Mary treasured all the things that happened and the words that were said and pondered them in her heart. On the octave day of the birth of Jesus, we celebrate Mary, who bore him.

On January 1 we are also expected to pray for world peace. In the United States, this day is a holy day of obligation unless it falls on a Monday or a Saturday.


Treasures from the tradition

"Octave" comes from the Latin word for "eight," and since eight is one step beyond seven, the number of days in a week, it has long been seen as a symbol of perfection, completion, and new beginnings. Early Christians called Sunday the "eighth day," since it was the day after the Sabbath and a day of resurrected life, the Lord's Day. By the seventh century, people regarded the eight days after Easter Sunday as one great day, an octave, one glorious feast when people were forbidden to fast or kneel. In the seventh century, Pentecost acquired an Octave, too. Christmas didn't claim the honor of a continuous feast, but it did get an Octave Day. January 1 is the oldest Marian feast, the Octave of Christmas. It was originally a feast of the motherhood of Mary, although for centuries until 1969 it was called the Feast of the Circumcision. Our reformed calendar follows the earlier tradition of celebrating Mary as Mother of God.
