Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As a new year begins, I want to assure you of my prayers for you, your families, and your parish communities. I also want to share some important information about *Renew My Church*.

As you may already know, *Renew My Church* is an archdiocesan initiative that involves all the people of the archdiocese and their faith communities. The goal of *Renew My Church* is to make our parishes more vital and more sustainable. We do this not on our own initiative but in response to the call of Christ, which was first heard by those disciples recounted in today's gospel. The call is the same as it was in those early days of the Church: to be His disciples and take responsibility for carrying on His mission in our time. The place to start is by working together to make our parishes vibrant communities that form missionary disciples of Jesus. This will also mean being realistic about our limited human and material resources and evaluating how our present structures may need to be organized differently to keep pace with changing realities.

A very important part of the process of *Renew My Church* are the parish groupings that will work to plan for the future and discern where God is leading us. After receiving consultation and feedback from you, the priests of the diocese, and parish pastoral councils, we are announcing the groupings today. Your parish will be part of a grouping that will enable you to assess, plan, and discern how best to meet the needs of the future in a way that is both reasonable and in conformity with God's will for us.

Each grouping will have guidance for its process of reflection and discernment. Everything, however, begins with building relationships across parishes in a given grouping. That means getting to know each other and perhaps sharing some common projects or events, such as retreats, lectures, or community service for those in need. With future guidance and facilitation, this will develop in more specific planning and discernment directions. Today, your pastor will share a list of the parishes in your grouping.

Renew My Church will undoubtedly involve leaving behind familiar patterns and demand that we move outside our comfort zones. In a word, it will require sacrifice, but that has always been true for the Church whenever we have taken up new challenges. I am convinced that we are up to the task, and willing to do whatever it takes to build our capacity to pass on our faith to future generations. That is what is at stake in the *Renew My Church* process. I encourage you to become involved and pray for its success.

From the Pastor's Desk

Today is the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time and the start of Catholic Schools Week. The Archdiocese of Chicago lists twenty-one elementary schools and four high schools within a five mile radius of the 60534 zip-code. For links to the individual school's websites, visit: schools.archchicago.org

The Cardinal's letter that I read at each of the Masses last weekend is reprinted on the cover of this bulletin. Saint Hugh Parish (Lyons) is in the grouping that includes Mater Christi Parish (North Riverside), Saint Mary Parish and School (Riverside), and Saint Pius X Parish (Stickney). I am planning to attend a meeting of the priests of the Archdiocese of Chicago on February 16 regarding the next steps in the Renew My Church process.

On Thursday we will celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. February 2, forty days after Christmas, has been given the name *Candlemas* since one tradition associated with this feast is the blessing of candles used in prayer. Parishioners are invited to bring candles used for devotional purposes to Thursday's 10:30am Mass to be blessed with the candles that we use in church.

Since 1997, the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is also recognized as the World Day for Consecrated Life for women and men in consecrated life are called to reflect the light of Jesus Christ to all peoples.

Notice that the weekly *Vocation thought* on page five of this bulletin contains a link to Chicago Archdiocesan Vocation Association (CAVA) a ministry sponsored by the Office for Religious of the Archdiocese of Chicago. Active for 35 years CAVA is an association of Roman Catholic Religious Sisters, Brothers, Priests, Consecrated Laity and

others who are active and supportive of vocation ministry.

Friday February 3 is the optional memorial of Saint Blase. Using unlit candles that were blessed the day before, this celebration includes the tradition of the blessing of throats. We will invoke the intercession of the martyred bishop following the homily at the morning Mass. This is also the baptismal name-day of our Archbishop, Cardinal Cupich; pray for him.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

Sing to the Lord - As we begin rehearsing with our choirs again this season, reflecting on why we have a children's choir can be helpful. David Nastal puts it this way:

Putting those experiences in a spiritual context can strengthen a child's belief in the constant presence of God. 

Unfortunately, for many of us, pride and ego enters our lives and we think we can live without God. Remember – God first in all circumstances.



Saint Blase by Paul Turner

On St. Blase's day, February 3, many Catholic communities offer a blessing of throats. The custom began in the 16th century, although Blase is thought to have died about the year 320.

Little is known with certainty about his life, but Blase lived in Armenia, where he is remembered as a bishop. To escape the persecution of Christians under the emperor Licinius, Blase hid in a cave. Wild animals thronged to him because he healed their sick, according to a legend.

Eventually, the legend continues, hunters discovered him and took him to civil authorities. On the way he rescued a poor woman's pig from the mouth of a hungry wolf. Unmoved, the anti-Christian authorities imprisoned Blase. The grateful pig-owner brought him candles to brighten his cell. While in jail, Blase miraculously dislodged a fishbone from a boy's throat. The memory of these events—the use of candles and the healing of a throat— influenced later devotions. Blase was tortured with the iron combs used to card the wool of sheep. Then he was beheaded.

Blase is the patron of those with sore throats. On his day the faithful are blessed with this prayer: "Through the intercession of St. Blase, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from diseases of the throat and from every other illness. In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." The minister offering the prayer holds two unlit candles in the form of an X against the bare throat of the recipient. Anyone may invoke this blessing. If a priest or deacon gives it, he makes the sign of the cross over the faithful to conclude it.

Treasures from the tradition

Until very recent decades "Holy Thursday" and "Good Friday" were centered on personal pious devotions, not public liturgy. In urban America, at least in cities with a significant Catholic population, Holy Thursday was about veneration of the Blessed Sacrament. People were encouraged to walk to seven churches for a "visit" to each parish's repository, a kind of temporary tabernacle on a side altar, closer in proximity to the faithful than the usual tabernacle on the distant high altar. On Good Friday, the most popular form of devotion was the Stations of the Cross, or a three-hour program of word and preaching beginning at noon.

The Holy Thursday seven-church hike was a way of participating in a custom of the city of Rome. Traditionally, each day in Lent was assigned to a particular parish church or basilica in the city. Each week of Lent thus had seven churches, and pious people tried to get to each one of them. The pilgrimage was a symbol of unity and also the journey of faith. Originally, the pope would go to each place for a liturgy, but political strife removed the pope from Rome in 1305. With the papacy relocated in France, the custom ceased until Pope Leo XIII expressed interest in restoring it in 1900, and Blessed John XXIII fully restored the custom in 1959. By the time Pope Leo began to revive the custom, many American cities had enough parishes and monasteries that the faithful could vicariously participate in the revived tradition of station liturgies by a very long walk
