LENT begins on Ash Wednesday - February 10



From the Pastor's Desk

Today is the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time.

Thank you to all who pledged a commitment to the Archdiocesan Annual Catholic Appeal either in the mail or through the in-pew solicitation last weekend. On this Follow-Up Weekend, I invited those who have not yet made a commitment to the 2016 appeal to do so. Ushers have additional pledge forms which can be deposited in the collection basket today or next weekend.

Lent is coming. February 10 is Ash Wednesday. Ashes will be distributed during the 10:30am Mass and at Prayer Services at 4:00pm and 7:00pm. Ash Wednesday is a day of fasting and abstinence from meat.

The Church provides this description: The annual Lenten season is the fitting time to climb the holy mountain of Easter. The Lenten season has a double character, namely to prepare both catechumens and faithful to celebrate the paschal mystery. The catechumens, both with the rite of election and scrutinies, and by catechesis, are prepared for the celebration of the sacraments of Christian initiation; the faithful, ever more attentive to the word of God and prayer, prepare themselves by penance for the renewal of their baptismal promises.

This bulletin has the complete Lenten regulations regarding fasting and abstaining from meat, details about additional opportunities for the Sacrament of Penance, CRS Operation Rice Bowl, and the rites for those preparing for Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil and during the Easter Season. Additionally, know that we will pray the Stations of the Cross at 7:00pm on each Lenten Friday beginning on February 12.

Since 1993, the memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes is recognized as World Day of the Sick: a special time of prayers and sharing, of offering one's suffering for the good of the Church and reminding us to see in our sick brothers and sisters the face of Christ who, by suffering, dying, and rising, achieved the salvation of humankind. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick will be celebrated during the 10:30am Mass on Thursday February 11. Kindly make this communal celebration known to those who would benefit from receiving this sacrament at this time.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

Lenten Regulations

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent. Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. The special Paschal fast, as well as abstinence, are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.

Days of Mercy and Forgiveness: March 4-5

Additional opportunities this Lent to Sacramentally celebrate God's Mercy. Some parishes will have confessors available over the 24 hours. At Saint Hugh a priest confessor will be available on Friday March 4 both before and after the Stations of the Cross. A priest confessor will also be available on Saturday March 5 immediately after the morning Mass.

Also, know that our Communal Lenten Reconciliation Service with individual confession and absolution will be Tuesday February 23 at 7:00pm.

Rites of Christian Initiation

At the 10:30am Mass next Sunday, we will liturgically welcome all those who are preparing to receive sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist) at the Easter Vigil or during the Easter Season. The latter group includes those who are preparing through our Religious Education Program for First Holy Communion during the 10:30am Mass on May 1 and our *Confirmandi* who will receive the Sacrament of the Holy Spirit from Bishop Wypych during the 10:30am Mass on May 15.

On February 14 the names of our Catechumens and Candidates for Sacraments at the Easter Vigil will be added to our *Book of the Elect*. As a visible reminder to pray for all those preparing for sacraments of initiation, the *Book of the Elect* will be displayed near the baptismal font throughout Lent. Those whose names are inscribed there will also participate in ritual Scrutinies on the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent.

Stations of the Cross

A version of the stations will be prayed on each of the Lenten Fridays at 7:00pm. The stations on February 12 will be led by those in our programs of Religious Education and Youth Ministry. The stations on February 19 and March 11 will be led by the members of our Society of Catholic Women. The stations on March 18 will be led by our *Confirmandi* and those in the RCIA.

A communal celebration of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick will be part of the 10:30am Mass on Thursday February 11 - the memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes and World Day of the Sick.

Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



During this Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis calls us to share with everyone the tender compassion of God that we ourselves have experienced. In today's Gospel, Luke uses a special Greek word conveying just such tenderness. In the other Gospels, Jesus calls the disciples to be "fishers," haleis, the same word that means catching fish with hooks or nets, to be killed and eaten. But Luke uses zogron, from zoe or "life," meaning "catch or gather people alive," as animal lovers capture without harming, rescue from "the wild" for a better life, and protect in aquarium or zoo, tenderly cared for by professionals committed to the creatures' well-being. So in Luke's vision--and Pope Francis' as well--we who have been "caught alive" by God's mercy ourselves are to become "missionaries of mercy" during this Jubilee Year of Mercy, rescuing fellow sinners from danger and

gathering them into Jesus' community to enjoy fullness of life.

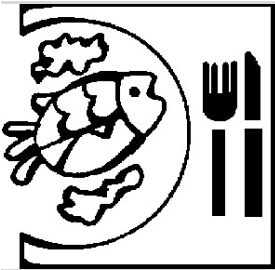

Fast and Abstinence by Paul Turner

During Lent, Catholics in the United States abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of the season. They fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. They are encouraged to continue the fast on Holy Saturday as well, in union with those preparing for baptism. On a fast day, people eat only one full meal; they may also eat two partial meals and should not snack between any of them.

The laws of fast and abstinence may vary from one country to another; however, they accomplish the same goals. They help us imitate the example of Jesus, who fasted 40 days to prepare for his ministry.

They help us display our common repentance. More than declaring our personal desire for conversion of heart, they strengthen our community by expressing our corporate sorrow for social sin.

They teach us a detachment from passions and turn our hearts more toward God and less toward food. They make us more disciplined and more charitable.

The purpose of fast and abstinence, then, is not to punish us but to make us more loving, more prayerful, more detached from whatever may keep us from God.

Fasting becomes more spiritually effective when sustained by other practices such as prayer, charity, and almsgiving. The prayers at Mass during Lent presume that the community is supporting its prayer with fasting and its fasting with prayer.

Everyone age 14 and older is bound by the law of abstinence. Younger children are to be educated in its significance. Other Catholics are expected to avoid meat on Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent no matter how old they become.

However, fasting binds from after one's 18th birthday until after the 59th. Catholics younger and older than that need not fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Nonetheless, fasting is a praiseworthy penitential practice, even when it is not required.

Throughout the year Catholics fast from food and drink one hour before sharing communion.

Treasures from our tradition

As the Roman Empire shattered and collapsed, the bishops were the people best equipped to catch the falling stones. In the West (that's us), they sought to stabilize society by weaving a structure of laws and courts to uphold the rights and dignity of married couples in a chaotic world. The bishops in the East had a different approach, even allowing the dissolution of marriages in certain cases. To an extent, the bishops took a measure of control away from the fathers of families in order to provide pastoral care for those who suffered most in the social collapse: women and children.

In the West, much of the marriage law was contained in the "penitential books" the bishops devised to regulate the lives of public sinners. In the seventh century, Theodore of Canterbury's penitential book said that he had the power to give consent to remarriage in the case of a poor fellow whose wife had been carried off by the Vikings. If the Vikings subsequently brought her back, she could remarry, too! No bishop ever made peace with divorce, but there was never a time when the pastoral concern of the church was not struggling with how to care for people in unhappy situations.

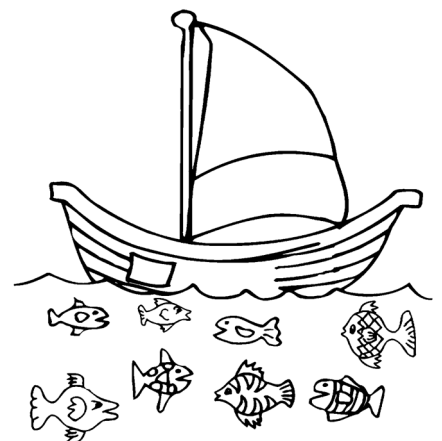
