## From the Pastor's Desk

I offer an all new, updated, and revised Top Ten List for the Advent Season:

#10 - Happy New Year! With the start of Advent, the Church begins a new year of grace. Beginning December 8 this will also be a Jubilee Year of Mercy; more on that next week.

# 9 - On Sundays we use a three year cycle of lectionary readings. Today we begin the so-called C-cycle which means that most of the Sunday Gospel readings for the coming year will be from Saint Luke. Tradition portrays the Evangelist as a doctor and his audience largely gentile. Luke is also the author of the Acts of the Apostles.

# 8 - The windows of the Advent Calendar remind us that this is a season of anticipation and preparation. We keep watch that we might be prepared for the end times; not just the moment of physical death, but also for the time when we believe that Christ will come again. The scriptures, especially at the beginning of this season, have this eschatological focus.

# 7 - The Jesse Tree (see the bulletin cover art for an example) is where the symbols of our biblical heroes are displayed as a reminder that we are not the first generation to wrestle with the Mystery of God or to try to make sense out of our lives. Like our ancestors, we are just the latest generation who try to respond in faith to the One who caused us all to be

# 6 - As a season of preparation, Advent has traditionally been a time for reconciliation. Together with those who will celebrate the sacrament of penance for the first time, our seasonal communal reconciliation service with individual confession and absolution will be at 1:00pm on Saturday December 12.

# 5 - Family and friends are important. The ethnic traditions related to the memorials of Saints Nicholas (December 6) and Lucy (December 13) and the celebrations of *Simbang Gabi* and *Los Posadas* remind us of this fact.

# 4 - At the time of the year when it is the darkest and as the cold weather sets in, recall that the Advent Season's symbol is the evergreen wreath with the light and the warmth of the candles' flames. Advent's gift is Hope when we are cold or in the dark.

# 3 - Certainly high on my personal liturgical Top 40 list is *O Come O Come Emmanuel*. Especially from December 17 on, we sing this hauntingly beautiful Advent hymn.

# 2 - The Prophets, John the Baptist, and the Virgin Mary are the major players in our Advent drama. When the Prophets' words are fulfilled, the Herald and the God Bearer bridge the Hebrew Bible and the Christian Gospel.

# 1 - Remember that God comes into our lives in ways and at times that we least expect. Be watchful. Advent tries to make certain that we are ready. Advent is about the mystery of the Divine breaking into our lives.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

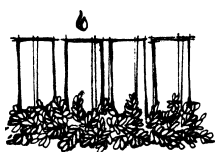
### Jubilee Year of Mercy

Besides a new liturgical year, this Advent features an additional "beginning"—next week's opening of the *Jubilee Year of Mercy*, a graced opportunity to contemplate more profoundly and live more concretely the mystery of God's unconditional love. Pope Francis says that mercy, as the bridge connecting God and the human family, opens our hearts to welcome God's love for us sinners and our eyes to recognize others, especially society's least loved and most vulnerable, as brothers and sisters entrusted to our care. Today's scriptures provide a perfect Jubilee preparation. Jeremiah comforts us with the promise of God's justice; Paul challenges us to abound in love for all; Luke bids us anticipate Jesus' future coming as the joyful advent of our redemption. But in a unique way, this Jubilee Year's Advent reminds us that Jesus, whose coming we await, is already present among us, in those for whom we need to become instruments of God's mercy.

## E-mail Retreat

Kolbe House, the Jail Ministry of the Archdiocese of Chicago, invites you to participate in our ninth annual Advent email retreat.

Every Monday during Advent, you will receive an email with a short reflection written by Kolbe House staff and volunteers and a detainee.

During his sermon announcing a Jubilee Year of Mercy (beginning December 8), Pope Francis said that *No one can be excluded from the mercy of God.*

Certainly Advent rings true to this theme as the mercy of God is brought to us through the birth of Jesus as our Savior. The Advent Sunday readings

deepen our awareness of God's love for all of us, especially for those who are on the fringes of society. We can prepare for Christmas through our individual life experiences, our scriptural reflections, and our actions that serve others.

The Jubilee will center on the corporal and spiritual works of Mercy. We may not have spoken often of these works in recent years, but they have been the bedrock of traditional ways that provide us specific examples of how to be merciful to one another. In simple terms, performing the works of mercy help us to care for each other.

In this year's Advent retreat, you will be guided to look through the lens of the Sunday scriptures so you can prepare for the Lord's birth. We will review the corporal and spiritual works

of mercy so you can come up with a list of concrete actions which will define your Advent preparation.

As one Church we believe and profess that no one can be excluded from the mercy of God. We, at Kolbe House, invite you to walk with us by joining our Advent Email retreat. Every week we will share our experiences of jail ministry and offer our reflections and you will look at the works of mercy through the lens of the jail ministry. You will do works of mercy in whatever situation you find yourself now.

## Advent Wreath by Paul Turner

An Advent wreath symbolizes our longing for the coming of Christ. The wreath is a circle of evergreen branches into which are set four candles. Traditionally three candles are violet and one is rose, but four violet or four white candles may also be used.

The wreath symbolizes many things. Evergreens signify God's enduring promise of redemption, evident like green branches in the midst of snow. The circle signifies our hope for the return of Christ, whose kingdom will have no end. The colors of the candles match the traditional colors of the vesture for the four Sundays of Advent. Violet garments signify our penitent hope for salvation. The rose color, which may be worn on Advent's Third Sunday, signals that the season is nearly over—joy is at hand!

The wreath's most luminous symbol is its growing light. One candle is lit on the First Sunday of Advent, two on the Second, three on the Third and all four on the Fourth. In the northern hemisphere, Advent comes at a time when the days decrease to their shortest length. As the hours of darkness increase, we light more candles on the wreath. The wreath, which symbolizes the coming of Christ, grows in intensity as the anniversary of Jesus' birth draws near.

The Advent wreath may be used at home or at church. It should be blessed on the First Sunday of Advent after the homily at Mass, at evening prayer Saturday night, or during a prayer service including biblical readings and Advent songs. At home, the wreath could be blessed by a family member and lit during the evening meal, to remind everyone of the true meaning of this holy season.

The Advent wreath is prominently displayed in front of the altar as the season's symbol. The appropriate candles are lit as part of the procession at the beginning of each of the Sunday Masses. If you (individual / couple / family) would like to light the Advent wreath candles, please let the ushers know of your willingness to assist us with this ritual. May this sacred time be for us a Season of Joyful Hope.

## Treasures from our tradition

Advent is a time rich in family traditions. Many of them have been so effectively absorbed into our culture that their religious origins are hidden. Some of us will set candles in our windows tonight. The custom began in Ireland during the so-called "penal" days, extending from 1691 to the "Catholic Emancipation" in 1829 and beyond. There were harsh penalties and fines for not attending the government church. Priests were forced into hiding, but people were resourceful and determined in guarding their faith. At Christmas, Irish families, particularly in the countryside, placed a lighted candle in the cottage window and left the door unlatched, hoping that a priest might come by and celebrate the Christmas Mass for them.

The possibility of the Mass coming into the family home gave rise to other Irish customs at the beginning of Advent. The cottage received a fresh coat of whitewash, the threshold was swept especially clean, and fresh curtains were hung in the windows. The house was scrubbed until it gleamed, including all the pots and pans, and all garments and table linens were laundered. The custom of the Irish window candle was so admired in Catholic Europe that it was widely copied there, and now finds a welcome in households that may not exactly expect a priest to wander in!

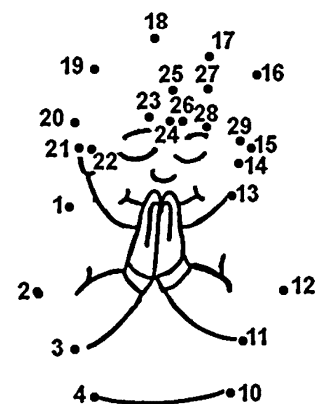
