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From the Pastor's Desk

Today is the Second Sunday of Lent. As we were reminded on Ash Wednesday, the season is marked by the three traditional disciplines: fasting, prayer, and almsgiving.

On Tuesday February 23 at 7:00pm we will provide a Communal Lenten Reconciliation Service with individual confession and absolution. You are strongly encouraged to make the Sacrament of Penance part of your Lenten preparation for Easter during this Jubilee of Mercy.

Our Catechumens: Kimberlee Vaca, Jada Vaca, and Xavier Vaca, and our Candidates: Elias Vaca and Susana Ortiz will participate in three Scrutinies as part of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). The first Scrutiny for our Elect will be during the 4:00pm Mass on February 27. Throughout Lent we pray for all those who will receive sacraments of initiation at the Easter Vigil and during the Easter Season. Students in our Religious Education program will receive their First Holy Communion at the 10:30am Mass on Sunday May 1. Our *Confirmandi* will receive the Sacrament of the Holy Spirit from Bishop Wypych during the 10:30am Mass on Pentecost Sunday, May 15.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

Stations of the Cross

A version of the stations is prayed on each of the Lenten Fridays at 7:00pm. The stations on February 26 and March 4 will be led by our deacon, Frank Mamolella. The stations on March 11 will be led by the members of our Society of Catholic Women. The stations on March 18 will be led by our *Confirmandi* and those in the RCIA.

Lenten Penance Service

Multiple confessors will be available for our Communal Reconciliation Service at 7:00pm on Tuesday February 23. The rite includes individual confession and absolution after a shared examination of conscience, act of sorrow, and common penance.

Days of Mercy and Forgiveness: March 4-5

Prior to the Fourth Sunday of Lent, there will be additional opportunities to Sacramentally celebrate God's Mercy. Some parishes will have confessors available over the 24 hours. At Saint Hugh a priest confessor will be available on Friday March 4 both before and after the Stations of the Cross and on Saturday March 5 immediately after the morning Mass.

Almsgiving opportunity

Non-perishable food may be brought to church and left under the table in the church vestibule or in the altar servers' sacristy behind the Holy Family side-altar. Donations will be distributed by the Food Pantry of Lyons.

Question of the week

By making Isaiah's compassionate
deeds my Jubilee Year of Mercy
Lenten project, in whose life or what
situation can I help Jesus' mercy
"transfigure"? How?

Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



Many icons depicting Jesus' transfiguration bear the Greek title Metamorphosis, a technical term also for nature's springtime transformation. Fittingly, this Jubilee Year of Mercy coincides with the Lectionary's Year of Luke, for only Luke specifies Moses and Elijah speaking about Jesus' "exodus that he was going to accomplish in Jerusalem" (Luke 9:31). Israel's exodus liberated from slavery; Jesus' exodus liberates from sin's living death of selfishness. Pope Francis suggests that Lent's prayer, fasting, and works of charity can transfigure the world, if Christians translate Isaiah's challenge into our daily lived experience of Jesus' life-giving exodus by releasing those bound unjustly, setting free the oppressed, sharing your bread with the hungry, bringing the afflicted and homeless into your house, clothing the naked, not turning your back on your own. "If you remove from your midst oppression, and malicious speech...then light shall rise for you in the darkness ...you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring whose water never fails" (Isaiah 58:9, 10, 11).

Stations of the Cross by Paul Turner

The 14 Stations of the Cross adorn the walls of almost every Catholic church and chapel. Many parishes commemorate the Fridays of Lent with a prayerful remembrance of the passion of Christ by walking the stations with him.

Throughout our history, Christians have longed to literally walk in the footsteps of Christ. The shrines of the holy places in and around Jerusalem have drawn pilgrims inspired by the life and death of their master.

However, not everyone is able to travel to the Holy Land. So, ever since the middle ages, churches and chapels began erecting images devoted to an aspect of the passion. By the 15th century, the Franciscans had developed a devotion they called "stations." The word means a place where people stand still or gather together. So even though it implies something "stationary," the service obviously must include the movement of pilgrims following the footsteps of Christ. It took a while to fix the number and the names of the stations, but in 1731 Pope Clement XII established the 14 we know today.

We still find some variations on the number. Many places add a 15th station, for example, the resurrection of Jesus. Discontent with leaving Christ in the tomb when our faith expresses so much more, worshipers have found consolation in completing the story of the cross.

Over the years our church has authorized various versions of the stations for different occasions. For example, Pope John Paul II altered the traditional stations for his Good Friday service in Rome. He eliminated some stations that derived from tradition, and substituted them with events from the Gospels. Here are the stations he used: 1. Jesus in the Garden of Olives; 2. Jesus betrayed by Judas; 3. Jesus condemned to death by the Sanhedrin; 4. Jesus denied by Peter; 5. Jesus judged by Pilate; 6. Jesus flogged and crowned with thorns; 7. Jesus carries his cross; 8. Jesus is helped by Simon of Cyrene; 9. Jesus encounters women of Jerusalem; 10. Jesus is crucified; 11. Jesus promises the kingdom to the good thief; 12. Jesus on the cross; 13. The mother of Jesus and his disciple at the cross; 14. Jesus is placed in the tomb.

The stations inspire us all to follow Christ through suffering to peace.

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Treasures from our tradition

The treasures of our tradition can often be traced to one source, but like the waters of a river branching out on its way to the sea, are received differently as they filter through various cultures and customs. Long ago, mostly because of the preparation of candidates for baptism, the annual feast of the Lord's death and resurrection was preceded by a period of preparation. In the West that comes to us as Lent, a word drawn from the Old English word for springtime, referring to the lengthening hours of sunlight in this hemisphere.

In the East, the tradition of preparing for Easter is received as "Great Lent," to distinguish it from a secondary "Lent" preceding Christmas, and a two-week period, a kind of "pre-Lent," that gradually introduces the faithful to the austerities of Great Lent. One of the major differences between East and West is in the vigor of the Lenten fast. In Great Lent the customs of fast and abstinence are far more strict than we are accustomed to. For us, meat is off our Lenten tables on Friday, but in the East, meat disappears from the diet completely, along with dairy products.

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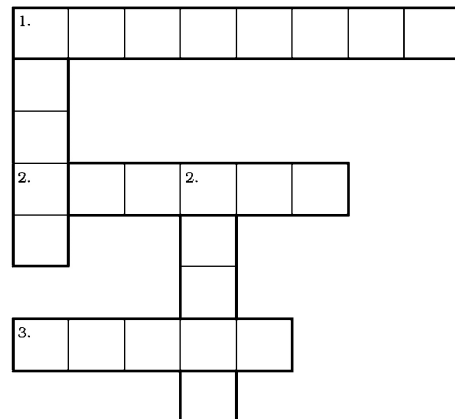
