## From the Pastor's Desk

Today is the Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time. The second Sunday of October (Respect Life Month) is rendered Inclusion Awareness Sunday by the Archdiocese of Chicago in cooperation with Pathways Awareness Foundation. See the column at the right of this page.

The anticipated letter from Archbishop Blase Cupich formally assigning Frank Mamolella as a deacon for service at Saint Hugh Parish arrived. Frank was quickly put to work with the Pet Blessing on Friday October 2. He participated in his first meeting of the Pastoral Staff this past Tuesday and he will assist at the altar and preach at two of the Masses next weekend. As we reacquaint ourselves to having a deacon here, I call the reader's attention to Father Paul Turner's article on page four of this bulletin regarding the liturgical vestment of the deacon.

Columbus Day originated as a celebration of Italian-American heritage and was first held in San Francisco in 1869. The first state-wide celebration was held in Colorado in

1907. In 1937, Columbus Day became a holiday across the United States. Since 1971, it has been celebrated on the second Monday in October. The date on which Columbus arrived in the Americas is also celebrated as the DÃ¡a de la Raza (Day of the Race) in Latin America and some Latino communities in the USA. Please note that the Parish Offices will be closed on Monday October 12 for the national holiday.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.





### Dalmatic by Paul Turner

Today the dalmatic is not the sort of garment you expect to see outside of a church service, but when it first appeared in third-century Rome from Dalmatia across the Adriatic Sea (the same place credited with a breed of dog made famous when 101 of them barked across movie screens), the garment made quite a fashion statement and senators adopted it as a sign of their rank. A calf-length tunic, wide at the sleeves, worn without a belt, it caused some scandal before bishops and deacons started wearing it as well. By the 11th century, the church designated the dalmatic as a vestment proper to them.

Worn over the alb, the dalmatic looks a lot like a chasuble, the outer vestment worn by the priest when he celebrates the Eucharist. It adopts the same color and often the same material as the chasuble. Many early examples sported two stripes from front to back across the shoulders. But the big difference in these vestments is sleeves. A chasuble is completely open from hands to floor, but a dalmatic has sleeves. Many people don't notice the difference. For this reason, many deacons opt to wear the stole without the dalmatic because the deacon's stole, cutting across the body at an angle and dropping in a dogleg near the knee, is more visibly distinct.

Although the dalmatic is generally identified with deacons, it remains a vestment that may be worn by bishops as well. When a bishop vests for a solemn service, he may wear the dalmatic under the chasuble, and in fact was required to do so for almost the past thousand years. Today he may omit the dalmatic for a good reason, and many bishops have dispensed with it as unnecessary.

During the ordination ceremony, the deacon formally receives his dalmatic, and it is placed on him by an assisting deacon or priest. By this investiture, the garment becomes a symbol of his role within the community.

## Treasures from our tradition

How did the church dealt with "daily sins" in the first five centuries? As devout and observant as they were, our early fathers and mothers in faith could not have been all that different from us. Maybe they looked the other way when the grocer threw an extra fig in the shopping basket, or had a wandering eye for the widow next door, or had a taste for too much ale, or didn't let the truth get in the way of a good story. First of all, there was the Eucharist. The words are familiar: "This is the cup of my blood, poured out for the forgiveness of sin." Especially by participating in Communion from the cup, forgiveness was achieved. Eucharist was, and remains, the sacrament of reconciliation par excellence, the sign and source of unity with Christ.

There were other helps along the way: "fraternal" correction, or the course corrections we offer one another in love, prayer, fasting, works of mercy. St. Augustine listed endurance of suffering, forgiveness of insults, and added the praying of the Lord's Prayer in the liturgy. He felt that the public praying of the Our Father on Sunday and its daily use in private prayer was an essential remedy and the reason why everyone was not a candidate for canonical penance. Inherited from Augustine's practice, the Lord's Prayer in our Communion Rite still has the same purpose, preparing us for receiving and becoming the Body of Christ.




