In today's Gospel we find that God is a God of the living, and this is indeed the core of our hope. Jesus has risen and is with us, therefore, at no time should we be without hope for the future.

Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



One of the most moving images of Pope Francis' ministry comes from Holy Thursday. Slowly, deliberately, Francis kneels down before prisoners--men, women, young, old, Christian, Muslim--and washes their feet, recalling Jesus admonition to Peter: "If I, therefore, the master and teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash one another's feet" (John 13:14). On today's Jubilee for Prisoners, whose rights the Church bids us advocate, Jesus declares in the Gospel, "to [God] all are alive" (Luke 20:38). Have we "imprisoned" anyone figuratively, but no less painfully, passing harsh judgment, then refusing our respect, acceptance, even affection? This month of All Saints and All Souls bids us reflect on our eternal destiny and prepare for

it. Respect for ourselves and others, souls and bodies, practical care for neighbors and strangers: such witness affirms that we view our present in light of our future, and believe that, even now, in our midst, stands the Lord of life, the living Jesus. - Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. 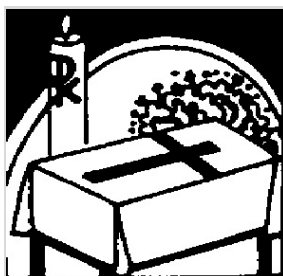

Burial by Paul Turner

Grief overwhelms us at the news of someone's death. Living without a trusted companion may seem impossible. Following a loved one's death, we find support from family, friends, and faith. Funerals express sadness and hope. They sustain our trembling faith.

Catholic funerals present beautiful symbols. Most comfort us by their familiarity—the Easter candle, hymns of hope, holy water of baptism, and incense of prayer.

But our most neglected symbol is burial. Oh, we generally bury the bodies of the dead, unless they are housed in mausoleums, cremated with reverence, or solemnly buried at sea. But few of us participate in the burial. Most often the cemetery personnel lower the body after we all leave. Perhaps we fear it will bring us pain. But our church encourages us to be present for this moment, as a final act of love and faith.

Our *Order of Christian Funerals* states, "Through this act the community of faith proclaims that the grave or place of interment, once a sign of futility and despair, has been transformed by means of Christ's own death and resurrection into a sign of hope and promise. When carried out in the midst of the community of faith, the committal can help the mourners to face the end of one relationship with the deceased and to begin a new one based on prayerful remembrance, gratitude, and the hope of resurrection and reunion."

Our culture masks death. We make up the deceased to look alive. We rest them in coffins resembling beds. We bring them to cemeteries, where the grave is concealed and the mound of dirt covered with green carpet, a small rise in a flowery meadow. We say some prayers and then we leave. Too often we do not bury the body. Strangers to the one we love prepare the final resting place. All because we fear death.

Yet how the Gospel differs! The grave is indeed a garden, where we plant a seed that awaits resurrection. Our faith in eternal life gives us strength to stand above the grave, where death, our co-worker, enjoins our journey to unending life.

Treasures from the tradition

In the seventeenth century, English Catholics, many of them wealthy and well educated, looked to the American colonies as a place to regain a measure of religious freedom. In Ireland, the so-called penal laws were even harsher than in England, as a minority Parliament tried to force the conversion of the population by denying the majority political and economic power. Beginning in 1691, laws were passed that punished dissenters, principally Catholics, but also causing hardship for Jews, Quakers, and others. There were acts forbidding "mixed marriage" or sending children "beyond the seas" for schooling. Catholics were taxed at double the common rate, barred from the legal professions and from university, and not allowed to build churches or own a decent horse.

In 1793 the situation began to change, as it became clear that the economic persecution would not drive the majority away from Catholicism. Gradually, laws were repealed until by 1829 freedom was won, although Catholics at university were ineligible for honors, and until the 1920s and the Republic, the Church of Ireland was the state church, funded by the taxes of all citizens.

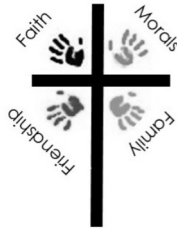
