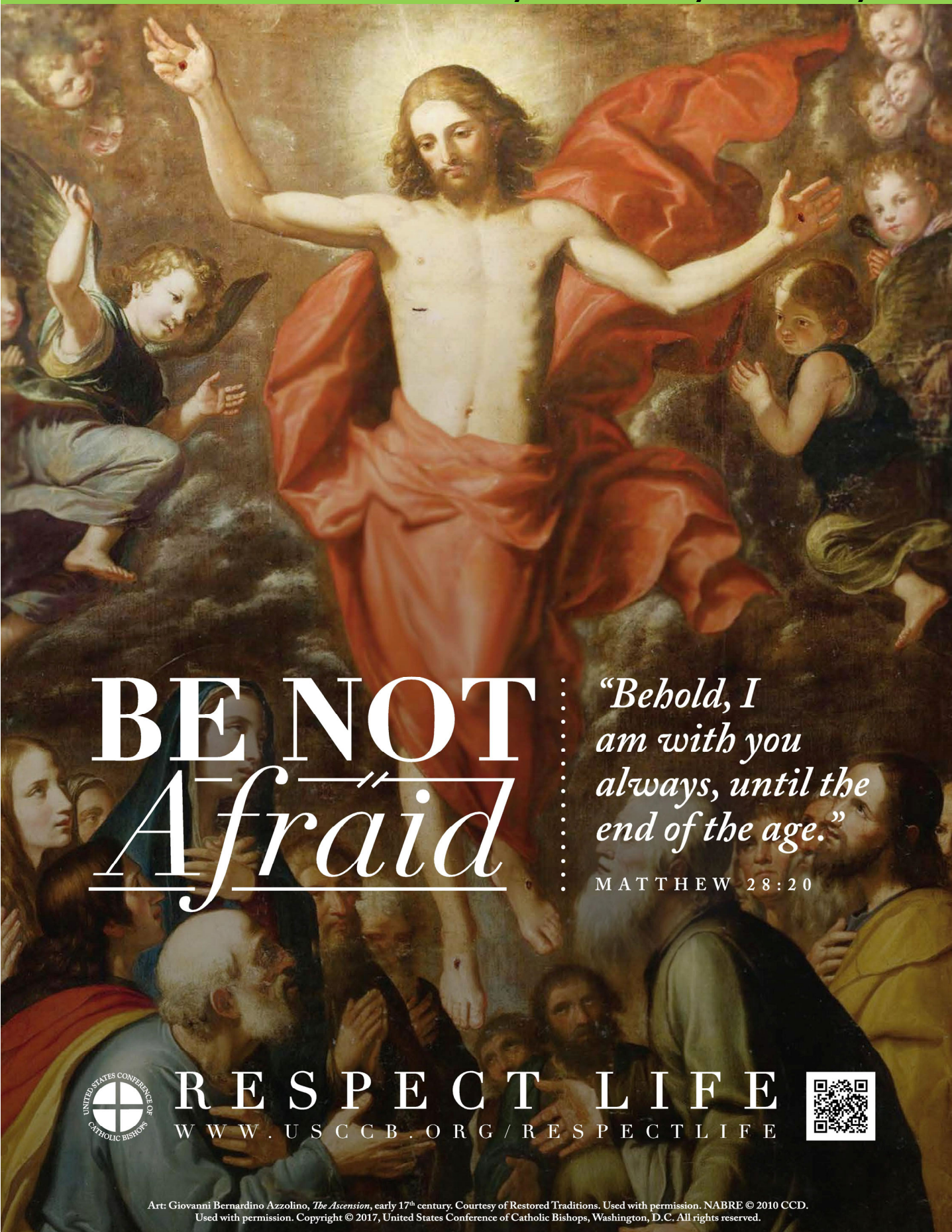

From the Pastor's Desk

Today is the Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time. As the first weekend of October this is Respect Life Sunday and the beginning of Respect Life Month. The national theme is *Be Not Afraid*. See the reflection in the next column.

Our annual blessing of pets will be at 4:00pm on Tuesday, October 3, the eve of Saint Francis of Assisi's feast-day. Noted for his love for God's creation, he wrote *Canticle of the Sun*. Canonized in 1228, just two years after his death, Saint Francis is the patron of ecologists and Italy.

While the deacon is blessing your animals, I should be on my way back from a day-long meeting of the priests of the Archdiocese. The agenda will include an update on the *Renew My Church* initiative.

On October 4, we will welcome BEDS Plus to our campus. Each Wednesday, through May 2018, Saint Hugh Parish will respect life by helping to provide emergency shelter to the homeless.

Saturday October 7 is our fifth Halfway to Saint Hugh Day. Since April 1, our patron's feast, is Easter Sunday in 2018, we will celebrate the holy bishop of Grenoble six months early. Join us for a casual dinner following the 4:00pm Mass.

As part of Respect Life Month, next weekend is celebrated as Inclusion Awareness Sunday. This recognition is made by the Archdiocese in collaboration with the pathways.org

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

Respect Life Month: Be Not Afraid

When battered by life's storms, or immersed in a dense fog of suffering and uncertainty, we may feel alone and unequipped to handle the circumstances. Yet with words that echo through thousands of years into the corners of our hearts, the Lord says to us, "Do not fear: I am with you" (Isaiah 41:10).

He speaks these words not as one who merely observes our pain, but as one who experienced immense suffering. And the very wounds that bear witness to his suffering indicate the essence of our identity and worth: we are loved by God.

Reflecting on the healed wounds of the Risen Christ, we see that even our most difficult trials can be the place where God manifests his victory. He makes all things beautiful. He makes all things new.

He is always with us. Jesus promised this when he gave the disciples the same mission he gives to each of us: Go.

Go be my hands and feet to a world enslaved by fear. Go to the woman who is unexpectedly pregnant and fears the future. Go to your friend who fears reprisal at work because he takes a stand for the protection of human life. Go to your aging parent in failing health who fears being a burden. And go to others, too, for their support.

We don't need to have everything figured out. We can simply follow the guidance of Our Blessed Mother, the first disciple: "Do whatever he tells you" (John 2:5). Walk with each other. Do not be afraid to embrace God's gift of life. Whatever storms or trials we face, we are not alone. He is with us.

"Behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

Standing for the Invitation by Paul Turner

Before the priest says the prayer over the offerings at Mass, he engages the assembly in a brief dialogue. For several decades after the Second Vatican Council, people in the United States sat for the invitation and response, and then rose for the priest's prayer. Now, all stand for the dialogue that precedes the prayer over the offerings.

In the dialogue, the priest invites the people to pray that God will accept the sacrifice. They respond, "May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of his name, for our good, and the good of all his holy Church."

The words are important. The eucharistic prayer is about to begin. The priest recites most of it alone, but all are expected to pray along with him. In this brief dialogue, the people acknowledge that the priest is offering the sacrifice, but they pray that it will benefit all present, and indeed all the church. The assembly speaks these words as a kind of prayer. Given the importance of this dialogue, the people stand as the priest addresses them in words such as, "Pray, brothers and sisters," and they remain standing to respond.

At Masses where incense is used, the assembly may be incensed during the preparation of the gifts. In this case, the people stand while they are being incensed. They remain standing for the invitation and response before the prayer over the offerings.

Standing before the prayer over the offerings was common in some countries before the revision of the Mass in 2002. This clarification helps unify the posture of people throughout the world in the sacred moments before the sacrifice is offered in the eucharistic prayer.

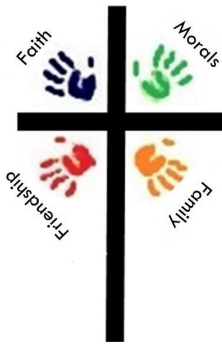
Use People First Language

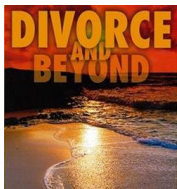

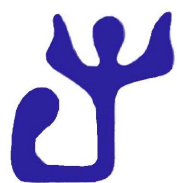

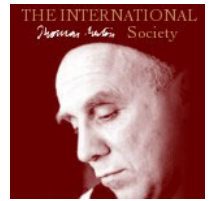

Archdiocese of Chicago Firearms Policy



The Archdiocese of Chicago is committed to providing safe environments for the community. In the midst of a culture of violence, the Church is a staunch voice to call us to be a place of peace.

The Archdiocese has long had a best practice restricting the presence of firearms in our facilities. Most of our buildings display signage, consistent with the laws of the State of Illinois, indicating that these weapons are prohibited on the premises. Cardinal Cupich recently distributed a Policy aimed at updating and clarifying the Archdiocese's position on the prohibition of firearms on all property it owns and controls.

The Archdiocese respects the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution and recognizes the right to lawfully possess a firearm for personal protection, hunting, or other sports. The Archdiocese has sought to balance the rights of all who visit our properties with the need to protect children, the elderly and other vulnerable populations. However, this Policy is rooted in the belief that our churches and community spaces are intended to be sacred sites where people come to gather, pray, and worship God.

There are exceptions to this policy for law enforcement officers, and authorized security personnel.

Treasures

from our tradition

Eucharistic Prayer IV is, like Eucharistic Prayer III, a fresh composition from the 1960s, based on a prayer from the tradition of the ancient church of Alexandria. It has an interesting structural feature. The new prayers all nod toward the East with the epiclesis, or calling down of the Spirit, over the gifts. In this prayer the Spirit is asked to come down again, after the consecration, to make holy the communicants who "partake of this one Bread and one Chalice that, gathered into one body by the Holy Spirit, they may truly become a living sacrifice in Christ to the praise of your glory." This beautiful phrase is well worth meditating on. What is the goal of your reception of Holy Communion today?

The preface for this Eucharistic Prayer is firmly attached to the prayer, and the directives for using the prayer anchor it to Ordinary Time. It is not intended to be an option if the Mass has a proper preface of its own, like a funeral, a Lenten weekday, or a great feast. It is not often used these days, in part because of these limitations. At first, it was suggested that this prayer was better suited to small groups of people who were well educated in scripture. This was kind of an odd stipulation, especially since its images are so beautiful and worthy of attention.
