This weekend brings to conclusion Respect Life Month. As we are again reminded that *Every Life Is Worth Living* we use this occasion to focus our attention on the issue of domestic violence and the respect we show to the lives of those with whom we live.

Sunday November 1 is All Saints Day. The Solemnity is celebrated instead of the Thirty-First Sunday of Ordinary Time.

The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed or All Souls Day will be Monday November 2. The 10:30am Mass that day will include particular recognition of those who were buried from our parish during the previous year.

After two successful international gatherings with young people in Rome in 1984 and 1985, St. John Paul II instituted World Youth Day as an annual gathering of youth and young adults for prayer, worship, and celebration of the Catholic faith. From that day forward, World Youth Day was celebrated each year by the global Church (during every Palm Sunday liturgy in Rome since 1984) and locally in many dioceses around the world. Every two or three years, an international gathering is held to bring all the youth and young adults together in one place with the Holy Father. The next such event will be in Krakow, Poland July 25-31, 2016.

While many nations of the world celebrate young people annually on Palm Sunday and the Feast of Christ the King, the United States has chosen to observe National Youth Sunday on the Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time, which is typically in late October.

World Youth Day USA (WYDUSA) is an umbrella term for the United States' participation in World Youth Day, both abroad at the international events and stateside in the U.S., as well as to designate those who have participated on one of those WYD activities in the past (WYDUSA "alumni"). In 2003, the USA Council of Serra International - the organization whose mission is to foster and affirm vocations to the priesthood and vowed religious life - organized the first Priesthood Sunday. Yet what is needed today are parishioners who pray for their priests on a regular basis. What is needed today are not just financially generous parishioners but fellow Catholics who extend fellowship to their priests, who avoid gossip, who work beside them and for them to meet the many demands of parish life. The good Lord is blessing us with vocations even though more are needed. What is expected of us now, however, is to support the men we have been given.*

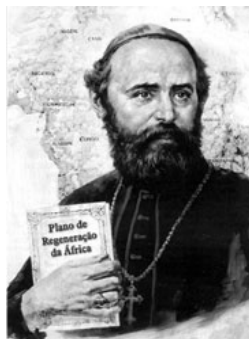

## Letter to the Hebrews by Paul Turner

Excerpts from the Letter to the Hebrews are proclaimed as the second reading at Sunday Mass for several weeks in Ordinary Time in two out of every three years of the lectionary cycle. The name of this letter's author is unknown. Although some people assumed it was written by St. Paul, it does not match the style and content of his letters.

Written for an audience familiar with the Old Testament, the Letter to the Hebrews builds on the themes of covenant, sacrifice, and temple in order to explain the ministry and mission of Jesus Christ. As do many other New Testament books, it concludes with an exhortation explaining how its readers can live a good life.

The book is dense. Even a short passage demands concentration. Perhaps this is why the *Lectionary for Sunday Mass* splits the book in two. Excerpts from the first half are proclaimed from the 27th to the 33rd Sundays in Ordinary Time of Year B. The second half supplies readings from the 19th to the 22nd Sundays of Year C.

Normally, the second reading in Ordinary Time offers the principal excerpts of a particular New Testament book over a single series of weeks. (This resembles a weekly television drama, which has little to do with other programs broadcast the same night but has everything to do with what you saw last week and will see next week during the same time slot.) The Letter to the Hebrews is a rare exception; its content is so rich that the lectionary serves it to us in two smaller helpings. The faithful who pray over each passage at home before arriving at church on Sundays will derive the most benefit from it.

## Treasures from our tradition

In the tangled but fascinating history of penance in the Church, the Irish "tariff" system helped us survive the collapse of the old system of public canonical penance and prepared the way for a new system that emerged in the twelfth century. The old form was unrepeatably, public, dealt with serious community matters, and regulated by the bishops as chief reconcilers. The new form had a more intimate setting of penitent and confessor, was extremely repeatable, and applied to everyone. The old canonical form was closed to children, who were hardly capable of the very grown-up sins listed, or their demanding remedies. The old form was likewise closed to clerics, who were protected in a sense by the very nature of the discipline.

In the new Irish form the penitent directly named sins, or answered direct questions by the priest. Sometimes, the penitent would recite a long formula accusing him- or herself in a general way of all sorts of sins, even from the distant past. Next, priest and penitent together would lie prostrate before the altar and recite several of the psalms with penitential themes. Finally, the priest would pronounce a judgment, deciding what form and duration the penance should take, normally insisting that the person return for reconciliation once the penances were completed.

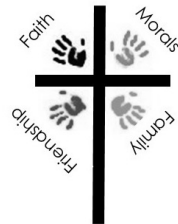
