



THE PROCESS OF SELECTING A NEW PASTOR FOR SAINT HUGH PARISH

The process of determining where a priest will serve as a pastor in the Archdiocese of Chicago is prayerfully and carefully facilitated by the Cardinal, the Vicar Bishops of each Vicariate, the Deans, a priest who coordinates priest placement activities full-time and the Priests' Placement Board which consists of eight Archdiocesan priests. Members of the Priests' Placement Board meet weekly from September through June to assess the needs of parishes in light of placing pastors and associate pastors at parishes. Careful attention is given to determine how the Holy Spirit is calling particular priests to serve the needs of specific parishes in the Archdiocese. The process is focused on assessing each prospective pastor's talents and skills and matching them with the needs of specific parishes. The input of the staff, lay leadership and parishioners of each parish is extremely valuable to the process.

The process is outlined in brief below:

1. A Parish Consultation has been scheduled at Saint Hugh Parish for **Thursday, November 30, 2017**. Two members of the Priests Placement Board, the Bishop, and the Dean will have three separate meetings with the following groups in your parish to gather input about the qualities needed in your new pastor:
 - a. 4pm – meeting with the Parish Staff and Permanent Deacons.
 - b. 6pm – meeting with parish leadership (members of Parish Council, Finance Committee, etc.)
 - c. 7pm – meeting with all interested parishioners in a Town Hall format to discuss the strengths and challenges of the parish and the qualities needed in their next pastor. Input from parishioners is very important in the process. The present pastor and current staff members are asked not to attend this session so as to allow people to express their opinions openly.
2. A Parish Profile is compiled from information received at these parish meetings along with information regarding the parish's mission statement, ministries, finances and other facts about the parish. Prospective pastors who are interested in the parish get a copy of this parish profile to help them in their discernment.
3. Priests who are pursuing a pastorate complete a profile outlining their specific talents and skills and how the Holy Spirit is calling them to serve at their next assignment. Members of the Priests Placement Board will interview specific prospective pastors to determine their eligibility for being pastor of Saint Hugh Parish.
4. After sessions of formal prayer and several weeks of discernment the Priest Placement Board will make a recommendation to Bishop Manz and Cardinal Cupich on which priest they recommend to become the next pastor of Saint Hugh Parish. In a consultative manner, Cardinal Cupich will make the final decision about who he will appoint as the next pastor of Saint Hugh Parish. This will happen in the Spring.

If you have any further questions regarding the priest placement process please contact the Priests' Placement Office at 312-534-5270. Please pray for the continued guidance of the Holy Spirit in the process of selecting a new pastor for your parish. Please know that your input is profoundly needed and will be taken very seriously!

The bulletin cover has your formal invitation and an explanation of the process to find the eleventh pastor of Saint Hugh Parish. You are strongly encouraged to participate in the process, expressing your ideas and suggestions about the qualities you deem important in my successor. At the same time, I invite you to pray for the priests in this transition process. We are relying on the Holy Spirit to direct us to pastorates that best serve the needs of the local church as the parishes of the Archdiocese move ahead with *Renew My Church*.

As a weekly bulletin feature, the column by Father Paul Turner is ending. Sadly, that bulletin inserts we purchased, copyrighted in 2012 to introduce the new translation of the Roman Missal, have not been updated for individual parish use.

We conclude with his commentary on the Infant Jesus of Prague. This image of the child Jesus in full priest vestments is found in the back of our parish church near the stairs to the choir loft. Our thanks to those who continue this devotional prayer, adorn the image with flowers, and maintain the liturgical vestments. In

providing this honor, our parish is blessed.

While his words may no longer appear in our printed bulletin, we will continue to rely on Father Paul Turner's scholarship as a source for the priest's introduction and conclusion of the Universal Prayers (petitions) on Sundays.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

Saint Hugh of Grenoble...pray for us.

Saint Hugh of Grenoble

(1052-1132)

Pious and theologically facile since childhood, he was a canon, not yet ordained priest, when the Council of Avignon named him bishop and assigned him the diocese of Grenoble during the reforms of Pope Gregory VII, who ordained Hugh personally in 1080.

The Church was battling corruption and violations of celibacy within its own members, lay control of Church property, and general religious indifference or ignorance. After two years, he wanted to resign and enter a monastery, but the Pope asked him to stay - and he did for the next 50 years.

He was reasonably successful as a reformer, was an eloquent preacher and fearless supporter of the Papacy. In 1084, he welcomed Bruno of Cologne and six of his companions after seeing them under a banner of seven stars in a dream. He installed them in the snowy heights of Chartreuse, where they founded the first Carthusian monastery. He died in 1132 and was canonized just two years after his death.



Infant Jesus of Prague by Paul Turner

The religious articles in almost every Catholic home include a devotional statue of the Infant Jesus of Prague. It usually stands about 18 inches tall, and it depicts Jesus as a very young child, standing upright, holding a globe in one hand and imparting a blessing with the other. The image is covered with royal vesture.

The devotion can be traced to the 16th century, when images of Jesus—whether in his infancy or on the cross—stressed his humanity as well as his divinity. The two upraised fingers on the right hand of the statue symbolize these two natures.

The original statue was brought from Spain to Prague by a royal family who gave it to the Carmelite monastery and church of Our Lady of Victories. The statue was lost for a time during the Thirty Years' War, but it was recovered, restored, and given a chapel where it is still venerated. Devotion spread from Prague throughout Europe and the rest of the world.

The faithful of various regions and times adorned some statues with clothes, and this custom has been widely adopted for the Infant Jesus. The statue honors the virtues of childhood—its simplicity, dependency, and spirituality. Yet it also recognizes the special case of the child Jesus, who was also truly God, and who rules our hearts as king. One of the Carmelites keeping custody of the statue said the Infant Jesus spoke these words to him in a vision: "The more you honor me, the more I will bless you."

The statue has been especially venerated on a day in the third week of May, during a time of year when the church celebrates the ascension of Christ to his eternal throne.

Treasures

from our tradition

Today we have a modern feast, less than a century old, and placed at the very end of the liturgical cycle of Sundays only in 1969. In 1925, the world was in a sorry state from the vantage point of Pope Pius XI. The winds of war had swept the map of Europe raw, and ancient Christian dynasties had fallen in Russia and Spain. Although the Great War had ended, wars were breaking out everywhere. Fascism was already in control in Italy, and Nazism was on the horizon for Germany. The disorder making its claim on the human race was, the pope felt, an insult to the Divine Order. Pius XI designated the last Sunday in October as a day of universal recognition of the kingship of Christ. Creating this feast was an act of bravery by the pope, who was standing up against idolatry of the state and the dehumanizing forces of the modern world, things that are not hard to detect in today's world as well. In 1969 it seemed fitting to move the feast to a place of honor at the end of the year, a way of summing up the whole movement of the liturgical year toward the perfection of the Kingdom of God. In recent decades, many Protestant churches have adopted this day from the new Roman calendar, so it is shared now with the Church of England, the Episcopal, Presbyterian, and Lutheran churches, and others.
