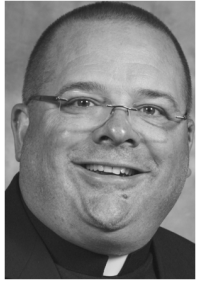

National Bible Week: November 15 - 21



From the Pastor's Desk

Today is the Thirty-Third Sunday of Ordinary Time. Next Sunday, the final Sunday of the liturgical year, will be celebrated as the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. A new year of Grace begins with the First Sunday of Advent, November 29.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) invites all of us to participate in National Bible Week. This year celebrates the 50th Anniversary of the Second Vatican Council Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation, *Dei Verbum*. For this year's theme, the USCCB chose: *The Bible: A Book for the Family* hoping to build on this year's Synod of Bishops on the Family and Pope Francis's visit to Philadelphia for the World Meeting of Families.

Want to learn more about Scripture? Check out *The Word Made Clear*, a website dedicated to studies on each Gospel and the Biblical Roots of the Mass. Creator of the site, Rev. James P. McIlhonne, is the Director of Biblical Formation for the Archdiocese of Chicago. Visit www.wordmadeclear.net to listen to Father McIlhonne's audio presentations on the Gospels.

November draws our attention to the end times and issues of death. In a particular way throughout this month we pray for those who have gone before us. A Book of Remembrance is placed near the baptismal font and Paschal Candle. Already inscribed are the names of those whose funerals were at Saint Hugh during the past year and those names given to us on the special All Souls envelopes. You may also add the names of recently deceased loved ones who will be prayerfully remembered at the parish Masses until the end of the liturgical year.

Those of us who are here Sunday after Sunday can be a welcoming presence to those who are visiting or who are new to our parish faith community. Our hospitality can be a powerful way of saying, "We're glad you're here. Please join us every Sunday for worship." Here are some suggestions for extending hospitality:

- Before Mass: Greet one another. Introduce yourself. Move toward the center of the pew so that it is easier for others to enter. Silence your phone. Smile.
- During Mass: Actively participate. Sing. Take the initiative at the sign of peace. Pray with and for each other. Smile.
- After Mass: Return two copies of *Breaking Bread* to each book rack. Return the Order of Service card to the hat clip with the word WELCOME being the first thing that the next person will see. Put the kneelers up so that it is easier for the next person to enter. Remove whatever you have brought into the pew including the bulletin, tissues, diapers, papers, and water bottles. Smile.

The 2016 copies of *Breaking Bread* will be in the pews for the start of Advent. A bookmark will be included to more easily indicate the page of the readings from scripture on a given Sunday.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

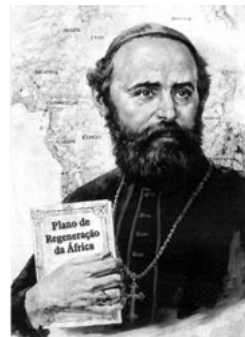
Keating Hall will soon be filled with festive booths as our Society of Catholic Women continues this annual holiday tradition for the benefit of Saint Hugh Parish.



Book of the dead by Paul Turner

Some parishes display a book of the names of the dead. The book keeps an informal record of members who have died and can be put on public view to help the living remember the dead.

The Catholic Church requires every parish to maintain a register of deaths. After each funeral, the name of the

deceased is to be inscribed in this parish register. A secretary usually enters the data, but the pastor is ultimately responsible. This register is usually kept in the parish office, where it serves as a reference book. Every parish is obliged to keep one.

But some parishes display a second book of the dead. There is no requirement for it, but some use one. A book of the dead usually contains numerous blank pages bound by an ornate cover, decorated with Christian art, and displayed on a handsome table or desk.

In some parishes, a member of the family is invited to inscribe the name of the deceased in the book. Other pertinent information may be kept—for example, the date of death, the date of the funeral, and/or the name of the cemetery where the remains can be found.

The book may be displayed near the door of the church or in a side chapel. Some parishes leave the book on permanent display. Others bring it out for occasions like a wake, a funeral, All Souls Day, or throughout the month of November.

Carefully maintained and properly displayed, a book of the dead reminds the living of the people they loved and lost. It records names of the body of Christ and inspires prayer for their eternal rest.

At Saint Hugh Parish

In addition to the official register kept in the safe in the parish office, our parish maintains a *neurology*, an updated list of those buried from our parish by calendar date, at the back of our worship space between the doors to the vestibule. During the month of November, a Book of Remembrance with the names of those buried during the past year is provided near the baptismal font and paschal candle. Each week, the special intention at a daily Mass is for the Saint Hugh Purgatorial Society - our faithful departed parishioners, relatives, friends, and benefactors who have asked for our prayers.

Treasures from our tradition

Eastern Christians developed very different traditions for confessing sin. They see the priest as a witness to God's action, a physician, if you will, rather than a judge. A person confesses sin to God while standing in front of an icon of Jesus, face to face. Without a grill, in the full light of day, near a table with an open Gospel book, the penitent asks the Lord for mercy. A priest standing to the side might offer counsel and confirm God's gift of forgiveness. Rather than list sins and offenses, an Eastern Christian is more likely to speak of a disposition of heart toward God and neighbor, and the desire to forgive those who have wronged them.

Remarkably, although only a priest can pronounce the prayers of forgiveness, lay people, including married men and women, single Christians, monks, and nuns, may witness the confession. This is akin to the ancient Celtic practice of a "soul friend" as a spiritual mentor. Bishops may bless anyone with sufficient theological knowledge and discretion to do this. Eastern Catholics in the United States have largely drifted away from this tradition and toward Latin Rite customs such as confessional screens, set formulas and prayers, and penances. Today, in the interest of preserving the authentic tradition of the Eastern Church, there is a move to restore the older form.

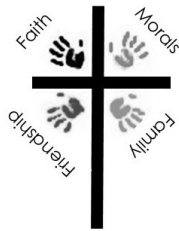

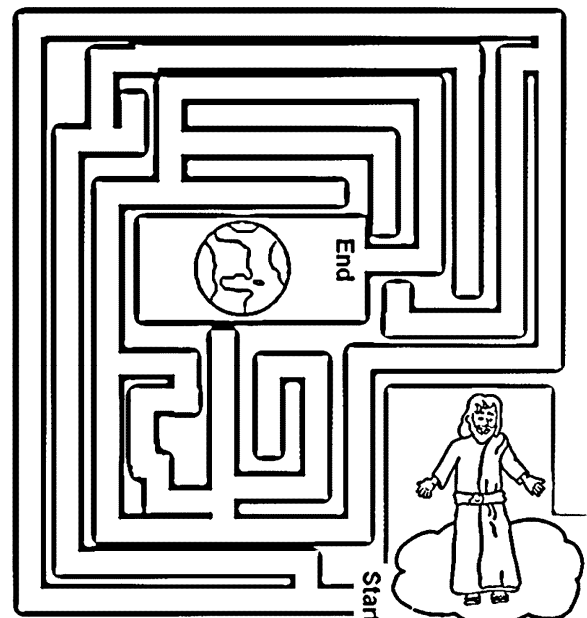
