Today is the Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time.

The first full week of the month is recognized as National Vocations Awareness Week. Ask Our Lord for more dedicated, holy priests, deacons and consecrated men and women. May they be inspired by Jesus Christ, supported by our faith community, and respond generously to God's gift of a vocation.

In the next column I have tried to spell out the process of transition as I complete my sixth and final year as Pastor of Saint Hugh. The number of priests available to pastor parishes is an important factor in the Renew My Church process.

Welcome to the "Pastor Pool"

I have recently informed the members of the Pastoral Staff, PPC (Parish Pastoral Council), and Finance Committee that Saint Hugh Parish is entering the Pastor Pool.

When I was assigned as the tenth pastor of Saint Hugh Parish in 2012 it was for a six year term. Given the realities associated with the Renew My Church process, pastors are now being assigned without terms. For the good of our parish moving ahead with Renew My Church, it is in our best interest that I take on a new assignment at the completion of my term on June 30.

The process of finding the eleventh pastor for Saint Hugh Parish has begun. On Thursday November 30, our Vicar, Bishop Manz, and our Dean, Father Clark, and two priests from the Priests' Placement Board will first meet with the members of the Pastoral Staff and then with the members of the PPC and Finance Committee. At 7:00pm they will host a townhall style meeting in church for all interested parishioners. The opinions and suggestions gathered from these consultations become part of a profile that is provided to the pool of potential pastors.

On Tuesday January 23 the Priests' Placement Board will sponsor a Parish Information Night at Saint Domitilla (Hillside). That evening, representatives of all the parishes in the pool for a new pastor, including members of the Saint Hugh pastoral staff and PPC, will present their parish to the priests seeking an assignment as pastor in 2018.

Once the priests' preferences have been submitted, the Placement Board will meet and make their recommendations to Cardinal Cupich. This is usually done in March.

New assignments begin on July 1.

Pallbearers by Paul Turner

Pallbearers accompany the remains of the deceased person at funerals. They are mentioned only briefly in the *Order of Christian Funerals*: *During the various processions, it is preferable that the pallbearers carry the coffin as a sign of reverence and respect for the deceased* (41). The Catholic liturgy does not further specify what pallbearers do. Funeral customs vary from one region and culture to another, so the liturgy allows great latitude for these to be honored.

Most commonly pallbearers assist the procession from the funeral home to the church and from the church to the cemetery by carrying the coffin to and from the hearse. Their function is practical, but largely ceremonial. Inside the church, funeral directors more adept at steering the coffin usually place it before the altar and guide it out.

During the Mass, pallbearers often join the opening procession and take special seats. The liturgy does not explicitly call for this, but it permits such customs.

Although one usually sees six male pallbearers, no liturgical rules govern the number or sex of those who carry the coffin. Women may assist, and fewer or more than six may be chosen. Pallbearers at a Catholic funeral need not be Catholics. Ordinarily they are relatives or friends invited by the family of the deceased, but perfect strangers may assist if need be.

The role of the pallbearer has less significance when the deceased has been cremated because the practical need of transporting the remains from one place to another can usually be met by one person.

Most people consider it an honor to be chosen as a pallbearer, and they accept the responsibility with the reverence and respect it deserves.

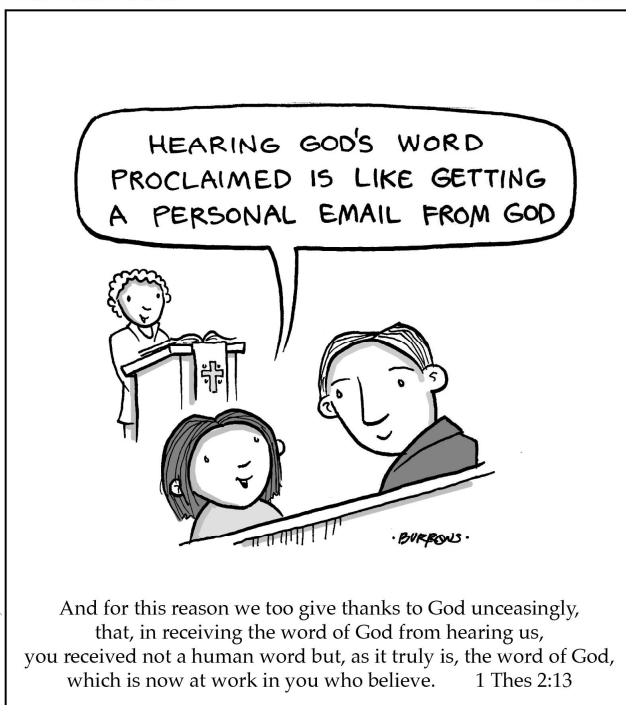

Treasures

from our tradition

What is the name of the pope's cathedral? If you said the Vatican, or St. Peter's, you were off by a few miles, since the answer is the Basilica of St. John, the Lateran, the "Mother Church" of all the churches of the world and the cathedral of the Diocese of Rome. It takes its name from the Lateran family, the Trumps of their day, who somehow ran afoul of the Emperor Nero. He seized all their property, including their vast Roman palace and estate. We don't know how Plautius displeased Nero so badly, but eventually all the Lateran property came to Constantine, the first Christian emperor, through his wife, Fausta. Early in the fourth century, when Christianity was at last legalized, Constantine gave the property to the church. Soon the great meeting halls were expanded and adapted.

Over the centuries, the church building has been sacked by armies, ruined by fire, torn down, and rebuilt. The oldest and most unchanged part of the Lateran is a vast, separate baptistery with steps leading down to a huge green basalt pool. Imagine what a triumphal moment the dedication of this public church building was for a community that had worshiped in secret for so long! This Thursday's feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica is really about the tradition of consecrating space for worship, and so by extension, a feast for your parish church building and, given the beautiful second reading, for its baptistery as well.

VETERANS DAY

On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, an armistice, or cessation of hostilities, was declared between the Allied nations and Germany in the First World War, then known as "the Great War." November 11 became a federal holiday in 1938. In the aftermath of World War II and the Korean War, Armistice Day became Veterans Day, a holiday dedicated to American veterans of all wars. Liturgically, November 11 is the memorial of Saint Martin of Tours, a fourth century bishop and a patron of soldiers. Both celebrations allow us to express our gratitude for the women and men who have worn the uniform of our country with honor.
