Weekly Vincentian Reflection



In this Sunday's Gospel, the tax collector's prayer allows God to be God and so allows God to pour mercy into his heart. When we pray and give alms to the poor, we allow God's mercy to be poured into their hearts.

Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



Today's Gospel graces us with a beautiful prayer that can make every day of our lives a jubilee of mercy: *O God, be merciful to me a sinner.* Religious Israelites despised the tax collector who prayed it, for collaborating with Gentile occupiers and handling currency that bore the "divine" emperor's graven image. But the Pharisee's long-winded self-congratulation, mixed with self-righteous condemnation, was no "prayer" at all. *The Pharisee . . . spoke this prayer to himself.* Praying the tax collector's simple, sincere, succinct cry for mercy acknowledges our own sinfulness, and "welcomes" other sinners as brothers and sisters with whom we can identify, even empathize, echoing Pope Francis' famous comment about not being the one to judge. Indeed, the tax collector "went home justified", that is, restored to God's friendship, for God's mercy is not prize achieved but gift received. *Let your prayer be brief: for tax collector, prodigal son, and dying thief were all reconciled to God by a single phrase!* (Saint John Climacus, 7th century). - Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. All Saints by Paul Turner

In designating one day on our calendar for all the saints, the church chooses a time to honor our heroes—the men and women whose example we admire. Coming near the end of the church year, the solemnity of All Saints invites us into the mystery of death and the promise of eternal life.

An early tradition placed the festival on May 13. According to one story, Pope Boniface IV (himself a saint) began the celebration in Rome. On that date in 609 he dedicated a very old building as a new church. The Pantheon had been built to honor all the pagan gods, but Boniface rededicated the building as a Christian church in the seventh century. He brought the relics of the martyrs from the catacombs to this famous public place of worship. The parade of relics changed the Pantheon from a place for worship of all the pagan gods to a place that honored Mary and all the Christian saints—and in turn the one Christian God. Eventually the idea of a feast of all saints was transferred to Nov. 1, near the end of the church year.

The church honors many saints with a day of their own on the general liturgical calendar, but there are many more saints than those. Since Vatican II, the number of men and women canonized as saints has increased considerably. Although we do not celebrate all their names on specific dates in all our churches throughout the year, we do gather them as one on this day.

Secular tradition has turned the eve of All Saints into a kind of anti-festival, a night when heroes of the underworld take command.

The Mass for All Saints Day always replaces the one for ordinary time, even when it falls on a Sunday.

All Saints at St Hugh: Since November 1, 2016 is a Holy Day of Obligation, we have added a Mass at 7:00pm that Tuesday. That evening Mass will include particular recognition of those who were buried from our parish during the previous year. Throughout the month of November a Book of Remembrance will be placed near the baptismal font and Paschal Candle. Next week, when this space addresses All Souls Day, look for additional information about our Book of Remembrance and the weekly Mass intention for the Saint Hugh Purgatorial Society.

Treasures from the tradition

Imagine the frustration of bishops who work strenuously over their *ad limina* reports, directing study committees, assembling data, honing the texts, traveling to Rome "to the threshold," only to have it all collapse into a fifteen-minute group meeting with the pope. More than a few have grumbled at the weight of this "treasure" from our tradition, yet from the pope's vantage point, they are essential to his ministry. Pope John Paul II recalled his own experience as the Bishop of Kraków, visiting with Pope Paul VI in the late 1960s and early 1970s. The memory of those individual visits caused him to strengthen the format, assuring each of the world's 2,744 bishops a privileged fifteen private minutes with the pope every five years. If you wonder what the pope does all day, the thought of dealing with five hundred bishops a year and reading their detailed reports on diocesan life should help fill up the calendar. Pope John Paul II used to say that he approached each individual meeting with the personal goal of learning something new about the Church, and his lively interest made the visits immensely worthwhile. The content of the private meetings remains under a privilege of secrecy, or as Cardinal Theodore McCarrick once said, "You're only supposed to quote the pope if he tells a joke."

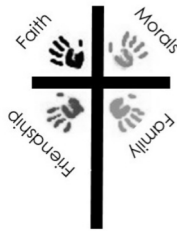
